





#### POLITICS AND POWER SHORTAGES

Officials of the Interior Department and other agencies of government are always forecasting that we are about to suffer severe electric power shortages in one section of the country or another. And the only way to avoid them and save our bacon, they argue, is to spend more millions and billions of our tax money for socialized electricity.

It is a fact that most of the shortages have never appeared—due to the amazing job the business-managed utilities have done in meeting record demand for service. But, regardless of that, the public should know that if and when we do suffer shortages, the blame can be laid squarely in the laps of socialist-minded politicians.

To take one example, an Idaho utility wants to develop a large amount of hydro-power on the Snake River. But it has not been able to go ahead, because it is being fought tooth and nail by those who want the government to do the job with a \$350,000,000 tax-built dam.

To take a second example, a group of New York utilities want to develop additional power to the Niagara River, at a cost of several hundreds of millions. These utilities have also been blocked—by those who want the development to be carried on either by New York State or the federal government.

Precisely the same thing has happened in California, Virginia and elsewhere, when private enterprise, financed with private money, has asked for the green light on projects which are needed, which would benefit farmer, manufacturer, domestic consumer and all others concerned — and which would create great new sources of taxation instead of endlessly swallowing taxes.

The expansion of the business-managed industry is unparalleled. Just ten years ago the industry's capacity was 37,000,000 kilowatts. By the end of 1954 it is scheduled to reach more than 32,000,000. And power actually costs less today than it did in 1942—which is true of almost no other service or commodity.

Power shortages? There is no earthly reason why we should have them—except for politics. And if we do have them, politics—socialist politics—will be the reason.

Thus the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776, indicted King George III, citing these 'tax-eaters' as one of the causes of the Revolution. 




