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A MATTER OF TRANSLATION

John Q. Public, a guy who ought to be vitally concerned, rarely take the trouble to brood over the mathematical figures of government which the newspapers print from time

Perhaps, in the immortal words of a very successful politician, it was all "planned that way." For governmental mathematics are so huge and bewildering that John Q. is unable to translate them into realities or into practical applications. Such a situation, of course, is just what a good many politicians like.

Yet John does have a sort of uneasy feeling about "government spending," and he surely ought to have because John's standard of living (and even his destiny) is tangled up in those figures.

Let's translate a couple of them to show how.

As of last October, civilian employees of the local, state and Federal governments of the U.S. numbered 6,402,000. At the same time, there were 55,400,000 Americans in private jobs. Thus, simple division shows that John and eight of his working neighbors are paying the wages of those government workers.

As of last June 30, the Federal government owed debts of \$281,000,000,000, the state governments \$5,323,000,000, and local governments \$18,324,000,000. Translated, that means that John is himself in debt for \$1,865-and so is every other other member of his family. Furthermore, those governments are going to collect from John and his family, come volved in more than 90 per cent dents happen in clear weather on

A great upmber of these employees were put on government payrolls, and a large part of those debts were made, because John (who's nobody but you and me) asked our gov-

ernments for more and better servces and benefits. When translated, however, they just don't look so tempting any more.

Pecos Valley Farmer Uses Green Tags To Market Cotton

Market 1951 cotton by the green tag method, Pecos Valley farmers were urged this week by S. R. Gohmert, western cotton branch manager, U. S. Dept. of Agriculture's Production and Marketing

This is the official grade and taple report placed on each bale by USDA cotton classers at the request of farmers belonging to groups.

"Demand promises to be strong for this year's crop. In knowing the exact grade and staple length, farmers will be in excellent position to get the best price for their cotton," Gohmert explain-

Last year, 1,490 farmers in the Texas border counties took advantage of USDA's Smith-Doxey lassing program and marketed 149,984 bales under the green tag system, he continued.

They can get the same service without cost this year by making application for it. Requirements include organizing into a group to promote improvement of cotton, adopting a variety, filing an application, arranging for sampling and meeting certain other requirements.

In addition to the official classification, they also will receive market news showing current prices at nearby markets. By comparing the grade and staple

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




Mr. J. J. De Phillippi, Supt., Sales Training, was the leader of the meeting.
