BLOOD DONORS STILL NEEDED

Blood donors are still needed for Mrs. J. D. Shipp, who has been confined to a San Angelo hospital in a serious condition for several weeks now.

In a telephone conversation with blood bank officials early this week, Dr. J. D. Gossett learned that donors will have to make the trip to San Angelo; that they will not be allowed to give blood here. He further learned that the hospital will make special arrangements for any group that would like to go to San Angelo, either at night, Saturday evenings or Sundays.

Any such group planning a trip for this purpose should contact Dr. Gossett and he will make all necessary arrangements. He also has forms available at his office for minors under 21 years of age. This form must be signed by the parents before the blood will be taken from the minor.

All blood not needed by Mrs. Shipp personally will be assigned to the San Angelo blood bank and the Shipp family will receive credit on their account for the amount given this way.

Rankin Planning for Paving, Curb & Gutter on 120 Blocks

\$500,000 Paving Bond Issue Said Nearing Petition Stage

After a series of meetings between the Rankin Lions Club, the McCamey Chamber of Commerce and interested individuals, an agreement was shaping up this week on the circulation of a petition calling for a \$500,000 bond election for paving.

These meetings have been going on for the past several weeks as representatives of the two towns have tried to work out their respective needs on the matter of paving. At the present time, both groups have agreed on what is needed with each town slated for approximately an equal share in

the proposed issue.

In Rankin, plans are being drawn for the paving of some 120 blocks of streets both within the city limits and adjacent areas. This program is planned to include curbing, gutter and paving of all unpaved streets, curbing and reworking of present paved streets and the possibility of topping on some of the lesser used thoroughfares. The latter streets, the ones to be topped, are the one leading north in front of the high school and the one going south toward the cemetery. The only other out-of-town paving under consideration

at the present time would be within the Halliburton Camp just west of the city limits.

It was emphasized by those working on the project that these plans are not definite and that changes might be made. Also additional paving might be laid should it be found that all the original amount was not needed to do the job as it is now planned.

In McCamey, there the situation is somewhat different and will be handled in another manner. There, all present paved streets that do not have curbs and gutter will be curbed and guttered and all unpaved streets will be topped. Property owners living along unpaved streets that are to be topped will be required to pay for their curbing. This is in McCamey only.

BREAKDOWN OF THE ISSUE

A more complete breakdown of the issue shows that Rankin will pave 120 blocks at an estimated cost of \$240,000 while McCamey will pave approximately 130 blocks, while adding curb and gutter to about the same number at an estimated cost of \$260,000 making a total of \$500,000 for the two towns.

In the similar issue called on this matter in 1953, an election calling for bonds totalling \$1,445,109 was defeated by a small margin.

Principal objection to this original issue was the fact that the cost was too high in accordance to what the tax payers were getting. By way of comparison, Rankin was to have gotten \$517,954 for paving of almost the same number of blocks as called for in the present issue under consideration.

Those connected with the matter stated this week that they felt the petition would be ready within a few days and that should the matter be carried through with the bonds being approved, actual work might be started in early May.

Rutabagas now are plentiful, the Extension specialist in consumer education reminds us. Their high Vitamin C or ascorbic acid content ranks them high in the root vegetable class.

Good quality rutabagas are smooth, plump, free from cracks and soft spots. They are heavily waxed before shipment to prevent ascorbic acid loss during shipment. This also helps prevent ascorbic acid loss during storage.

To get the most food value serve rutabagas raw. Cut them up in felly sticks or diced in combination salad. If they are cooked, the cooking water should be used as it contains valuable vitamins and minerals.

Highlights & Sidelights From Your State Capitol

AUSTIN, Tex. — Cigarettes and gasoline are to be the prime tax targets of the 54th Legislature.

In his message to the Legislature, at a joint Senate and House Session, Governor Allan Shivers put his finger on those two items as the answers to Texas' financial problem.

He suggested a two cent per gallon boost in gasoline taxes and a one cent per pack increase in the cigarette tax.

The former would add \$45 million to the highway fund and \$14.5 million to the school fund. The latter would bring in an additional \$16.5 million to the general fund.

Gasoline now carries a state tax of 4c per gallon. Cigarettes are taxed 4c per pack.

Also recommended by the governor was an increase to \$50 in the tuition charge made by state colleges to Texas students. Present fee is \$25, for Texas residents. The \$150 charge assessed out-of-state students would not be changed.

Shivers also asked for better water laws, insurance laws, crime and juvenile delinquency measures, and congressional and judicial redistricting.

Good quality rutabagas are smooth, plump, free from cracks and soft spots. They are heavily waxed before shipment to prevent ascorbic acid loss during shipment. This also helps prevent ascorbic acid loss during storage.

To get the most food value serve rutabagas raw. Cut them up in feli-sh sticks or diced in combination salad. If they are cooked, the cooking water should be used as it contains valuable vitamins and minerals.

