with many problems; however. I with many problems; however,
do not have the authority to take action on a large percentage of
these problems. In some instances the best the Governor can do is

proper department, or to advise the proper department, or to advise the
writer that the State cannot help them.
 The Governor has no cabinet. A
large number of the State officers are elected. Of course, numerous Board and Commission members
are appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the
wis Legislature. But in most cases the
statutes rather than the Governor will give these appointees detailed itstrnonciu ro
instructions about carrying on their
