**GRASS ROOTS OPINION**

"Our forefathers fought for the right to vote—but do we care much for that right today?" wrote Hugh Forster, chairman, Civic Committee, Lancaster, Pa. "Apparently we do not."

Mr. Forster then cited some facts which should make America ashamed of herself. In a recent election, 90 per cent of Belgium's eligible voters went to the polls. Almost as many eligible Italian voters cast ballots in the election that rebuffed Communism, and 82 per cent voted in the last British election. Other nations have comparable records. But only 51 per cent of eligible Americans voted in the Presidential election of 1948.

It's an easy alibi to say that just one vote doesn't matter, so why take the trouble to visit the polls. The fact is that one vote can be overwhelmingly important. Mr. Forster described cases where a very small number of votes made history. As an example, in 1884 James Blaine lost New York State by much less than one vote per precinct. Had he carried New York, he would have defeated Cleveland and become President.

Such exceptional cases to one side, every American freedom rides solely on the right of franchise. The secret ballot is the greatest defense against tyranny ever devised in the tangled history of mankind. No one who fails to vote can call himself a good citizen. He is, instead, a shirker of the most possible kind.

**Health Protection By State Costs Less Than Pack Of Cigarettes**

AUSTIN—How much is a year of health protection worth to you?

How much is it worth to you to have maintained a staff of experts to control flies, mosquitoes, rats, and disease-bearing vermin? How much is it worth to conduct those well child conferences and supervise immunization in your town?

How much is it worth to you to know that your food supply is protected and that it is fit for human consumption?

How much are the tuberculosis chest x-ray services, and the state's venereal disease control organization worth?

How much is it worth to insure that your city water supply isn't full of contamination? Those public health nurses who teach expectant mothers how to handle themselves and their new babies—what are their services worth to you as an individual?

Would you say all this is worth more per year than the cost of a single pack of cigarettes?

That's exactly what Texans are paying for health services today—20 cents a year per capita.

It isn't enough to pay for the sort of health protection State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox would like to see Texans have. Out of every tax dollar collected in this state, about one cent is spent on the protection of public health.

"Too much economy in health work is dangerous," the health official cautioned.

With the expenditure of 50 cents per capita, Texas could approach the national average in this country, Dr. Cox said. As things stand today, Texas is near the bottom among the states in the amount spent for health work.

"When you cripple a health department by fund-cutting, you end up with more—rather than less—expense. Money put into public health is repaid many times over in reduced sickness and lives saved," Dr. Cox said.

**MIDLAND AUCTION REPORT**

The cattle market was strong and active at Midland Livestock Auction sale Thursday, May 22. The run of 323 head was mostly stockers and prices generally were up \$1 to \$2 a hundred from the week before.

Fat calves and yearlings sold for \$31 to \$35, mediums \$26 to \$31, commons and culls \$23 to \$26. Good cows drew \$21.50 to \$24.50, mediums \$19 to \$21.50, canners and cutters \$14 to \$19, old shelly kinds lower.

Bulls, no good ones offered, sold at \$22 to \$24.

Stocker steer calves, most weighing 200 to 250 lbs., brought \$34 to \$38.50, heifer calves \$34 to \$37.50. Hereford cow and calf pairs sold for \$200 to \$260.

**'Braceros' Not Under Social Security, Says District Office Head**

Agricultural workers who are recruited and brought to the US from Mexico under contracts to do farm and ranch work are not covered by Social Security, according to Jack Calvert, manager of the Odessa office of the Social Security administration.

"There is some confusion among farm and ranch operators in this area as to whether or not 'braceros' are covered by Social Security," Calvert stated. "Under an amendment by Congress, the Social Security Act specifically excludes those Mexican agricultural workers."

This exclusion does not apply to non-citizens generally, but it applies only to those who do agricultural work under what is commonly called the "Bracero contract."

Other aliens who work for American employers are covered by the law the same as citizens of the U. S.

"Accordingly, farmers and ranchers who regularly employ these contract workers should not withhold security taxes from their wages, or report them on their quarterly tax returns," he said.

The nature of said suit being substantially as follows, to-wit: Suit for Divorce.

