California Holds Duo Wanted By Upton For Forgery And Passing

Sheriff H. E. "Gene" Eckols and deputy Bob Schlagal made a long trip to California to return two wanted men... but came back last weekend empty-handed.

Saturday, a week ago, Sheriff Eckols was notified that John E. Partridge and Kenneth N. Morrison had been arrested and were being held by authorities in Santa Monica, Calif., for Upton County.

The two men had signed waivers of extradition back to Texas to face charges of forgery, and passing a forged instrument. Upon learning this, the two Upton County officers left for California.

On arriving at Santa Monica, they learned that the two men had been identified in the "line up" as men that had robbed a filling station. On further questioning and checking, it was learned that the pair was connected with seven armed robberies in Santa Monica within a three-day period. Therefore, the Santa Monica authorities would not release the two men until the charges in that state had been settled. Upon final disposition, the two men will be held for Upton County authorities.

While at Santa Monica, Sheriff Eckols obtained statements from the two men relating their guilt to the charges filed in Upton County.

The two men admitted forging and passing eight checks in Rankin and McCamey for about \$800. Both worked and lived in Rankin prior to their disappearance and subsequent arrest in California.

Except for a "long trip out there and a long trip back," the two Upton officers saw "lots of water... too much of it" while enroute and in California.

Monday Final Day To Buy New License Plates

The final day to purchase license tags for cars and trucks without penalty is Monday, March 31, Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector H. E. "Gene" Eckols reminded owners of vehicles this week.

The sale of license tags has picked up considerably during the past week, but still a great number have not yet purchased their tags. All persons are urged to purchase their tags as early as possible in order to avoid the last-minute rush, and

the possibility of paying a penalty if not secured by April 1. A temporary office is open at Justice of the Peace, Precinct No. 3, across from Van Atta Freezer on Burleson Avenue, to serve McCamey and the surrounding area. Persons residing in and near Rankin may purchase their tags at the court house. Be sure to bring along your certificate of title and license receipt to avoid unnecessary delay, Eckols reminded.

'Beat The Rush' Have Your Car Inspected At Earliest Possible Time

AUSTIN.—Motorists are urged to have their motor vehicles safely inspected while there is a lull before the expected rush to inspection stations.

G. W. Busby, chief of the Motor Vehicle Inspection division of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said 2,400 inspection stations have been certified to and motorists in complying with the new state law, Sept. 6 is the final deadline for having all motor vehicles certified for safe driving.

Busby said the movement of vehicles to inspection stations is lagging, with only about 40,000 being inspected weekly. If a bottleneck is to be avoided before the deadline, he said, at least 100,000 vehicles a week will have to flow through the stations.

Requirements under the new safety law have been modified considerably following an anticipated rush to inspection stations when the law became effective a few months ago. Safety Department officials said many new inspection stations are being certified weekly to aid in avoiding another bottleneck.

"We earnestly hope that motorists will take advantage of the lull we are now having and avoid a last-minute rush in order to comply with the Sept. 6 deadline," Busby said.

Bell reminded patrons that, due to the move of equipment on Thursday, April 1, there would be no show in the present house on that date. The last picture to show in the present location will be on Monday, March 31.

In addition to the theatre, the new building will house two other businesses. Lowery and Workman Insurance will be located on the south office and a barber shop is to open in the north office.

H. Ford Taylor of San Angelo is owner of the building and theatre. G. T. Houston of San Angelo is the building contractor and in charge of construction on the building.

Mr. Bell extended a cordial invitation to the citizens of Rankin and the surrounding area to visit the new theatre on its opening, or any time thereafter.

**PRICE—QUALITY—SERVICE**

"Freedom to compete in price, quality and service is the underpinning of our whole structure of private enterprise."

That statement was made in a recent speech by the head of an American oil company. It is true of all commercial enterprise. And the industry he represents provides many a fine example of how this kind of competition works to the advantage of all.

