Posters have been up in the post office for some time giving overseas deadline on mailing Christmas Nov. 25 given as the deadline on verseas airmail.

The limit per package on airmail send their boys a Christmas box.

Due to the increased volume of irmail around the holiday dead line, it is suggested that the military department, who are responsible for the movement of mail from the ports addressed (for example, APO, San Francisco), thru military post offices, may be compelled to direct this increased volme of mail to fast surface trans

Air letters will not be affected by the new temporary change.

In other words, if you were planning on waiting until Nov. 25 to send your son an airmail package with the expectation that it would be promptly flown to its destination, you will be disappointed. It may be flown to the port of address, but it will be delivered to a ship on reaching the coast, and the chances are that it will be late for Christmas.

So, the best step to take would be to mail that package now, don't wait until the last minute and hope for air transportation. Even though there is a 2 pound limit, everyone has the same idea, and enough 2 pound packages can congest air transportation.

Remember these simple rules: Mail early with the expectation that your package may have to go by boat after it reaches the coast, egardless of the airmail postage

Mail before Nov. 15 to insure it reaching it's destination before Christmas.

Pack securely, a package that rattles around in the box is a package that may not go far, not as far as you intend for it to.

Address correctly; buy a book of address labels and use them.
