Adopted Budget Shows Increased Expenditures Expected By County In 56

Special session last night, August 16, the Upton County Commissioners' Court adopted the 1956 budget calling for a 56 percent increase in expenditures for the year over 1955.

The adoption of the budget increases the usual funds set for the county to \$1,031,706.83 with the addition of two new fire trucks

for Rankin and McCamey and considerable street improvements in the two towns.

A comparison of expenditures for the last two years as compared with the adopted new budget shows that in 1954 total expenditures were \$618,082.46; in 1955 (estimated) \$712,560.92 and in 1956 (adopted budget) \$770,962.41, an increase of \$58,401.49 over the estimated cost of operating the county in 1955.

RECEIPTS DECLINE

Comparing total receipts for 1954-55-56, the budget shows that a total of \$766,452.72 was received in 1954; \$780,814.84 in 1955 and an estimated \$742,104.19 in 1956 or a \$38,710.65 decline in revenue over the present year.

BALANCE SHOWS GAIN

Although expenditures will exceed income for 1956, 1955 income was greater than expenditures by \$68,253.92. Thus a total anticipated expenditures and balance for the end of 1956 has been set at \$1,031,706.83 or an increase of \$29,543.27 over 1955 which totaled (estimated) \$1,002,163.56. Total expenditures and balance for 1954 was \$839,431.18.

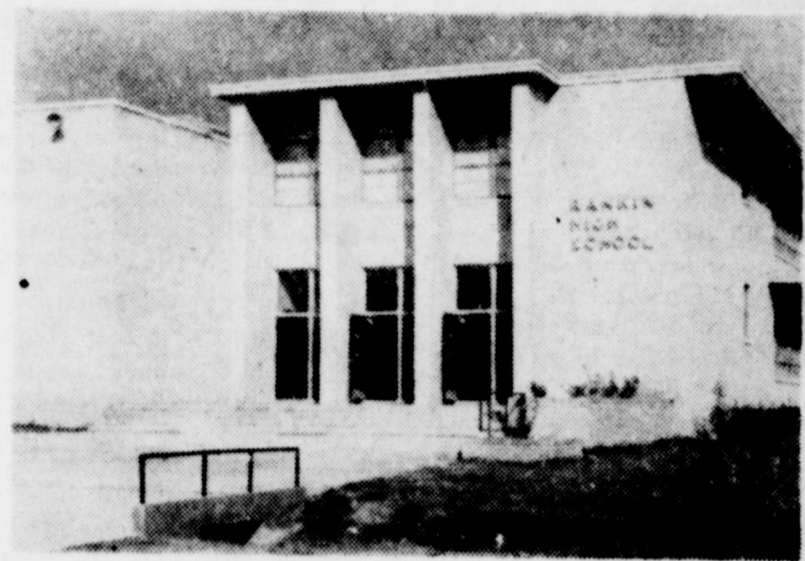

COMMISSIONERS CHANGE VOTING BOX LOCATIONS

In their meeting last Monday, August 15, members of the Upton County Commissioners Court voted to re-district the Commissioners' Precincts of the county as provided for by the Constitution and laws of the state.

A legal notice explaining this move and the exact steps taken is published in its entirety in this issue of the News.

As to how it will effect Rankin, there appears only two changes. Previously it has been necessary for residents of the Midkiff area, voting in Precinct 1, to drive all the way into Rankin to cast their vote. At the same time, voters at the Benedum Plan, voting in Precinct 2, have had a box at the Phillips Camp.

Changes made will be the elimination of the Benedum box in Precinct 2 with those voters now to come into Rankin to vote and the addition of a ballot box at Midkiff for the convenience of those voters. This will be known as Precinct 1, Box 3.

Specifications For New Fire Truck Submitted By City

Specifications that will eventually see Rankin with one of the most modern fire trucks on the market were submitted to the Commissioners' Court by the City Council this week. After consideration, the court will publish these specifications and ask for bids on the equipment. A similar procedure has been followed by the City of McCamey.

Total amount which the court has agreed to pay for the two trucks has been set at \$28,000 with an equal amount of the sum going to each town. Ownership of the trucks will be transferred to the cities. They will be responsible for their upkeep and operation and will be required, as agreed with the county, to answer all fire calls throughout the county.

A check of the specifications shows that some of the outstanding features of the new truck will be its extra equipment. All of the latest designs developed for efficient controlling of fires, the truck is to be equipped with two high pressure fog nozzles, a 500 gallon per minute booster unit that is at-

tachable to the present water lines, 500 gallon storage tanks on the truck, special equipment for operating the equipment while the truck is in motion such as fighting brush and grass fires, suction pumps for loading from tanks, ditches, etc., latest developed chemical extinguishers, numerous nozzles, hoses, etc.

When all connections are attached to the truck a total of 6 separate hoses can be operated at one time. This compares with only 2 on the present truck. Another special device that will be included is equipment whereby both trucks can be hooked together when fighting a fire, thus giving the older truck benefit of the high pressure pumps on the new machine.

Mayor A. E. Ivy has explained that the new fire truck meets in every detail state fire insurance requirements and would subject property owners to a possible slight decrease in their fire insurance.

"When we get the new truck and its equipment, Rankin will have as good fire protection as will be found," he added.

