The first eight bales of cotton were received and ginned at the Paymaster Gin Wednesday. Darrell Warren brought in the first three bales in succession followed quickly by Fred Bonowsky who brought in the next three bales. Gano Brooks brought in one and Warren followed with another.

Approximately 100 pickers are in the fields now and the harvesting will get into full swing beginning Tuesday with the arrival of additional crews.

The extreme hot and dry weather has caused deterioration of the cotton crop in the irrigated farming area, seven miles south of McCamey, according to T. L. George, manager of the Paymaster Gin.

Acreage planted to cotton this year is 5,600 acres, compared to 6,400 last year. Eight hundred acres are planted to alfalfa with 300 acres to grain.

Watermelons and cantaloupes were very short and of a poor quality due to the drouth conditions.

Early in the spring it was thought that the acreage would be greatly increased but due to the slowing up of the irrigation wells and the hot weather, much of the new land was not planted.

With all the problems that the growers have faced, the 1952 crop is still expected to be an important factor in Me-Camey's fall business as the cotton begins to reach the gin.

MORE CATTLE COMING

The American Meat Institute reports that consumers will have the largest supply of beef in our history in 1953, if producers continue to build up their cattle herds as they have during the first six months of the year.

The nation's cattle population is expected to increase by 4,000,000 or 5,000,000 head and to reach a total of as much as 93.000,000 by the time the curtain comes down on 1952. During the first half of this year there was an eight per cent cut in cow slaughter, as a direct result of the herd building program, yet producers were able to market about five per cent more cattle than during the comparable period last year by offering a larger volume of steers and calves.

This is good news to a nation of hearty meat-eaters. Our meat consumption has been tending upward and we eat much more of it, on a per capita basis, than any other nation with a minor exception or two, such as Australia. Even so, experts in nutrition believe that our consumption should be greater still. Science has proven that beef and the other meats contribute very greatly to our mental and physical health. They create strength and stamina. They are of major benefit in aiding recovery from a long list of diseases—including some for which meatless diets were once prescribed, until medical discoveries proved the fallacy of that.

From the viewpoint of farmer and rancher, meat is one of the most valuable of all crops. It's good to know that we will have it in abundance.

During negotiations, one steel firm was reported ready to settle, but promptly withdrew this offer to stay aligned with the U.S. Steel forces.

No faction of labor had a chance to deal separately.

The big issue remains. When monopoly locks horns with monopoly, what happens to the rest of the country? Must the nation chance disaster?

In this particular case, settlement was reached by direct White House intervention. And as to be expected, the settlement was such that everybody won but the public. But obviously, it is pointed out, a system that re-quires a President to settle every serious economic dispute is a system that can easily head into a dictatorship.

The situation becomes even

more peculiar when it is fully realized what was done during the strike importing steel.

Plumbing supply houses all over the country were receiv-ing pipe made in France, Bel-

gium and other European nathat are receiving steel and steel equipment from the U. S. as a gift under the Marshall Plan and the MSA.

This importation of steel might point to a solution of the basic problem. Free competition in the U. S. market between domestically produced and foreign produced steel might be a check on the powers held by the financial and labor monopolies in American steel production.

Such a course might even check the big rise in steel prices awarded as the settlement of

However, through some strange arrangement, foreign steel prices will also jump.

Therefore, there appears only one solution to the problem. That solution will be the encouragement of more independent steel plants.

It is believed that strict enforcement of the nation's antitrust laws would result in not only more steel production cap-acity in this nation, but also a greater percentage of indepen-

dent production.

Free competition in the market place would then level off

That appears to be the blueprint of action that will be pursued by many Congressional leaders to avert such economic disasters in the future.

The plan doesn't call for revisions of labor laws, the setting up of new or different arbitration boards, or in any way bringing government into industrial disputes. The plan is merely to eliminate monopoly deadlocks by using the already existing anti-trust laws.
