

SHIVERS OPENS CAMPAIGN WITH RALLY AT LUFKIN

Governor Allan Shivers announced today that he will open his 1954 campaign with an old-fashioned political rally at Lufkin, his birthplace, on Monday evening, June 21st.

The Governor's opening address will be carried over a statewide radio broadcast from 8:30 to 9 p.m. Thirty-seven stations of the Texas State Network and the Texas Quality Network will carry the address.

With the formal opening of his campaign, the Governor will begin a series of trips throughout the state during which he will review the accomplishments of his administration and outline future improvements which are a part of his plans for a greater Texas.

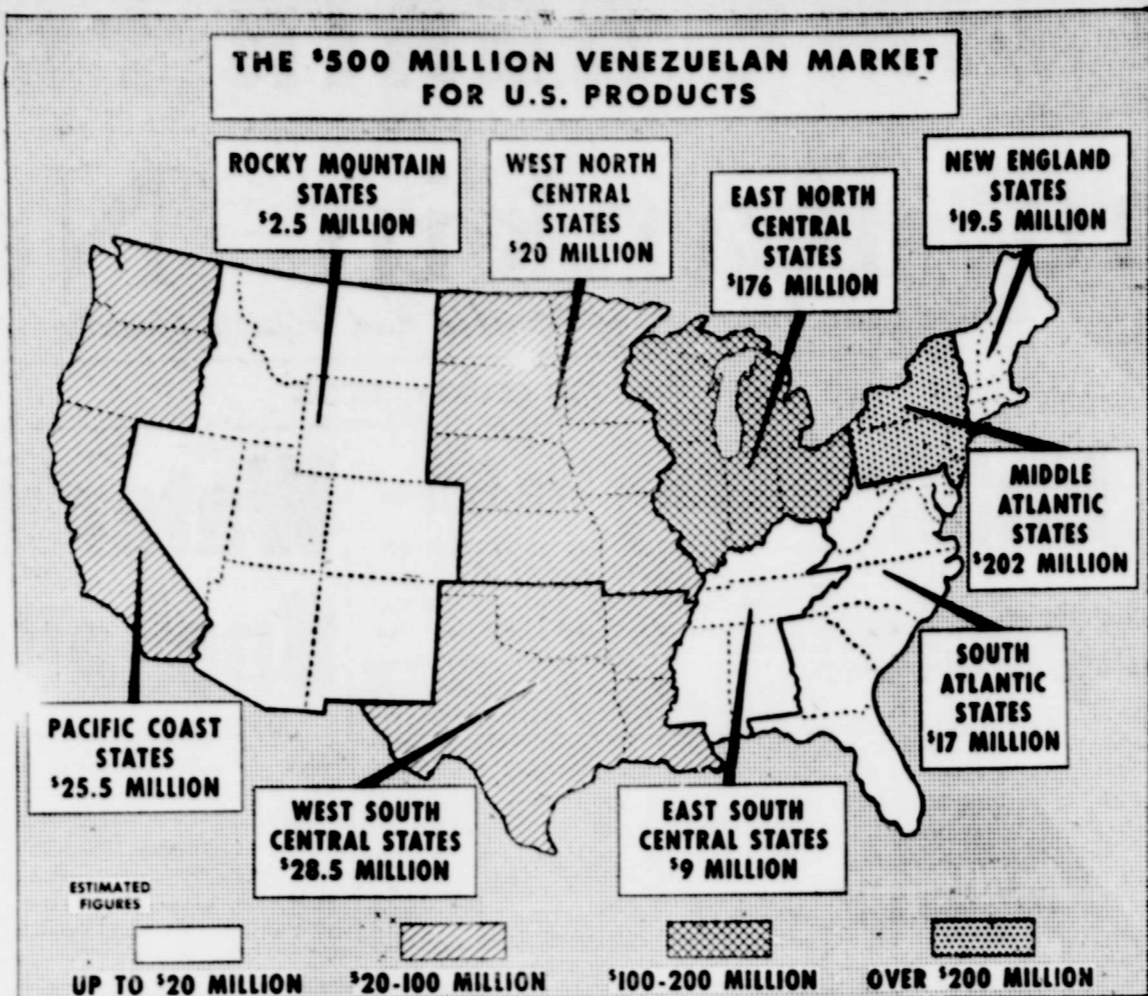

There are a number of reasons why we think that the All-Kid Rodeo is a fine thing. In the first place, the kids just naturally put on a better show than the grown-ups. They are trying all the time and some of them show real ability in the cowboying and cowgirling line. Another good thing that we can see in the show is the fact that it's good advertisement for Rankin. Almost every one of the good rodeos over Texas started out as just a little show just like this one has done. Through hard work

and civic backing, many of them today are the main attractions for their town. The Dublin Pre-Madison Square Garden Rodeo is one of the best in Texas and draws top riders every year. It was started by a handful of men and is now a big project with the whole town in on the deal. The Post Stampede and the Stanford Roundup are two others that have grown out of little shows. This being the only kid rodeo in this part of the country, there is no reason why it can't grow into a big thing and attract a large number of people to Rankin each year.

