The son of Mrs. Tracy and the famed motion picture star who is now 26 years old, was discovered to be deaf when 10 months old. The mothers attended classes in the mornings of the ten day school and heard a special lecturer every afternoon. A staff of teachers from the Texas School for the Deaf provided the instructional opportunity and were assisted by special lecurers who spoke on various aspects of deafness and the treatment of deaf children. As this was the first summer school, many mothers did not know about it. Mrs. Rodenberg accidentally learned of it from a clipping sent to her by a friend and it is hoped many more mothers can take advantage of the school next summer.
