Obviously the extra \$60 does not come about because the manufacturer sells at a loss.

Therefore, it appears public pays excessive prices for appliances to provide bonuses to a favored few huge outlets.

Manufacturers not liking system are powerless to do anything else. Big outlets will not handle their products preferential discount.

There are other practices FTC ould well investigate.

One is cooperative advertising. Although manufacturers usually pay half the cost of a dealers' advertising on their products there are reported instances of Big outlets getting entire amount paid by manufacturer, which is just another way of giving extra discounts to a favored retail outlet.

It appears FTC could find nany facts to justify a full scale hearing on selling practices in the appliance business.



#### **AREA RANCHERS** ATTEND DROUGHT **MEET IN ODESSA**

Ranchers from Pecos, Reeves, Tom Green, Upton, Andrews, Winkler, Midland, Crane, Ward, Reagan and Ector counties attended the Drouth Conference at the Lincoln Hotel in Odessa Friday, when Senator Spessard of Holland, Fla., a member of the Senate Agriculture Committee, and Department of Agriculture officials heard reports of the ranchers.

The ranchers told of cutting down on their herds until nothing was left but foundation stock.

Holland assured the men that the government would not leave the drouth-damaged ranchers to shift for themselves, but also said lessons, as the boom prices of the past two years definitely were over for now and would not be sup-

The complete absence of any possible natural grass here now remarked that this was a "grass" roots conference."

Regardless of federal aid, the ranchers know that only rains can clear up the problems of the farmers and ranchers in this drouth-stricken area.