There are several things that could hinder the growth of the show and one is the size of the present arena. The seating was not nearly enough for last year's rodeo and promises to be only a drop in the bucket this year. There is one project that definitely needs some time and thought. Personally, we would like to see some group take on the job of getting the seating capacity enlarged. It would be the first step in making a bigger and better show out of the affair.

Speaking of projects, we heard one mentioned not long ago that had much merit to it but did not seem to meet with much response. R. L. Bell suggested to the Rankin Lions Club that the matter of building some sort of dam across one of the local draws and forming a lake be looked into. The matter was discussed and seemed to have the approval of most of those present but has never gone any further. This would be a very good project. It would not have to be a large undertaking but could still provide a fine place for outings for Rankin residents if it were handled properly. Stocked with fish and planted with a few trees, a lake would keep lots of money at home and at the same time, give folks a better opportunity to get out and enjoy themselves without having to drive a hundred or so miles. Several men have expressed the belief that the project could be worked out. About all that is needed is a little cooperation on the matter and there might be

AUSTIN. — Governor Allan Shivers will claim the political spotlight Monday.

The Lufkin-born chief executive formally opens his campaign for re-election in the city of his birth in the heart of East Texas on June 21.

It will be an old-fashioned political rally, reviving the personal-appearance type of campaign. Newspaper ads are being used to call statewide attention to his talk which will be on the air at 8:30 p.m.

Lufkin is also the home of Governor Shivers' campaign manager, Senator Otis Lock.

It was in nearby Woodville that Shivers received word in July of 1949 that he—then Lt. Governor—had become governor, with the sudden death of Governor Beauford Jester.

Shivers Busy Campaigning
 Governor Shivers is filling many speaking engagements over the state.

Kicking off his drive for campaign funds was a \$10 per plate luncheon in Dallas, attended by 800 persons.

In his off-the-cuff talk in Big D, Shivers said he would run on his record.

He branded the majority of his political enemies as persons who believe in a centralized government, subject to socialistic infiltration, as against the theory of local powers and States' rights.

"Perpetuity" Says Yarborough
 Judge Ralph Yarborough, Austin attorney who is campaigning against Shivers, got his own campaign into motion earlier, with stinging remarks about "perpetuity in office."

So far Yarborough has undertaken no statewide promotion.

The rest of the political front was much like the quiet that comes just before a tornado strikes.

Coke Returns
 However, political incidents of 1948 are being brought back to mind.

Coke Stevenson has returned to political life.

The former governor of Texas stepped into the limelight with an endorsement for Dudley T. Dougherty for U. S. Senator.

Dougherty seeks the seat occupied by Senator Lyndon Johnson who won over Stevenson by 57 votes, in a hotly contested race for the senate six years ago.

Stevenson will serve as chairman of the campaign steering committee for Dougherty.

He promised the voters a refresher course in Texas political history.

"This time," he said, "we can go into and reveal all the details about Box 13 in Jim Wells County, where on Friday after the primary a sleight of hand miracle occurred and 200 votes were added to the Johnson total."

Hammonds Confesses Insolvency
 Legally it's all over. But politically it will be an issue for months to come.

Ralph W. Hammonds has confessed that his Lloyd's of North America insurance company is insolvent.

With head bowed, the heavy-set one time University of Texas wrestling champion gave up defense of his company in 98th District Court after only three days of testimony.

The trial had been expected to last at least two weeks and was destined to produce explosive political testimony. . . as the subpoena list included Governor Shivers, his public relations chief John Van Cronkhite, Ralph Yarborough, and many others active in state politics.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING MOTOR VEHICLE TRAFFIC ON MAIN STREET IN THE TOWN OF RANKIN, IN UPTON COUNTY, TEXAS, MAKING IT A MISDEMEANOR TRUCK ON MAIN STREET AND PRESCRIBING PENALTY TO OPERATE A MOTOR VEHICLES.

ORDINANCE NO. 151

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE SPEED OF MOTOR VEHICLES IN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF RANKIN, TEXAS, MAKING IT A MISDEMEANOR TO DRIVE A MOTOR VEHICLE IN THE CORPORATE LIMITS IN EXCESS OF 20 MILES PER HOUR AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES.

