



KEN REGAN FINISHES POLITICAL CAMPAIGN

MIDLAND.-Congressman Ken Regan rounded the home stretch this week in his campaign for reelection to his fourth full term to Congress with emphasis on his "record of integrity and experience in Washington."

"I have always made my position clear on controversial questions," Congressman Regan said: "There has been no doubt about where I stand on any political issue. I have never put party politics above the welfare of West Texas and that of the nation.".

Regan continued to point to the experience gained during his seven years in Washington. He stressed the fact that he holds an important position on two major Congressional committees and that he has the "contacts, friends and know-how to get the job done in Washington."

He attacked the "do-nothing" record of his opponent, J. T. Rutherford, in the State Senate in Austin. In contrast, he called attention to his own record in the State Senate, where he said he was responsible for 70 out of the 700 bills passed.


"My opponent made many promises when running for the State Senate," Regan said at a Pecos political rally, "but he failed to follow through with the enactment of legislation of those promises."

Since his return from Washington to the 16th Congressional District to campaign, Regan has kept in daily touch with his Washington office and instructed his vote to be cast through live pairs on important legislation. He has campaigned in all of the district's 19 counties.

Regan stressed the varied duties of a Congressman, the committee work, contacts with varous bureaus and governmental offices, and explained that it was impossible for a Congressman "to stay constantly on the floor of the House and still get the job done for the district."

Regan charged that this country has been "buying the increasing contempt of the European people" and cited how the 35 per cent communistic vote in Italy in 1946 had grown to 45 per cent by 1952. He called for reduction of the national debt on which he said the country is paying over \$7 billion a year in



RELIGIOUS PROGRAM FOR STATE INSTITUTIONS STARTED BY SHIVERS

Texas, during Governor Shiv er's administration, has inaugurated one of the strongest religious programs for state institutions in the nation.

It began in 1950 when the State Hospital Board requested the National Council of Churches to make a survey of state institu tions to determine their religious an chaplaincy needs. At that time, chaplains were available to patients only about one day a week.

Today, full-time chaplains are on duty at key eleemosnary institutions and represent many faiths including Baptist, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Methodist, Nazarene and Disciple of Christ. During the past year, chaplaincy positions were authorized for Austin State Hospital, San Antonio State Hospital, Terrell State Hospital, East Texas Tuberculosis Hospital in Tyler, and San Antonio Tuberculosis Hospital.

The chaplains are trained in a Clinical Pastoral Training Center at Austin State Hospital. Five ordained clergymen and two graduate educators in the field of religion have served internship at the clinic.

A new religious training program has also been instituted at the State Orphans' Home, Corsicana, whereby the children can participate in religious activities of the various denominational churches there.
