





ECONOMIC HIGHLIGHTS

Has Korea become the "forgotten" war? Will it go on indefinitely, with its heavy casualities, and with little or no chance for us to win a decisive victory?

Those somber questions are raised in an article in a late issue of U. S. News and World Report. The magazine said: "Korea, half-forgotten, is receding in the minds of many to the status of an experimental war, one being fought back and forth for the purpose of testing men, weapons, materials and methods, on a continuing basis. No effort is being made or planned to win a clear military victory. New U.S. ground forces, which could help drive the enemy out of Korea, are being sent to Europe. U. S. bombers, which could seriously weaken the enemy by bombing his bases outside of Korea, are still kept below the Yalu. The U.S., faced with a thirdrate enemy, has fought for 15 months with no prospect of a February, 1952, there was presentmilitary victory in sight.

Korean casualties have been enormous. During these first 15 months we suffered more than 14,000 killed, about 60,000 wounded, and nearly 11,000 missing. Our allies took heavy losses, too. What has happened to the civilian population of South Korea is beyond description. The cities and the villages have been razed and burned.

On the credit side, as credits go in war, Korea has enabled us to build up a magnificent army and to school it in new and often revolutionary tactics. Everyone who has seen this army has only the highest praise for it, from Gen. Ridgway's high command down to the last private in a frozen fox-Morale is magnificent, and the troops' fighting qualities, both as individuals and in units, are superb. And Korea has led to the development of vastly improved traditional weapons. It is all very different from the dreadful early days, when a handful of ill-equipped, inadequately-trained troops attempted the impossible and were all but wiped out.

Korea has also taught the military some vital facts of modern war. As an example, U. S. News observes, "Air power of the latest type is turning out to be of limited effectiveness against a determined enemy. A large U. The situation has been further complicated, in the grimmest possible way, by the announcement that the Russians have exploded another atom bomb, probably in the Siberian fastness. This has once again raised the question of whether the final destiny of unhappy Korea is that she will become a testing ground for atomic weapons. High American authorities have been talking in very general terms of new weapons, apparently suitable for use by and against ground troops which may be just in the offing. No one has said whether these weapons use atomic energy, or whether they are of a different character. 

Out of State car owners are requested to transfer their car titles, and register their cars early to avoid the deadline of April 1, 1952. It is necessary that all out of state registered cars surrender their present titles and make application for Texas titles before they can register their cars in Texas for 1952.

Due to the length of time it takes to make the necessary transfer on an out of state vehicle, it will necessitate a delay and a possible penalty to the owner should he wait up until the deadline to perfect his title.




