

# An Open Letter To The Citizens Of Rankin (An Editorial)

The Rankin News has established a reputation for supportmoral obligation to our readers and the citizens of Rankin, but are fulfilling a selfish motive as well. We know that unless this city progresses and is prosperous that we have no first life this year when a Calfhopes of prospering.

This newspaper is just as vitally interested in an adequate water supply for Rankin as any other firm or individual in this community. The thought of empty faucets during the summer's heat is a veritable nightmare. We know that without water Rankin runs the risk of digression which would kill this newspaper as surely as it kills the town.

Therefore, no person can search the depths of his conscience and truthfully say that we are against water for Rankin. The only stand this newspaper is taking is against the method employed to secure water.

The Rankin News is-and always will be-on the opposite side of the fence on any proposition, originated in Rankin or elsewhere, which could result in greater harm than benefit for this community. From that standpoint we oppose this bond issue.

We recognize that the interests of the people of Rankin are closely related to the interests of the people of McCamev. Citizens of both towns are members of the same political body. We know, therefore, that the best interests of both towns can best be served only through joint efforts in cases where the entire county would be affected on a specific issue.

History of Upton County in recent years stands on its own merits proving the necessity of friendly relations and mutual cooperation between the two cities. The Constitution also says that bail may not be set in excessive amount. What is considered a reasonable amount depends largely upon the circumstances and the risk involved. Bail must be set high enough to assure the court and the state that the person will not run away, but will return and submit to trial on the date set. The judge usually will ask the prosecuting attorney for a recom-!




