## Town Hall Features Water, Tax, Fire, Garbage

### Resident Engineer Moves To McCamey; Projects Noted For Upton Residency

James B. Fincher, resident engineer of the Upton County residency of the Texas Highway Department, arrived in McCamey last week to assume the duties of the position.

He comes to McCamey from Hondo, Texas, where he was associate highway engineer. Prior to his service in Hondo, he worked with the Highway Department in Austin for 11 years.

He is joined in McCamey by his wife.

Fincher is a native of Waxahatchie, Texas.

On his arrival in McCamey, he announced that Jack V. Valentine, recently of Goliad, Texas, arrived in McCamey last week. Valentine served with the Texas Highway Department for three years in Goliad before coming to McCamey.

Valentine will be senior party chief of this residency.

Joining Valentine at his new home in McCamey are his wife and children, Chip, Candy and Mary.

Though the final work of the McCamey residency of the Texas Highway Department is not expected to be completed for about

County, although they will probably handle nearby projects in the neighboring counties when convenient.

At the present time, work in surveying Highway 87 east from Rankin to the Reagan County line is underway in a project calling for widening and repaving that portion of the road. Work will probably be started this summer.

Another portion of work of the residency now underway, and of utmost importance to McCamey citizens, is the improving the railroad crossing of Burleson Ave.

At a recent meeting of District Engineer R. L. Matinson of Pecos, and the engineers of Santa Fe, an agreement was reached the rails would be raised to fit the grade established by the Highway Department.

The Santa Fe is doing the work on the project.

To date, the rails have been raised and caliche placed and packed. When completed, the rails will have a boarded crossing with an asphalt finish.

Work on the project is expected to be completed within 30 days, according to Mr. Fincher.

three months, Mr. Fincher said the office is now in full operation.

When the residency has attained full strength, the staff will be composed of six men, other than the resident engineer. A crew of some 20 workers is expected to be employed.

### Water District Planned; Fire Situation "Bad"

More than 30 Rankin citizens, including merchants, city officials and interested taxpayers, held a two-hour-long session at the Rankin Park Building Monday night to discuss problems and seek solutions to remedy conditions that had become major problems.

The most important topic to come before the group was that of water.

As all citizens know, water is the major problem of the city at the present time. Mayor Ivy told those present that what the whole thing meant "was that the people of Rankin spent \$25,000 for fire insurance protection last year, and to get the same amount of insurance after April 1 would cost \$50,000."

In searching for a solution, a plan to establish a water district, which would necessarily include some outlying area, was discussed by the group at some length. In the end, those present gave a unanimous vote to appoint a group to begin work on the project and determine whether such a district could be formed. Mayor A. E. Ivy, Councilmen Linton Clark and Clay Taylor were named to the committee.

In the event that a water district became a reality, the district would in turn sell water to the city of Rankin and any other party at established rates, probably much lower than present city rates.

The committee received the sanction of the group to contact engineers at "the earliest possible time" and begin work on the project.

#### TAX ADJUSTMENT

Another major problem coming up for discussion was the need for the adjustment of tax levy in Rankin for city taxes. It was noted that some were too high, while others were too low. There was general agreement among those present that such a condition existed and should be remedied.

At the conclusion of the discussion, a Board of Equalization composed of Preston Patton, A. B. McGill and Lewis Smith was named.

#### FIRE RATE INCREASE

Already the city has lost 10 per cent credit on its fire insurance rate, and stands to lose a great deal more on April 1 unless a lot of changes are made fast, according to the Department in Austin as revealed in a letter to Mayor Ivy.

The contents of the letter was discussed, and Mayor Ivy told those present that what the whole thing meant "was that the people of Rankin spent \$25,000 for fire insurance protection last year, and to get the same amount of insurance after April 1 would cost \$50,000."

Among the improvements needed in Rankin immediately in order that they will not be placed in the category of "unprotected city," is mainly an active Voluntary Fire Department with an attendance of at least 18 members at meetings twice a month.

At meetings recently, there has been only two or three present in addition to Fire Chief Herschel Shaw.

Several members present pledged their membership and attendance to the group, but more are needed to meet the requirements in order to avoid the penalty that will cost thousands of extra dollars to people who insure their property.

Also, the department needs more fire hose, and the city hopes to be able to secure it soon.

Fire plugs in the community are to be painted as soon as possible.

The Volunteer Fire Department will hold regular meetings on the first and third Mondays of each month, and interested persons are urged to join and attend these meetings. The meetings will be held at 6:30, and the members will meet at the City Hall.

With the completion of the discussion of the matters above, the meeting adjourned.

