Mail Route Sought Here Goes To Midland Carrier

Postal Department Failed To Get Details Before OK

Beginning June 1 the Post Office Department authorized the extension of the Star Route out of Midland to include the territory under consideration for a route out of the Rankin Post Office.

Around the first of the year, the Rankin office secured the required number of names on a petition to the Department asking that a rural mail route be established out of this office. The territory to be served would have been primarily the oil camps in the northern part of the county up to Midkiff. This petition was sent to Washington along with acting postmaster W. A. Adams' recommendation that such a route be established.

At about this same time a similar petition was circulated from Midland to extend the Star Route from Midkiff south to include all the territory up to and including the Texas Natural Gasoline Plant. This petition was granted on June 1.

MASONIC LODGE PLANS BUILDING CONSTRUCTION

Rankin Masonic Lodge announced this week that they are completing plans for the construction of a new building containing a lodge hall.

They have purchased property from W. A. "Doc" Hudson situated just south of the post office and have plans underway which will give them additional footage from an adjoining lot on which they plan to build. The structure will house the lodge hall and additional space for either offices or business locations. Exact size and specifications for the structure have not been worked out and will have to be cleared through higher channels of the organization prior to actual construction.

It is hoped that plans can be completed at an early date and construction of the building can be carried out soon. A new building in this location will improve the appearance of Rankin's main street as well as give good locations for business possibilities.

FLOOD CONTROL TRY-OUT UNDERWAY IN S. DRAW

Work has been completed on a project that is hoped will eliminate some of the flooding conditions in the draw running along the south part of town.

The county, in cooperation with the city, has taken bulldozers into the draw and pushed the brush and trash back from a wide section of the bottom. It was felt that this brush and trash were obstructing the flow of water and causing it to spread out into a much larger area than if it were free to flow through the draw.

If this limited experiment should prove successful, it will probably be carried out in greater detail at a later date.

Since a large number of the people covered by the route do most of their business in Rankin and have children in Rankin schools, the majority of them seemed to favor the route out of this office. There is also the fact that Star Route mail service is inferior to that given on a regular rural route and numerous complaints have already been heard from those using the service.

As soon as it was learned that the permit had been granted without any action being taken on the Rankin request, W. O. Adams sent in a letter of protest to the Postal Department. They replied that they did not understand that the two proposed routes conflicted and that the matter would be looked into. Adams stated that as long as there was any chance at all of getting the matter changed, he would be willing to do his best to secure such change. However, he emphasized that the people concerned could get results much quicker if they would let their desires on the matter be known and if they failed to make use of the Star Route.

At the present time, only a few of the people living in that area and getting their mail here in Rankin have transferred their addresses. This would also indicate that most of them would prefer a regular rural route. Final disposition of the matter will be determined largely by the attitude of the people who would prefer a rural route to the present Star Route.

THAT SOUNDS LOGICAL

Construction Underway On New Magnolia Station

Work is underway on a new Magnolia service station for Rankin.

Located at the former site of the old H. Wheeler service station, the new structure will be of latest design and will feature a complete line of Magnolia products.

Ellis Wilkerson, Magnolia distributor for Upton County, told the Rankin News that the company plans to have the station completed and in operation by October 14. However, should the highway construction, due to start shortly, interfere with that date, it might be some time later before opening of the new station.

Cost of the installation will be approximately \$28,000, with \$17,000 going into the building and driveways and \$11,000 to be spent on equipment. The building itself will be 48x24 feet with 165 foot frontage for convenient entrance.

Operators for the station have not been located at this time.

Construction is by Cecil Sullivan Construction Co. of McCamey.

WORK ON HIGHWAY 67 TO INCLUDE UPTON CO.

The 1955-1956 Consolidated Highway Program approval and release for planning operations was recently announced in Austin by the Texas Highway Commission. The purpose of the program is to set out specific projects on which construction is contemplated in order that engineering work, plan preparation and specifications may proceed and the right-of-way secured, according to R. L. Faltinson, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department in Pecos.

One of the projects in this area that was included in this program is listed below: Upton, Crockett and Pecos Counties, the widening of 18 bridges on U.S. 67 from the Reagan County Line to U.S. 290.

Mr. Faltinson stated that it was considered desirable to get this planning work underway in anticipation of funds that would be made available to the Highway Department for the construction of this program of work. He further stated that Sr. Res. Engr. J. W. Whitson would be in charge of the work in this area.

