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RUSSIAN WHO-DONE-IT

Who invented the electric light? If you say Edison, you are wrong—it was a Russian named Yablochkov. Who devised the telegraph? If you say Morse, you're wrong again—it was another Russian named Yabobi. The radio? No, it wasn't Marconi—it was still another Russian named Popov. How about the first successful flying machine? If you answer "the Wright brothers," you'll have to go the bottom of the class—a Russian called Mozhaisky flew like a bird near St. Petersburg 20 years before the Wrights took off at Kitty Hawk.

These, and similar revelations, are discovered by Edmund Stevens in the Christian Science Monitor. He found them in a Soviet magazine called the Literary Gazette. They show, he says, one of the ways the Soviet party "woos the Russian national pride. The move corresponds to a vital need of Russians to vindicate their self-respect and destroy the residue of an old sense of inferiority. It also increases the Russians' confidence in their capacity to catch up with and outstrip the rest of the world technically at the present time." It is, in other words, an example of the kind of morale-building propaganda the government is now feeding the Russian masses.

Moreover, it is an example of how the Soviet bosses will use any untruth or half-truth to serve their ends. A story has been going the rounds concerning a British Communist who went to a meeting of Russian strategists in Moscow. He was perplexed as to how to argue some ideological point or other in England. The Russians gave him an answer, to which he objected that it wasn't true. The Russians looked at him in amazement—and then burst into gales of laughter over such naivete. It is said that the incident was described to the top Russians, including Stalin, and that they burst into laughter also.

This story may be apocryphal but it has a point. Communist thinking holds that the end justifies the use of any means. If a lie will work, it is told. Words are twisted out of all semblance to what they mean to other nations. That is touched on in General Walter Bedell Smith's revelations of his experiences as Ambassador to Moscow, which appeared serially in the Saturday Evening Post and are now out in book form. He, Secretary Marshall, and other Americans, he says, "Naively assumed that the word 'democracy' meant the same thing to the Politburo that it did to us." Events proved that nothing could have been more wrong. The Russians gave 'democracy' a new meaning which suited them, and thus managed to give interpretations to international agreements which were the exact opposite of what the West had intended. This policy is one of the principal reasons for our failure to meet the Russians on common ground."

Exciting work? Yes, and an exciting hobby. I wouldn't change it for anything in the world.

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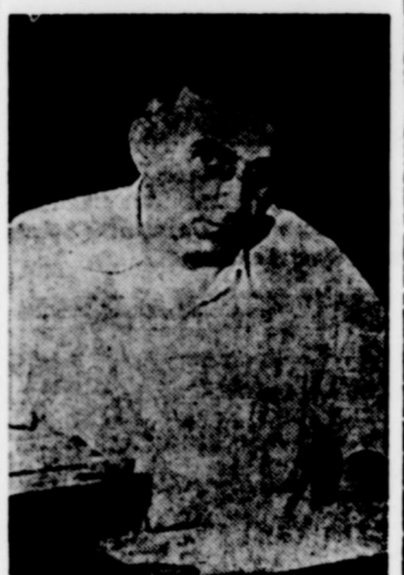

You Had To Wait For Drivers Test? Here's Some Of The Answers

AUSTIN, July 25. — Stood around a Driver's License examining station recently awaiting your turn for the tests which will determine whether or not you will be issued a license?

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, says that if you are one of the 52,000-plus persons who make application each month for a new Texas Driver's License, you probably have been subjected to a considerable wait—sometimes of several hours duration, or, at best, being obliged to wait a number of days for an appointment. Now, with the exercise of a little arithmetic, he tells you why the delay and just what the men in his Driver's License Division are doing trying to alleviate the situation.

At Garrison's direction, A. F. Temple, Chief of the Safety Department's Driver's License Division, today released the following comparative figures on the activities of that Division's personnel during the eight month period from November, 1949, thru June of this year as compared with the same period of 1941-42:

Texas' population, according to the 1940 census report, was 6,414,824. From November, 1941, to July, 1942, the Texas Dept. of Public Safety had employed 93 Driver's License Examiners who administered 276,008 tests during the eight months. In the same period, the headquarters staff of the License Division issued 962,340 licenses to Texas drivers. This latter included both renewals and new licenses issued on the basis of the examiners' tests.

