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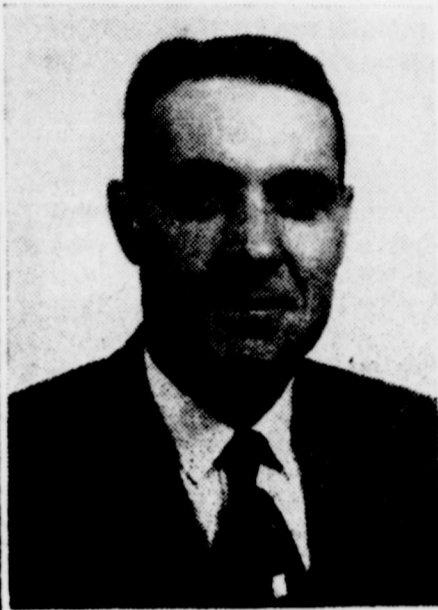

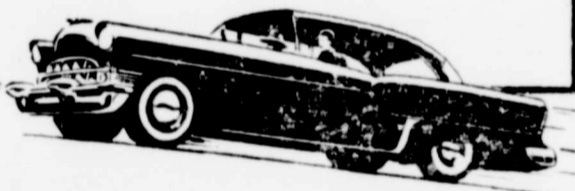

Defeat of the bond election proved to be a bitter pill for a large majority of Rankin folks last Saturday. Believed to be the largest percent of votes ever cast for any measure in Rankin, the election saw a record number turning out and some 96 percent casting their ballots in favor of the measure.

We personally still believe that Upton County lost several years progress by defeating the issue and as a one man delegation, we express our thanks to all who supported the measure. A special bouquet should go to the voters in Box 3 where, although only 5 votes were cast, they were all for the measure. These people did not live in Rankin and the paving probably would have not meant too much to them but they were progressive enough to want to see the county as a whole benefit.

To those who opposed the measure, we certainly respect their right to differ with our opinions, and we believe there were probably eleven people in these two precincts who had good reason to vote against the measure. It would be impossible to have anything that would work to the benefit of everyone.

As for the McCamey vote that defeated the measure, there is little use of throwing dead cats or crying over spilt milk. If those folks don't want paving, that is their business.

Up and down the sidewalks and over the coffee cups this week one hears a large number of Rankin people expressing the opinion that we should try for the paving on either a road district or precinct election. Perhaps this would be best. The voters in McCamey have indicated that they do not want the paving—the voters in Rankin have indicated that they do. A precinct vote ought to make everyone happy.

Food For Less

Dry milk is the least expensive on the local market and is excellent food. It can help families get their needed quota of milk at less cost. It's easy to carry home, easy to prepare and easy to store. Don't forget, however, to keep it tightly covered once it has been opened. Otherwise, it may develop off flavors and become lumpy.

It is not necessary to convert the milk when using in breads and other similar mixtures. Add the dry milk with the flour, meal, and so on, and then use water for the liquid. If whole milk is used in the baking, food value can be increased by adding up to two table-spoonsful of dried milk powder for each cup of flour used in the recipe. Is this way the product is greatly improved nutritionally with no harm done to flavor and texture. It may also be added to enrich ordinary milk.

Big-Time Farming

Water is gushing freely in the farming area south of McCamey this week. Due to the operation cost of irrigation pumps, water has long been a major financial obstacle in the local farm area. Last week, 61 irrigation wells were pumping freely on 20 farms in the area, powered by natural gas.

A giant natural gas line was laid from the main line of the Southern Union Gas Company running along Farm-Market Road 305, to and through the farming area. The project was completed last week at a cost of over \$100,000.00 by the Bakersfield Valley Cooperative Association and the Southern Union Gas Company.

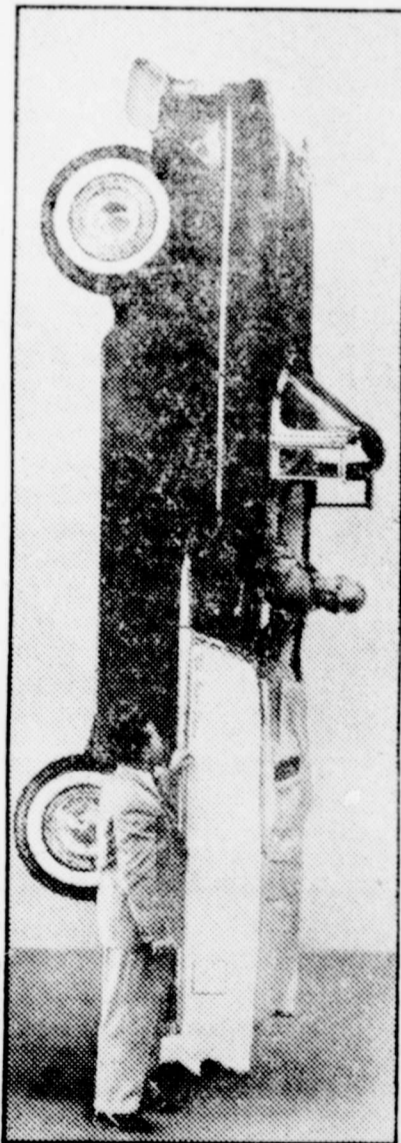

Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Tex.—Two big proposals for the state's water conservation program won in the Senate.

