

Excursion Taken

It was common practice in the old days of TPA conventions for the news-papermen to take an excursion after the meeting adjourned. They were known to travel as far as California, Mexico City, St. Louis, New Orleans, New Lesey, Deves and Chicago New Jersey, Denver, and Chicago of special trains.

In 1891 the group of bearded editors took a short trip only, traveling from Corsicans to San Antonio, as guests of the citizenry. From there they visited Rockport and Aranses Harbor, upon special invitation of Governor T. B. Wheeler.

Pleasure trips, such as these ex-cursions, are not on the agendas of the TPA conventions today. Meetings are devoted to business discussions and educational speeches. Very few trips are made. Those which are taken are usually to industrial plants, mili-tary establishments, newspaper offices and educational institutions.

Here's how to keep the lifeline flowing:

- 1. If there's a switch, turn it off to prevent sparking.
- 2. If no switch, disconnect at wall first. Grasp plug and pull straight.
- 3. If plug sticks, rock gently from side to side to loosen.
- 4. Disconnect from outlet each

- 5. When not in use keep in clean, dry, cool place.
- 6. Attached cords can be wrapped loosely around appliancebut only after it is cool.
- 7. Keep cords free of kinks knots, or sharp bands.






