





He spoke today in connection with the January program, in cooperation with the Department of Public Safety. "Ice and snow on the high-

way increase stopping distances greatly," Col. Tilley said. "The safe driver takes proper precautions by adjusting his speed to conditions-and using tire chains.

"He doesn't guess-he knows he can stop in time to avoid an accident."

"Best results in reducing braking distance and preventing skids can be obtained," he said, with the reinforced type of tire chains (each link of the cross-chains is reinforced by projecting teeth or cleats). Such chains cut stopping distances about half.

"While regular chains are not as effective as the reinforced brows" above the headlights add to interiors and exteriors. Each body type on glare ice, they do provide good traction on snow and, to some extent, on ice." he said.




