





RULES CLARIFIED The Assistant Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission pointed out in a statement that persons fishing in private lakes or ponds that are land locked do NOT need a regular in-

dividual fishing license. He said the clarification was made because of numerous inquiries lately.

The Assistant Executive Secretary said the state law specifically exempts from license requirements private lakes or ponds which are NOT subject to overflow to or from a public stream. If the lake is subject to overflow from any public body of water, river or stream, state license requirements apply.

"The apparent intent of the law," he added, "is to permit persons with private lakes or ponds which are not restocked from contact with public waters to avail themselves of the fishing resources without necessity of the usual state fishing license.



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