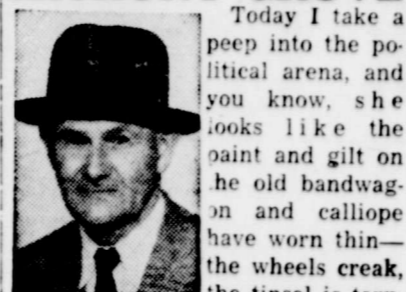

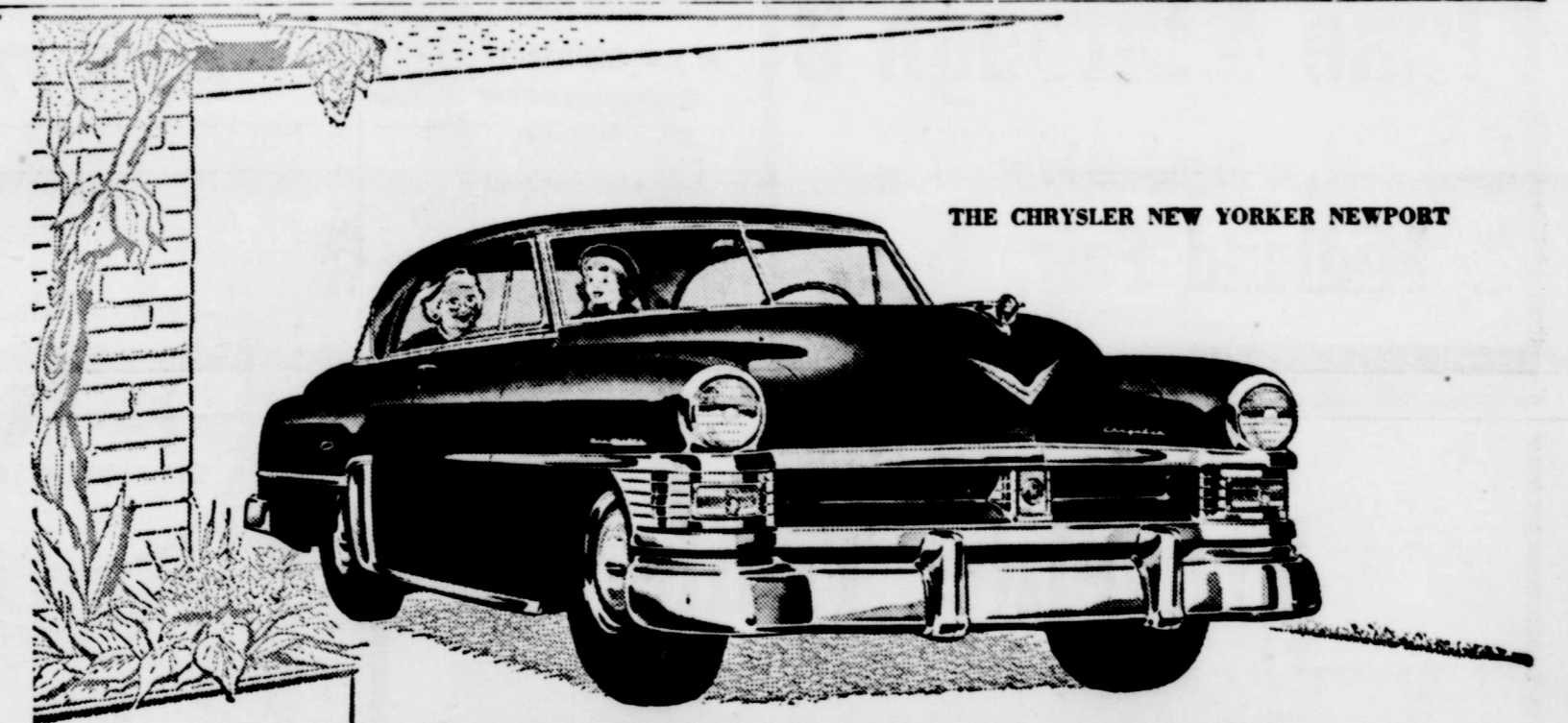

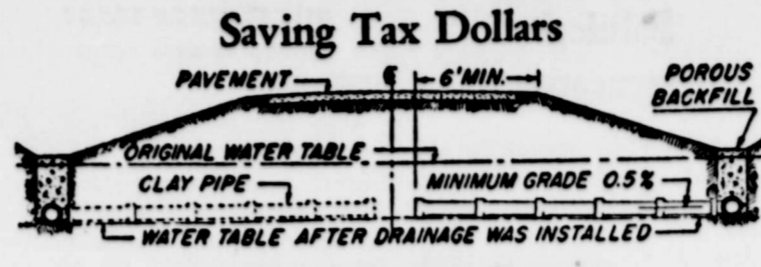
## Presidential Aspirant

One Mile of Clay Pipe Drainage May Save \$45,000 of Road Repairs



CLEVELAND, OHIO — It cost approximately \$45,000 to resurface one mile of 24-foot rural pavement. If the road must be completely reconstructed, this cost is tripled. The Sanitary Engineering Committee reports.

A good sub-grade drainage system is the ounce of prevention needed. Vitrified clay pipe is best for this purpose. It is readily available and is low in cost. It cannot rust, rot or soften, it has negligible absorption. It offers ample strength.
