



Possible Fusselman Discovery Is Seen In N. W. Crockett Area

Continental Oil Co. has discovered flowing oil and gas production from a lime chert formation which is possibly the Fusselman Crockett County wildcat, 9 miles north of Iraan and 19 miles SE of Rankin.

This exploration flowed 49 barrels of 47.4 gravity oil, and no water in 30 minutes in a drillstem test at 8,576-8,635 ft.

The flow was through a 3-4 in tubing choke. Gas-oil ratio was 3,259-1. Open flowing bottomhole pressure was 3,855 pounds. Operator is to be clean out cav-