One is Sen. Dorsey Hardeman's \$100 million state bond issue for aid to local projects. It calls for a constitutional amendment vote in September. The other is an enabling bill to start operations if and when the amendment is passed.

House sponsors on this, and on the Parish \$200 million bond bill to aid local projects have delayed calling for final action. They don't think they have enough votes.

Tax Blank

An openly hostile revenue and taxation committee shunted R.T. Jerry Sadler's \$100 million-a-year tax processing bill to sub-committees.

It would levy a 1-cent tax on all Texas gasoline and repeal the 4-cent gas sales tax. Opponents said it would bring a 19-cent cut in crude oil prices, costing Texas \$190 million a year.

The committee left barred the two bills embodying Gov. Shivers' original tax program. It included a 2-cent hike in the 4-cent tax and a 1-cent hike in the 4-cent cigarette tax.

This continued last week's report that administration here had abandoned the two single-tax revenue bills and janned new hopes on Revenue Chairman Snow's multiple bill. It would permit increases in any of the 100-odd present taxes.

The billion and a half dollar House general appropriation bill (for two years) was passed by the Senate which substituted its own version.

When the House refused to concur in Senate changes, the way was opened for a joint conference committee to resolve the differences. Lieutenant Governor Ramsey has named five Senators to the Committee and House Speaker Jim

Lindsey live.

Delaying Action

Special session speculation again comes up.

Sen. Jimmy Phillips saw his filibuster record fall this week to Sen. Wayne Wagonseller.

Like Phillips, however, Wagonseller lost his battle. As soon as he stopped talking, the Senate tentatively approved the bus registration fee measure he was fighting.

When it was all over, weary Senators suddenly discovered the marathon talks had killed two full "House bill" periods in the Senate, with only one House bill passed in two weeks.

Observers say that with Shivers' "retire" program still hanging fire, and four more Wednesday filibusters in the Senate capable of killing all of it, a new switch in administration strategy might be possible.

Thought was that Governor Shivers might ask the Legislature to lay aside the tax bill and the appropriation whopper, and pass other legislation before theoretical adjournment May 11.

That would mean his calling a special session on taxes and the appropriation bill. Appropriations would be in effect Sept. 1 to keep the wheels of government turning. He would have control in a special session looking over.

Point Won

At 10:30 p.m. the Governor won his point on the bill regulating securities.

As the legislature headed for what looked like its worst jam in the final month of session, he made a firm request that the House adopt a Senate bill regulating securities, particularly bringing certain trust company stocks under state supervision.

"I hope the House will disregard frantic efforts of certain speculators, promoters and others... and vote final passage..." he said.

It did.

Land Case

Bascom Giles' legal troubles mounted when a group of San Antonio GIs filed a civil recovery suit in 83rd District Court.

Asking \$32,000 judgement against Giles, the veterans charged that he made that much in "personal profit" out of a veterans land deal.

At the latest court, Giles faced two criminal indictments, charging conspiracy to commit theft of state funds and accepting a bribe; four felony theft charges, and four civil recovery suits.

Twice Giles has refused to testify in court about the veterans land scandals and charges against him.

"Open Door" Bills

Attorney General Shepperd has expressed "deep hope that action will be taken on the Open Door to Good Government bills during this session of the Legislature."

Most of the bills have been reported favorably by House committees, he pointed out, but some still are being held for further committee study.

"They are sound, logical proposals to aid better government in Texas, to give the people a bigger voice and to more quickly reveal official wrong-doing," he said.

Shepperd referred to 13 bills dealing with full public disclosure of public records and funds. All

ton County 4-H Youths Eye Trophies Offered By Rutherford

Records are any indication County 4-H Club members set their caps for at least the trophies being offered by Congressman J. T. Rutherford.

Connection with the awards, following story has been relayed by the lawmaker:

Texas 4-H Club youths will compete for two large trophies donated by Congressman J. T. Rutherford of the Congressional District.

Five West Texas counties, from outside the territory, and comprising 4-H District, will be involved.

Plans call for the trophies standing 33 inches high, of which displaying the of-

ficial 4-H Club emblem, to be presented to the winners at an annual banquet.

Rutherford said he will not participate in selecting the winners, but will leave that to the County Agents, County Home Demonstration officials and other authorities.

The West Texas Congressman said a separate trophy will be awarded to the girl doing the outstanding, all-around work and to the boy accomplishing the same.

"As I understand it," Rutherford said, "the winner will be chosen for outstanding work in the Church, home, school and 4-H Clubs. The winner will actually be the outstanding young citizen, you might say, of his community. Of course, the 4-H stands for Heart, Hand, Head, and Health and all are im-

portant in constructive activities."

Rutherford said that with trophies for both the boys and girls, the two will not be forced to compete against each other.

The trophy will be placed on display in the county agent's office in the home county of the winner, who will receive an individual medal for permanent possession. If one county wins the award three times, though it does not have to be in succession, the trophy will be permanently retired to that county. Names of the winner, the year and county will be engraved each year.

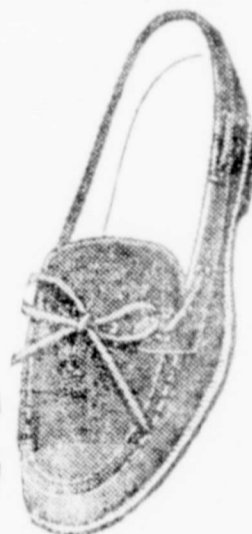