AUSTIN, Tex. — Cigarettes and gasoline are to be the prime tax targets of the 54th Legislature.

In his message to the Legislature, at a joint Senate and House Session, Governor Allan Shivers put his finger on those two items as the answers to Texas' financial problem.

He suggested a two cent per gallon boost in gasoline taxes and a one cent per pack increase in the cigarette tax.

The former would add \$45 million to the highway fund and \$14.5 million to the school fund. The latter would bring in an additional \$16.5 million to the general fund.

Gasoline now carries a state tax of 4c per gallon. Cigarettes are taxed 4c per pack.

Also recommended by the governor was an increase to \$50 in the tuition charge made by state colleges to Texas students. Present fee is \$25, for Texas residents. The \$150 charge assessed out-of-state students would not be changed.

Shivers also asked for better water laws, insurance laws, crime and juvenile delinquency measures, and congressional and judicial redistricting.

**Horsehead
Park Nearing**

Editor's Note—The following article is a release from the Crane News and concerns a meeting held in that city last week on the matter of a state park at Horsehead Crossing. This meeting was attended by Ted Hogan and Bill Johnson representing Rankin.

Late Monday afternoon the Chamber of Commerce held a meeting of the committees for Horsehead Crossing and Castle Gap Park the Highway 51 committee and the officers and directors of the chamber, with about 30 men in attendance.

Introduced by Ken G. Spencer, Quinn was eloquent in his praise of the work of the young Crane County Chamber of Commerce and complimented them on the progress they have made in securing the designation of Horsehead Crossing and Castle Gap areas as a state park.

"I can tell you now that this is the beginning of something really wonderful. Our next step will be for our board to send to this area what we call our technical staff. They will make surveys and recommendations and report to the State Parks Board," Quinn told the men.

He went on to say, "I have often told the State Legislature that when they appropriate money for state parks they will have to appropriate less money for state penitentiaries." He concluded his speech by saying, "I will work with you in any way possible. You have a wonderful opportunity for a three-county park area. It will take time, this is just the beginning. Ten years is a short time when you are talking about state parks."

Ranger George Sholly of the Big Bend National Park, gave pertinent data on the park and mentioned its dedication some time this year when President Eisenhower will visit the park.

Sholly told the group that the Big Bend Park, in the last three years has averaged 80,000 tourists per year. These tourists travel an average of 400 miles to and from the park in 27,000 automobiles and cover an aggregate of 21,600,000 miles. They use 1,440,000 gallons of

gasoline and wear out tires in addition to 320 automobiles. This mass of tourists, 300,000 within the 400 miles, this being broken down for lodging, \$551,000 for 1000 for transportation, \$300,000 for miscellaneous disbursements.

Accompanying Ranger Pat Miller who presided the meeting.

Joe Cosby of the Crane County Wagon Gang praised the progress and spoke on the 51 project, of interest to Rankin and Odessa.

Pat Patterson, also present, spoke briefly on the project that is being developed in the area.

R. L. Faltinson, State District Engineer of Rankin County on the highway situation in the area and reported that a four mile stretch of road between field and Dryden need to be completed the paved road through that section.

Attending from Upton County were Jesse Russell and Annally of McCamey and Bill Johnson of Rankin.

Monetary Losses - Public Law 744, 83rd Congress

Public Law 744, 83rd Congress authorizes the Foreign Claims Settlement Commission to settle claims of American citizens and their heirs for their bank deposits and other credits in the United States which were taken by the Japanese government during WW II. All claims under this act must be filed not later than December 31, 1955. If any Service member should encounter a claimant, he should communicate with the Foreign Claims Settlement Commission, Washington, D. C.

Dependency Regulation Changes - Training

The VA has liberalized regulations covering effective dates of dependency changes in the Korea GI Bill and training allowances. Regulation now permits a claimant to increase the date of dependency change of entrance into training if the date is later than the date of dependency change. The new Regulation requires that the claimant must be received by the VA within 45 days after dependency change occurs or date of entrance into training—whichever is later. Proof to substantiate dependency must be furnished within one year.

Korea Casualties Put on List

The Defense Department of November gave a report listing U. S. battle casualties in Korea at 142,091.

The casualties included 33,629; Wounded, 103,319; captured or missing and to military control, 4,142; repatriation, 21; Missing, 1,000.

Of the 94 missing, 66 are reported as being alive. 9 Navy personnel but reported there "is a chance that 6 are alive."

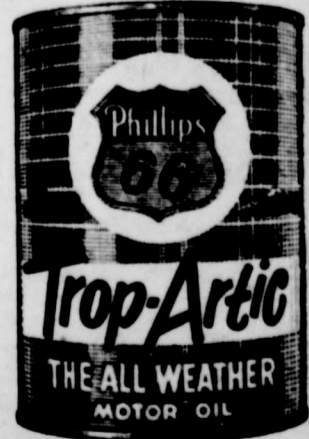
