

DETROIT-Vital research projects in Parke, Davis & Company laboratories are accelerated by a machine which overnight does work formerly taking a week. Called the autotechnicon, the device removes all water from animal tissues for microscopic examination to determine effects of experimental drugs.

An automatic timer transfers tissues to and from 12 separate baths of alcohol, zylene and paraffin, dehydrating the tissues and permeating them with paraffin. The tissues then are sliced into micro-thin sections of about 16/10,000ths of an inch.