Ten years later, in 1950, the population figures had risen by more than a million and a quarter to a total of 7,877,060, while the ranks of the DL examining personnel had been increased by seven for a total of an even one hundred men. These 100 examiners, however, during the past 8 months, conducted 418,566 tests, or an increase of 142,558 over the 1941-42 figure. In other words, an employee increase of 7 1/2 per cent accounted for a 51 1/2 per cent increase in testing activities. This is possible because of improvements and reforms in examining techniques and procedures. Also, during the past eight-month period the License Headquarters issued a total of 1,240,619 licenses, both new and renewal. At the present time, due to the recently adopted mechanical methods of issuance, the Division is turning out in excess of 10,000 driver's licenses each day.

Currently, according to Temple's figures, there are about 3,000,000 licensed motor vehicle drivers in Texas. This is an increase from 1 1/2 million in the short space of four years—since 1946.

The number of driver's license examiners in Texas is based strictly upon the legislative appropriation which is made for the division and none can be added without the act of the Legislature.

Both Garrison and Temple are quick to admit that they are aware of the inconvenience and delay which is incurred in the proper administration of our driver's license law but they point out that each of the men in the Driver's License Division is conducting an average of more than 500 examinations each month. This, they say, is 150 more per man than can reasonably be expected and they indicate that the strain of maintaining such an excessive schedule probably accounts for the large turnover in examining personnel—a little more than 12 per cent since last November.

Remember these figures next time you are inclined to gripe about waiting for that driver's license test!

Industrial College Of The Armed Forces Announces Field Courses For 1950 And 1951

AUSTIN, Tex., July 28.—Col. Oscar B. Abbott, Chief of the Texas Military District, has received information that the program for the Field Economic Mobilization Courses to be presented by the Industrial College of the Armed Forces during the 1950-51 academic year has been announced by Major Gen. A. W. Vannaman, USAF, Commandant of the Industrial College.

The Field Economic Mobilization Courses are condensed versions of the full 10 month course given at the Industrial College in Washington, D. C. The instruction is a broad presentation of the principles of economic mobilization from the educational aspect, particular attention being given to the role played by the national economy in a national emergency. As the Industrial College of the Armed Forces is not a planning, policy or operating agency, only the important principles of the problem itself are presented. Emphasized is the fact that civilian thinking and civilian decision must determine the actions taken in mobilizing the economy of the nation.

Lectures are presented in such fields as organization of the government for national security, technological progress, national resources of the U. S. and other major powers, manpower resources and problems, the requirements of the Armed Forces procurement, economic stabilization, production, public services, economic potential for war and problems for mobilization.

The current world situation in its relation to economic mobilization and the role of industry in mobilization are discussed. In addition to the instructors selected from the faculty of the Industrial College, representatives of the National Security Resources Board and the Munitions Board participate in the courses.

Approximately 10,000 Reserve Officers and civilians have completed the course since the establishment of the program in 1948. During the 1950-51 academic year courses will be presented in Texas in Houston from February 26 to March 9.

The course is open to senior officers of the Reserve components and the National Guard, as well as representative members of industry, business, finance, education and labor.

FISH POND STUDY TO BEGIN SHORTLY

AUSTIN, Aug. 2.—The Chief Aquatic Biologist of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission has ordered a study of farm fish ponds in Texas to pave the way for even better angling conditions.

He pointed out that the more than 125,000 ponds, on private lands, ranging in size from one-quarter acre to 15 acres, comprise a substantial part of Texas' fishing facilities.

Future management procedure will be determined on the basis of the data obtained from the new survey. Possible enhancement of the knowledge gained is expected through an exchange of information at a seminar on stocking fish ponds at the American Fisheries Society Convention in Memphis, Tenn., in September.

The Chief Aquatic Biologist explained that a vital part of the material for the Texas undertaking will come from the San Marcos State Fish Hatchery. Experimental ponds there have been stocked with various ratios of fish.

The San Marcos studies will be blended into observations of the farm ponds, most of which are stocked by the state game and fish department. One important phase will center around the fact that water levels in the experimental hatchery tanks have been kept stationary while the water levels in the uncontrolled farm ponds generally fluctuate according to the local rainfall.

The importance of the farm pond system, according to the Chief Aquatic Biologist, cannot be over emphasized. "Every farm pond is a potential fish hatchery," he said. "If the fish stocks in the farm ponds are properly balanced and productive, other areas benefit. This is because in times of high water, many of the fish in the farm ponds find their ways into rivers and on into reservoirs and lakes."

