## Oil Activity Increas: In Area West of Rat

-Pictured here are three shots taken of activities underway las week-end in the Amacker-Tippet field some 12 miles west of Rankin In the upper picture, workmen are preparing for drilling approximately 14 miles west of Rankin. (No mam, the man in the upper portion is not pulling off his clothes he's just removing one layer as the sun warms things up.)
In the second picture, the rig is approaching the location. Belonging to the Hunt Oil Co., moving of the huge machine without tearing it cown is being done by Rumbaugh, a company experienced in oilfield skidding of rigs.
In the bottom scene, the rig has reached its destination and workmen are preparing to set it over the exact spot to be drilled. Pulled by three large catapillers, the rig was moved from its last location to the new site, a distance of approximately $11 / 2$ miles, in about four hours
Scheduled to drill to an undetermined depth, the well is located approximately one mile off the Crane highway and brings oil activity in this part of the county a little closer to Rankin.

## AMACKER-TIPPETT ADDS STRAWN WELI

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It was finaled for a daily flowing potential of 259.82 barrels of 54.9 gravity oil. Production was through a ${ }^{1}$-inch choke and perforations between 9,675-9,685 feet, 9,708-9.714 feet, $9,720-24$ feet, and $9,534-9,739$ feet. Casing ( $51 / 2$-inch) is cemented at 9.863 feet, the total depth Gasoil ratio was $3,650-1$
Tubing pressure was $1,000-1,200$ pounds.
The project was from the Wolscamp completed in October for a daily flowing potential of 408.48 barrels of 42.8 gravity oil, with gasoil ratio of $930-1$. Production was through a 19-64-inch choke and perforations between $8,967-82$ feet and 8,992-9,018 feet.