To the majority of Americans, gasoline is most closely associated with the oil industry. In most family budgets, it is a larger item than any other petroleum product. So the price and quality of the gas we buy is a highly important matter.

A short time ago a study was made covering gasoline price and quality over many years. It was found that, measured by any yardstick of value—car performance, engine economy, ton-mileage, etc.—today's gas gives the user about 50 per cent greater value per gallon than the fuel available in 1925. Yet the price of gasoline—excluding taxes, which are totally beyond the industry's control—is about the same as it was then.

Even that understates the case. For when gas prices are compared to the prices of other commodities included in the Consumer's Price Index, the fuel is 34 per cent less expensive than it was a quarter of a century ago. And it is 67 per cent less expensive when measured by the average hourly pay of industrial workers.

This is one outstanding result of freedom to compete in price, quality and service. Thousands of others could be cited. And it helps to explain why our living standards are the wonder and envy of the world.

**THE HIGH COST OF BUREAUCRACY**

Bureaucracy is mighty costly—both in money, and in the influence it has on the economy of the nation.

The Office of Price Stabilization is a good illustration. It is costing the taxpayers about \$65,316,000 a year. On Jan. 1, there were more than 11,000 people on the payroll and no doubt the number has increased since.

All of this money and all of this labor is being expended for but one purpose—to interfere with the normal workings of the free market. This simply means that, in part, we are substituting a controlled economy for the established supply-and-demand economy.

Whether or not that is a workable way of holding prices down, or of obtaining any other desirable end, is a highly controversial matter. What is not controversial is that the free market has produced more benefits for more people than any other kind of market ever devised. In a free market, every producer of goods has to do everything he can think of to offer a better or more reasonably priced product than the other manufacturers in the same field. In a free market, every retailer has to try to offer a fickle and demanding public more inducements, of price, quality, service, or something else, than the store down the street and in the next town.

The retail store is the snowwindow of free enterprise. All the energies and abilities of America have gone into creating the wealth of necessities and luxuries that finally are offered to you by your retailer. This was the achievement of a free economy—not a dictated economy.

**The High Price Of Socialized Medicine**

Economic Intelligence, a publication of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, recently carried a significant little article on the cost of socialized medicine.

It quoted a British survey indicating that the total cost to the taxpayer there for the socialized national health service is only about 45 cents a person per week.

That seems cheap—on the surface. But, as Economic Intelligence pointed out, the average British factory worker earns 41 cents an hour. Therefore, the average cost of the service for a family of three requires 3.4 hours of work each week.

U. S. factory workers now average \$1.61 an hour. Assuming a proportionate real cost in this country for a compulsory insurance plan on the model advocated by the Administration, the bill would run to \$5.47 a week for the three-person family, or \$284.44 a year.

But that's only the beginning. In Britain, the present social security taxes pay less than one-ninth of the total cost of health service. All the rest of the bill for so-called "free" medical care is met by levying heavy excise taxes on articles ranging from beer to toothbrushes. The British citizen pays and pays, every day of his life.

As Economic Intelligence observed, "The old adage that you can't get something for nothing" seems still to be true. What has happened in England would happen here and—probably on a far greater scale—the American government has broken all records for waste and prodigality. Compulsory health insurance would dig deep into every pocket, directly and indirectly, and people of average means would be hit the hardest.

**REAL GRASS ROOTS**

The national trend toward Eisenhower for President had its start among the people. Among the beginnings of this grass-roots movement was a petition poll, asking like to run, taken of all the voters in the borough of Bryn Athyn, Montgomery County, Pa. He has shown genius in determining the time for important action, and calm courage in acting when the time has come. He has proved that he can discover and inspire whatever of goodwill and cooperation is in men's hearts and minds. He has revealed outstanding executive ability to lead, rather than compel, other men to work and act together for so much of a cause as they can agree upon and support in unity.

"His force of character is governed by patience—patience with which to await the appointed hour, the free cooperation of others, and the guidance of Almighty God.