AUSTIN. — Texas is moving to clean up its insurance "mess".

A study of reform proposals has been scheduled by the Texas Legislative Council, with a special committee of legislators in charge of the projects. Other state agencies will participate.

A. W. Worthy, executive director of the council, said that Lieutenant Governor Ben Ramsey has written to all insurance companies operating in Texas, asking for their co-operation in the study.

Sixty insurance companies have failed in Texas since 1939, Worthy said. The council will look at the records of these companies to see why they went bankrupt.

Another aspect of the council's work will be to examine Texas' insurance laws and recommend changes "to assure a sound and stable insurance industry."

Yarborough's Charges

Ralph W. Yarborough, candidate for governor, charged that there had been "influence peddling" in connection with the insurance situation. Yarborough recommended:

"A complete investigation looking into retainers, bank accounts, expense accounts, income tax returns, and excessive personal expenditures of state government officials connected with insurance law administration in Texas."

Insurance News

Nearly everybody got into the insurance show. These included: Attorney General John Ben Sheppard, who recommended 29 changes in the state insurance laws, including state control over insurance company stock sales.

Chairman Garland A. Smith of the insurance commission, who denounced "blatant untruths and half-truths" in a Time Magazine article. Smith said the magazine was "joining with jealous big Eastern insurance companies in trying to smear the Texas insurance industry."

Good Business

Dr. John R. Stockton of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research says that a trade decline is over and recovery has started.

Business activity rose two per cent from March to April in Texas, Dr. Stockton found, representing "a recovery of approximately half of the decline from

January, 1953, and January, 1954."

This finding indicates, Dr. Stockton said, "that the decline in business, which has been underway since the spring of 1953, is approaching an end."

Lots of Roads

A construction program for 1955-56, costing about \$211 million, was announced by the state highway commission.

It was the largest program ever approved in Texas.

Involved in the construction of 2,663 miles of roads, but, said commission chairman E. H. Thornton, Jr., "it can only eliminate a minor per cent of the critical deficiencies of the (highway) system."

About \$43 million of the money will go for highways within cities. Thirty of the worst bridges will be repaired or replaced.

Political Scene

State political campaigns opened up, with principal interest in the governor's race.

There, the contenders are incumbent Allan Shivers; Ralph Yarborough, Austin attorney; and J. J. Holmes, Austin contractor.

Yarborough opened up with a speech in which he talked about "the need for integrity in state government and a sound program for the advancement of Texas."

Meanwhile, Austin political observers heard reports from the Rio Grande Valley that national CIO leaders are going all-out in an attempt to defeat Shivers. These reports said that the CIO has put up \$250,000 to finance Yarborough and already has 300 paid workers in the field campaigning against Shivers.

Holmes, who is beginning to step up his pace in the race, says "I'm not mad at anybody. I just want to be Governor of Texas."

Shivers' Race

Shivers, returning from Korea, said that the thing for Texans to do is to keep our government at home, and not turn it over to outsiders.

At a press conference, the governor said he expected some opposition from Democrats who supported Adlai Stevenson last time.

Shivers pointed out that he led the fight for Eisenhower because the Republican nominee saw eye-to-eye with him on the tidelands issue, whereas Stevenson thought the tidelands ought to belong to the federal government.

Since the return of the tidelands to Texas a year ago, Shivers said, this state has collected from them about \$32 million in mineral rights, and this money goes to the state school fund.

Lieutenant Governor

Opposing Ben Ramsey for lieutenant governor were State Representative George T. Hinson of Mineola and C. T. Johnson, Austin business man.

Hinson announced in favor of legislation which would require lobbyists to register with the state and force lawmakers to file a list of all the sources and the amount of their income.

Johnson plugged what he termed the need for "new men" to strengthen insurance laws for the protection of policyholders. Said Johnson: "It's interesting to see those who have been in a position for years and years to clean up the insurance mess suddenly get stirred up about it."

Brewster Starts

Campaigning for the re-election of Few Brewster, associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court, began with the appointment of Franklin Spears of San Antonio as campaign manager.

William B. Carsow, Austin lawyer, heads up a statewide campaign committee. Brewster is opposed by Robert B. Keenan of Gladewater and Alfred M. Scott of Austin.

