

For that reason, it was determined that 27 1-2 per cent of the gross income resulting from the production of oil and gas wells should be exempt from income tax payments. In other words, this exemption was figured to offset the loss resulting from drilling dry wells and other inherent risks in the industry. To tamper with the depletion rate now is to create uncertainties which can easily restrict the exploration for new crude oil supplies.



ailroad.

He claims that there are nough such padded operations costs to make this subsidiary of the Southern Pacific owe the State of Texas over \$1.5 million. And then there are three bonds that the State sold to build the ailroad. They haven't all been paid yet, and the interest on them as grown to \$85,000.

Well, the railroad, which is still tate-owned, was worth \$760,000 in 1939. Now it is figured to be worth more than \$1 million. The State could sell it and have that much less money to collect from the taxpayers. But so far nothing has been done with the bill call ig for the sale.

Congressional redistricting is now one of the biggest probelms in the Legislature. I'll give you the two major redistricting plans that have been drawn up, and I would like for you to tell me which you prefer.

First, we have to consider our present district. Going from west to east, it contains these counties: El Paso, Hudspeth, Culberson, Brewster, Pecos, Loving, Ward,

Winkler, Ector, Crane, Midland, Upton, Glasscock, Reagan, Terrell, and Crockett. The total population is 353,947.

Needless to say, that is way out of proportion. It has been figured out that, on the basis of the population of the State, each district should have from 314,000 to 318,000.

Now there are two major plans for our West Texas district. The first would leave it just like it is above, except that it would remove Loving, Ward and Winkler counties. But the population would still be 342,830, or about 24,000 more than it should be. The other plan also would leave most of the district as it is, but it would knock off the three counties farthest east-Midland. Upton and Crockett. This would make the population about right-314,871-but, as you can readily see, there is one big drawback. Midland County, the home of our present Congressman, would no longer be in our district. Well, there are two schools of thought. One is that we should