### Red Cross Drive Opens Here Next Wednesday

A kickoff breakfast next Wednesday morning, March 6, at the McCamey Lions Club Building, will open the Upton County Red Cross Drive, chairman Derwood Langston announced this week.

Kirby Dawkins heads the drive in McCamey, while Ralph Daugherty

will be in charge of the drive in Rankin.

The quota for Upton County this year is \$880, and Langston expressed hope that the quota would be filled by the end of the week.

The nation-wide drive will continue through the month of March.

### News Edge Phillips 62-60 To Win District Crown

After trailing the entire contest, the News Publishing Company put on a last minute scoring spree at Midland Wednesday night to take a 62-60 win over the Phillips Oilers of Odessa, along with the District TAF crown.

It was Ben Harris who tallied the winning basket with only 10 seconds remaining in the game.

At halftime, the Phillips team held a 38-31 lead.

The win over Phillips in the finals gave the News team the right to play in the State TAF Tournament which opens next Friday in Odessa. Pairings will be made early in the coming week.

In their other games in the District Tournament, the News cagers ran roughshod over two other opponents.

In the opening game last Friday night, the locals breezed past the previously undefeated Garden City team 111-55 in a high scoring contest. Glen Whittis led the scoring with 53 points.

The News won by forfeit from Western Plastic of Midland in the second round, and came back Monday night and trounced Holder Grocery of Odessa 102-45. Harris

led the scoring in the game with 33 points.

It marks the first time that the News team has won the District crown.

Player-manager C. C. Carll said that his club would be at full strength for the State Tournament, and that probably two more players would be added to the roster before filing next Monday.

### Upton County Tops Rotary Drilling

Rotary drilling operations in counties of the Odessa Empire continued at a high rate in the first half of February, the Reed Rolier Bit Co. survey shows.

A total of 757 rigs were running as of Feb. 15 compared to 766 Feb. 1 and only 535 a year ago.

Upton County held first place in the county breakdown with 123 rigs running while Lea County in SE New Mexico dropped six units from 125 to 119.

Midland jumped 12 rigs from 93 to 105. The fourth place county, Reagan, dropped 17 rigs from 65 to 48. Andrews County moved ahead of Ector with a two rig increase to 37. Ector dropped six from 42 to 36.

### Wilshire Gasoline Plant Plans Told

Construction has been started on a new gasoline plant in the Wilshire-Ellenburger field of Central West Upton County.

The new installation is a joint venture of the Wilshire Oil Co., Inc., and the Lone Star Gas Co. Foundations for the buildings have been poured and construction crews have begun the erection of steel frames of various buildings for the unit.

All materials for the plant are at the site or have been shipped from foundries or manufacturing plants.

Frank W. Lake of Midland, vice-president and director of Wilshire, said Saturday that the plant would be in operation early in May.

The Wilshire-Ellenburger Field was opened in May, 1951, and Lake thinks the gasoline plant will be finished before first birthday of the field.

The plant will process the gas produced in the field and will have a capacity of 50 million cub. ft. of wet gas per day.

### Poll Tax Breakdown By Boxes Revealed By Count This Week

A breakdown by boxes as to the voting strength over Upton County was made this week by Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector H. E. "Gene" Eckols.

With a record-breaking purchase of poll taxes, there has been much speculation as to the voting strength in the various boxes by interested parties.

The records revealed that there were 2,011 poll taxes paid and 66 exemptions issued for "unders."

Of the total voting strength, 647 reside in Voting Boxes 1, 2 and 3 located in Rankin and the east side of the county, and 1,430 in McCamey and the west side of the county.

The box polling the greatest voting strength has been changed from Box 6 in McCamey to Box 5 in McCamey.

### OZONA DEFEATS RANKIN, 29 TO 28, IN CAGE TILT HERE

Ozona, champions of Dist. 7-A, edged the Dist. 89-B Champion Rankin Red Devils in Rankin Tuesday in a practice game, 29-28.

In handing Rankin its fifth defeat in 29 games, Ozona came from behind a 22-16 third quarter deficit with Bailey sinking the winning point with less than 25 seconds to go.

Ozona led 6-4 at the first quarter and 13-12 at the intermission. Scott Hickman led the winner with 10 points and Norman Yocham tallied 8 for the losers.

Rankin plays Valentine in the first round of Region 8 tourney at Alpine Friday while Ozona tangles with Dimmitt in the regionals at Lubbock.

In a B game tonight, Rankin easily pushed to a 42-15 victory over Ozona with Virgil Trower showing the way with 16 points for the winners and Wayne Kuykendall leading the losers with seven points, all of his points being on free throws.
