It is shown that the heat necessary to have a fire or explosion comes from many different sources. Among the sources are electric sparks, matches, cigarettes, heated wires and the like.

It is demonstrated that pressure inside vessels sometimes is built up so high that an explosion occurs. The value of safety valves and vents are shown. Once in awhile, as with steam boilers or even an "empty" oil drum, something happens to cause more pressure than a safety valve can take care of. Small-scale, but convincing explosions of this nature are made to occur.

#### Wolfcamp Oil Flow Logged In Upton

An Upton County wildcat, Hunt Oil Co. of Dallas 1 V. T. Amacker. located in 106-D-CCSD&RGNG, 131/2 miles northwest of Rankin, flowed oil at an estimated rate of 40 to 75 barrels hourly on a drillstem test in the lower Wolfcamp. The test was taken between 8,-844-8.933 feet, with tool open 30-

minutes. Gas surfaced in 3 min-

utes, mud in 10 minutes, oil in 13

minutes. The indicated discovery then flowed to pits for 17 minutes. Estimates of the flow ranged from 40 to 75 barrels per hour. After the tool was closed, the project unloaded oil to pits for 195 minutes. When it stopped unloading, operator recovered 2,700 feet of oil no water Flowing pressure was 3.125-3,400
