THE FEWER THE BETTER!

Those who believe that price and the related controls can solve practically every economic problem follow a simple formula. Step one is to apply controls. Then, if that does not produce the desired result, step two is taken, which is to make the controls still stiffer. So it goes, ad infinitum.

This may be all very well in theory, but it breaks down like an overwound spring in fact. For, as controls become stiffer and more numerous, the inevitable result is either a scarcity of goods or a deterioration in the quality of goods. The price is fixed, all right-but that is hardly of advantage to consumers who are not able to find what they want on the shelves.

The weird changes that have taken place in the beef situation are in point. Some time ago the legitimate packers reported that the amount of beef they were able to purchase was way below normal. More and more beef obviously was being diverted into gray markets and black markets. To make a bad matter worse OPS was known to be considering placing ceiling prices on meat at the live cattle level. As a consequence, farmers and ranchers largely stopped buying lean cattle to fatten for market-a practice which is responsible for a substantial part of the nation's meat supply.

Then certain changes were made in control regulations. On top of that, Congress, in renewing the Defense Production Act, denied OPS authority to impose live cattle prices. In other words, a supply-and-demand economy in meat was to some extent restored. And, of late, marketings of meat through the legitimate channels of trade has been running at near-record levels. The shortage is over.

The moral is plain. The fewer controls we have, the better the public is served. And it is served best when there are no arbitrary, artificial controls at all.