ORDINANCE NO. 152

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING TRAFFIC, MAKING IT A MISDEMEANOR FOR ANY PERSON FAILING TO STOP IN ACCORDANCE WITH TRAFFIC LIGHTS OR STOP SIGNS IN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF RANKIN, TEXAS, AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES.

It was a victory for Attorney General John Ben Shepperd and Assistant Attorney General Rudy Rice, chief prosecutor for the state in the case.

Other Trials Delayed
 Criminal trials of four officials of defunct insurance companies have been postponed until October.

The four indicted men appeared before District Judge Charles O. Betts, asked and won continuance of their trials until the Fall term of court.

They are Paul and Leslie Lowry, D. H. O'Fiel—all of Beaumont—ans Spencer S. Treharne of El Paso.

Now defunct is the Texas Mutual Insurance Company of Beaumont, formerly operated by the Lowry brothers. O'Fiel is a Beaumont attorney. Treharne was operator of the inactive insurance firm of United Lloyd's.

Twenty-eight persons were subpoenaed to testify in the trials, including State Senator William T. Moore of Bryan, chairman of the senate insurance committee, who was an attorney for the Lowrys' Texas Mutual Company.

Scotfield Declared Innocent
 A federal jury has found Frank Scotfield innocent of charges that he violated the Hatch Act.

He was charged with soliciting and accepting funds for political purposes while serving as Collector of Internal Revenue.

During Scotfield's trial, 10 government witnesses testified that they had no knowledge that Scotfield had ever sold or received

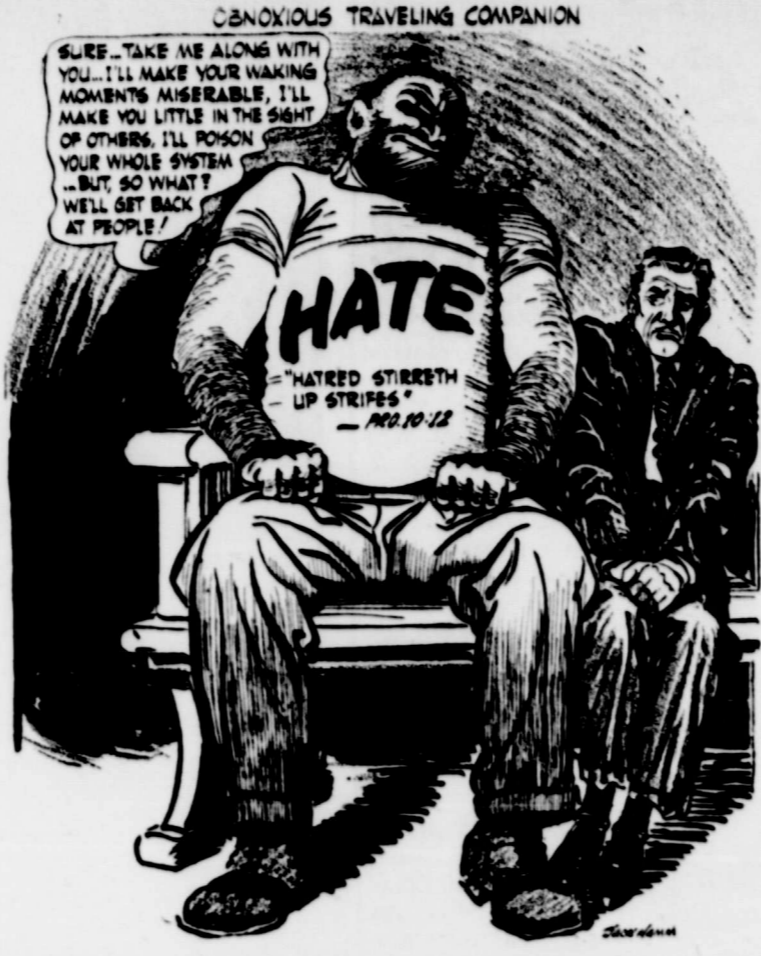

A friend, in introducing Ramsey, once remarked, "Ben has been more places and been seen by fewer people than any man in Texas public life."

The quiet campaigner for re-election as lieutenant governor formed his ideas about people and politics during his youth as the son of a district judge and farmer in Deep East Texas. He hasn't strayed.

Ramsey served eight years in the House of Representatives. He was appointed as secretary of state by the late Governor Beauford Jester and continued under Governor Allan Shivers until he resigned to make the race for lieutenant governor.

A man of few words, Ramsey is quick to act when a problem comes within the scope of his authority.

The lieutenant governor had announced strengthened insurance laws "to weed out the few parasites" as one of the planks of his platform for re-election several months before headlines spotlighted certain insurance operations.

Ramsey, who doesn't have a vote in the Senate except in case of a tie, does head the Legislative Council and Legislative Budget Board. They are the research arms of the Legislature.