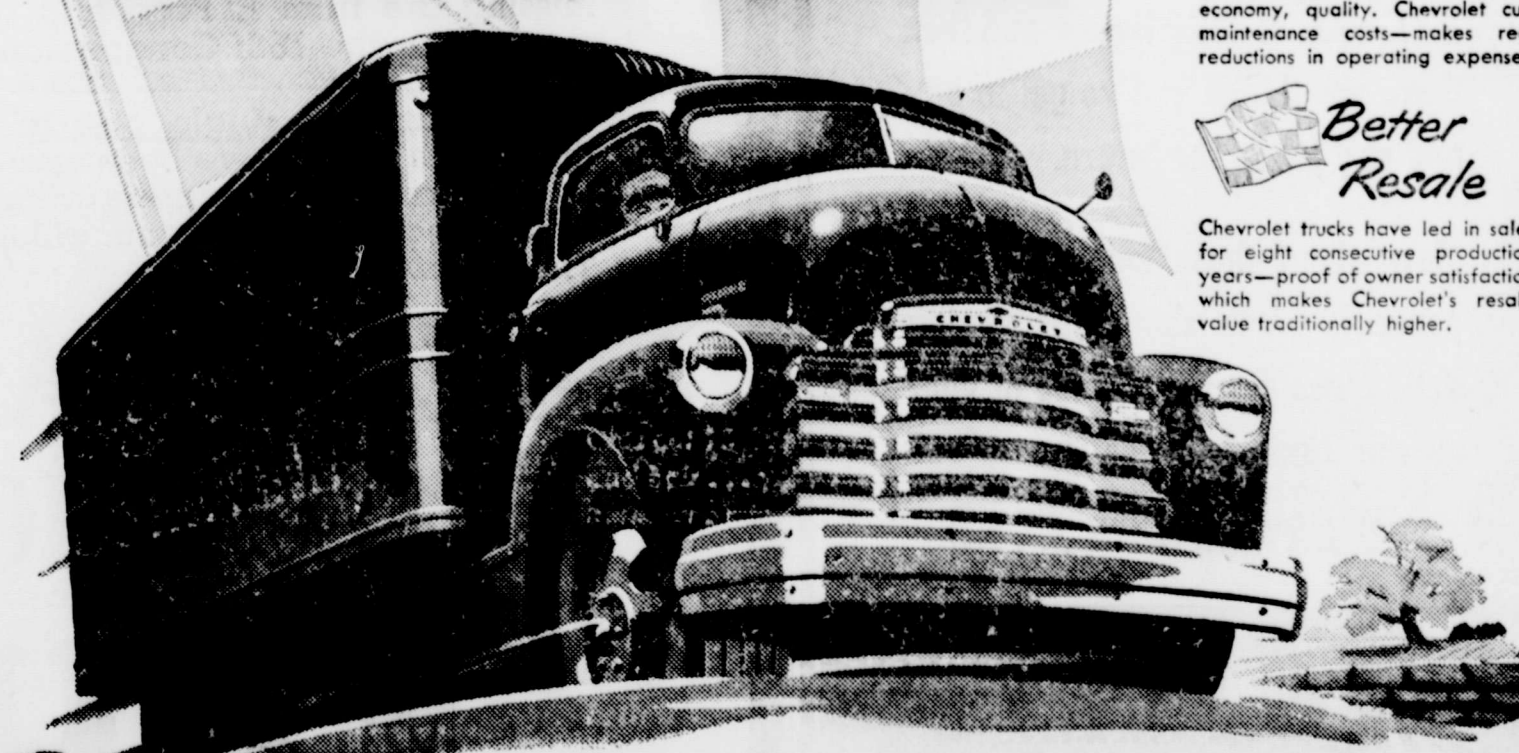

Moss Attacks Regan's Korean Voting Record; 'Dollars Over Lives'

District Judge Paul Moss today blasted open his runoff campaign for Congress by accusing Representative Ken Regan of "holding American dollars higher than American lives in Korea."

"Ken Regan can dodge all he wants to but he can't get away from the facts," Judge Moss charged.

"The blood of our American boys—many of them from right here in West Texas—is being shed today in a war that might well have been prevented if we had been quicker to give economic aid to our allies in Korea.

"Korea stands today as the Pearl Harbor of World War III. If hostilities were to cease immediately, it would still remain as one of the major tragedies of current history.

"I think Ken Regan ought to hang his head in shame."

Judge Moss, whose vigorous campaign has highlighted the Congressional race from its start, pointed to Mr. Regan's record on the Korean aid proposal.

"Last January, the Congress voted down the Korean aid plan by a count of 192 to 191 with Ken Regan voting against it," Judge Moss pointed out.

"Regan's vote alone would have made a difference.

"When the measure came up again a month later, it was approved. But, once again, Regan was against it.

"Ever since, Regan has tried to explain away his stand by saying he was against economic aid but in favor of military aid.

"I will never vote to put American dollars above American lives."
