





'Braceros' Not Under Social Security, Says **District Office Head**

Agricultural workers who are recruited and brought to the US from Mexico under contracts to do farm and ranch work are not covered by Social Security, accordng to Jack Calvert, manager of the Odessa office of the Social Security administration.

"There is some confusion among farm and ranch operators in this area as to whether or not 'braceros' are covered by Social Security," Calvert stated. "Under an amendment by Congress, the Social Security Act specifically excludes hose Mexican agricutural workers.'

These improvements are made necessary to take care of the oil which will flow through the new 24 inch line that is now under construction and which will be the property of the Rancho Pipe Line System.


The major new trunk pipeline is scheduled to be completed by December 1, 1952.






