Possibility Of Calling Paving

The fact that Rankin is at a very critical stage in its development was brought to the attention of the club by Joe Powell. After hearing a report from Powell, the club was unanimous in its reaction that there is definite needs in Rankin that must be filled if the town is to continue its growth.

Rankin is a town that has had a hard time getting to its present size. For a number of years it has been a town without enough water. This has hurt its reputation in West Texas just as it will hurt any town. Previously, people who moved to Rankin were discouraged to find that in the summer time particularly, there were often times when enough water could not be production increases in that part drawn to take a bath. It is not the intentions of the Rankin Lions Club to undertake any projects along these lines as just something for the club to be doing. It is their desire, working together as citizens who are interested in improving their hometown, to initiate pro. ple over there favor a paving grams that will see Rankin grow into as fine a town as there is in West Texas. It can be done. If Rankin is to keep pace with progress, it must be done.

We now have the water. That is, and has been, the number one project. It is true that the water system still needs improving This can be overcome in time. The important thing is that the water is here. Perhaps the next most important thing needed by any community is schools. These we also have-schools that are as fine as any in the state, staffed by well qualified teachers and ready to grow along with any future needs.

Among the things that must be done to encourage further growth is the paving needed. This project is usually carried out by the city with the property owners paying a share for their personal property. Here in Upton County we have a unique opportunity of getting this done on a county-wide basis which would greatly lessen the burden to the individual. By voting a countywide paving project, all necessary paving in the towns of the county and on the county roads could be spread out over the entire county with the results that individual taxes would be changed very little, if any. It is something that must be done. There is little need of putting it off.

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to require women to serve on juries."

Each voter shall cast his vote for or against such Constitutional Amendment either by marking out one of said clauses on the ballot and leaving the one expressing his vote, on the proposed Amendment, or by placing an "x" in an appropriate blank by the side of the clause on the ballot expressing his vote; this latter method to be used in all instances where voting machines are used: and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have notice of same published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.