Civil Appeals

I. N. Williams retired as associate justice of the Texarkana Court of Civil Appeals, and his place is being sought by Otto H. Atchley and Mat Davis.

Fourteen other judges on Texas civil appeals courts, up for re-election, are unopposed.

Executive Sessions

State executive committees of both the Democratic and Republican parties will meet here June 14 to prepare the July 24 first primary ballot and select sites for the September state conventions.

Republicans will choose a state chairman to succeed Alvin Lane, who resigned. George Sandlin of Austin has been chosen Democratic chairman, replacing Wallace Savage, who resigned to run for Congress.

Park Visitors

Four million people will visit Texas' parks this summer, says Gordon K. Shearer, executive director of the state parks board.

The number will be a record, biggest year heretofore having been 1952, when park visitors numbered 3,803,147. Various improvements have added to the attractiveness of the parks, Shearer said.

More Milk

Texas big dairy industry opened up a 30-day campaign, whooping it up about how much dairy products mean to the state's people.

Included in the program were guided tours through model dairy farms, speeches, menus on the newspaper food pages, exhibits, and advertising.

Formula for Grads

Note to June graduates: Do you want to succeed? If so, you must love work.

So says L. L. (Tex) Colbert, president of Chrysler Corporation, who addressed 1,300 in graduation exercises at the University of Texas.

Himself a Texas graduate—in 1925—Colbert said, "I believe that for most Americans there is a deep moral satisfaction in turning out a good job."

Duval Jury

In Duval County "the oppressed may take new hope," said Attorney General John Ben Sheppard.

His comment was made upon the appointment of a new jury commission and grand jury panel in the violent South Texas domain.

Insurance Scandal

Looks like the big news this week will outshine the political spotlight. Scene of the drama: The 98th District Court room in Austin.

Stars in the show: Public Relations Man John Van Cronkhite; Maurice Acers, executive assistant to Governor Shivers; Attorney General John Ben Sheppard; State Insurance Board Chairman Garland Smith; and Chief Insurance Examiner L. W. Blanchard.

The five were ordered to appear for the trial in connection with the state's suit for a permanent injunction against the operation of Lloyd's of North America.

Fraud is the charge against Lloyd's of North America. You can bet your bottom dollar that this case will echo and re-echo throughout the present political campaign.

I say "her" because up to a couple of weeks ago nobody was quite sure. But now "Blinky's" a mother—of two chicks!

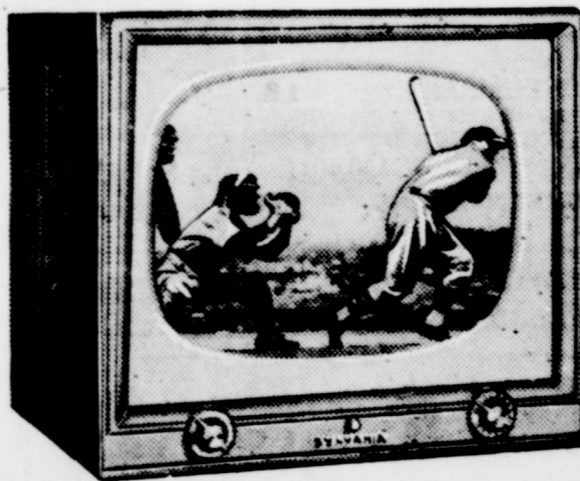

EVERLASTINGS
Do you have some flowers in bloom now and wish you could keep some of them for the dull winter days? You can!

Women in the home demonstration clubs this month have been learning how to preserve flowers for everlasting bouquets.

There are several methods of preserving the flowers which allows them to dry and at the same time preserve most of their original shape and color. The simplest method of drying is to cut the flowers at their prime, strip off the leaves, tie them in bunches of 6 to 12 depending on the

size of the flowers, and hang upside down in a dark place. A variation of this method is to hang each bunch of flowers in a paper sack before hanging to dry. This helps to exclude the light which is the chief enemy of color in the dried product. The sacks may then be hung in the dark attic, in the pantry or a clothes closet.

Flowers successfully dried by this method are: Bachelor button, blazing star, broom-weed blossom, cockscomb, dock, hydrangea, Joe-Pye-Weed, straw flowers, and purple thistle. It's fun to experiment with other flowers, also.

This is only the simplest method of preservation. Everything from the wild daisies to orchids can be preserved if the right
