

But in the arid reaches of the western part of the United States, water is neither so common, nor is it always available.

When it rains in many places in the United States, the downpour is a mere inconvenience. But in desert country, rain is never an inconvenience; when it comes, it is one of God's greatest blessings.

Sometimes rain goes beyond a blessing; sometimes it comes all of a rush and then the rivulets swell into bank-high streams, and dry rivers turn into raging torrents.
