It is a view which is very widely held by seasoned observers of the American scene.

Rarely in history has an Administration come apart at the seams so swiftly as Mr. Truman's. Almost everything has contributed to it—the Korean stalemate, the tax scandals, the biting controversy over Mr. Acheson and the State De partment, the corruption in government issues, the Newbold Morris fiasco, the troubles within the cabinet and the dismissal of Attorney-General McGrath, the charges of communist influences in high places, and to cap the climax, the handling of the steel strike and the implications of political favoritism and corruption involved.

This is more than just a dramatic and startling political development. It poses great problems for the nation. As taking a chance that your policy Mr. Childs pointed out, decisions of the utmost importance will lapse. should be taken by the government. To quote him again, "The Russians are showing definite signs of wanting to try to settle the differences between West and East. Western strength is being rapidly eroded away in the Far East and period of the policy is about to exth eMiddle East. What about Formosa? The future of Chiang-Kai-shek and his Nationalist forces? The vastly expanded arms race in terms of weapons so fantastically destructive that most of us simply do not comprehend their true meaning for mankind?'

Few people now believe that the Truman administration will—or could—come solidly to grips with problems of the magnitude and urgency of these. The President has totally lost control of Congress. The major measures which would effect his so-called fair deal program languish in committee, and aren't even given the consideration of being brought to a vote. Congress, with its collective eye fixed firmly on the coming election, is marking time, and, as a general rule, doing only what cannot be postponed.