All those who were waiting for the boom that was to follow the finding of oil in the well just north of town can now pack their bed rolls and look for greener pastures—she was dry and dusty. As usual, there are still plenty of rumors a-

round as to just what was found in the hole—some say there is about 50 feet of Wolfcamp pay, others that they will come back later and re-enter the hole

Anyway, we lost one prospect and gained two more. If you drive out by the golf course, you can see the top of a new rig just to the east of town. A second location is to be drilled one mile east of the city limits by Porter Rankin.

Now I have already talked to a man who knows a man who is acquainted with one of the chaps who puts ice in the water out at the new rig and he says—or have you already heard that one.

While we're on the subject of speculation, there is several interesting possibilities in the future for this area. If the telephone people know what they are doing—and they have been in the business for some time now and have spent some 20 years on the present program they are developing, Texas is in the best location in the nation for future growth.

It is their findings that factories will be moving out of the New England and Eastern States within the next few years and that a large majority of them will be coming to Texas. They have spent millions of dollars on determining these findings and have set up the present telephone system throughout the U.S. and Canada with the assumption that they are right. We believe they are.

Now if these factories are going to move south, there ought to be at least one of some sort that would need a location such as we have here. Other towns in Texas have recently acquired such establishments—thus it is not impossible that Rankin might do the same.

Several towns that were about our same size 10 years ago are now as large as 20,000 and still growing—due to factories moving into their area.

The telephone company is not the only one who thinks Texas is in for large industrial expansion. Chambers of Commerce all over the state are working with that thought in mind, the Texas Press Association has advised their members that such is the case. They have also prepared a survey as to what a factory would mean to a community.

Here are their findings: For each 100 new factory workers in a rural community the following results will be seen:

296 more people, 112 more households, 51 more school children, 174 more workers, 4 more retail establishments, 107 more passenger cars registered, \$590,000 more personal income per year, \$360,000 more retail sales per year, and \$270,000 more bank deposits.

Sounds good but it would be our guess that we're going to have to do more than just sit and wait for the factory to move in. We're going to have to get something underway that will at least invite them.

Sonora and Ozona have both gained important new plants just recently, mostly because they organized themselves and went out after the establishments. Sonora even beat out San Angelo for the wool processing plant.

It can be done but it will take some doing.

This was the cost of putting jury-
men in air-conditioned hotel rooms.
One juror had become ill from
stifling courthouse dormitory heat,
threatening a mis-trial.

Plans for courthouse air condi-
tioning have since been initiated.

Water Mobilization Urged

Mobilization in a "battle for sur-
vival" against water shortage is
urged by State Senator Dorsey B.
Hardeman of San Angelo.

Hardeman heads the Texas Wa-
ter Resources Committee which
met last week to review water con-
servation action by the recent leg-
islature.

He recommended farm and bus-
iness interests and local leaders or-
ganize to make Texas water con-
scious.

Recommendations for future
government action will be in the
committee's biannual report Sept. 1.

Construction Record Set

Estimated value of construction
in Texas hit an all-time peak the
first half of 1955. It prompted pre-
diction for a new overall business
record this year from the Univer-
sity of Texas Bureau of Business
Research. Only a severe decline,
said bureau experts, could bring
down the average—11 per cent
higher than 1954.

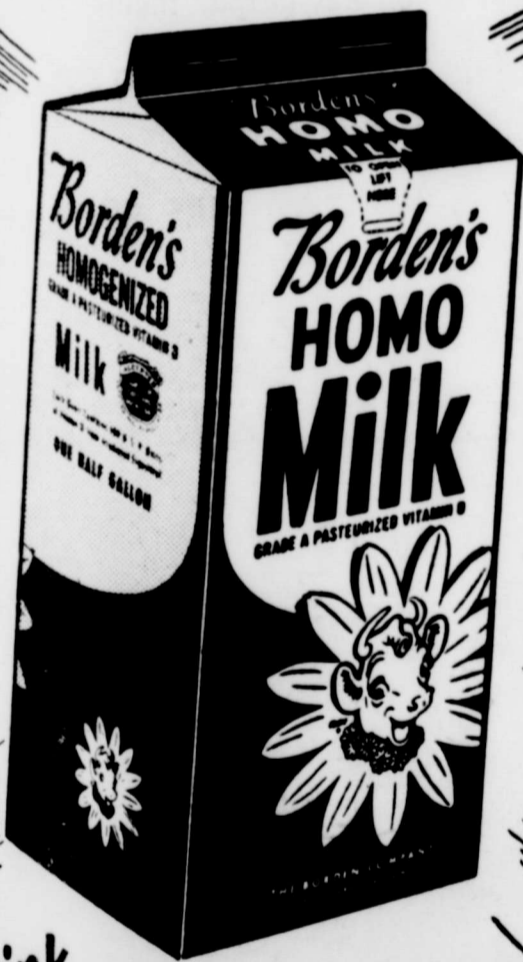

FAMOUS TEXANS' RECIPES

Pre-Planning Is Secret
To Margo's Late Suppers



Whether she's directing a play or whipping up an after-theatre beef casserole for the cast and friends, Margo Jones' personality dominates the scene.

Her effervescent quality causes Broadway to call her "the Dazzling Dynamo from Dallas" and fellow Texans to refer to her as "our own tornado".

But beneath the exterior "bubbles" lies a determined and serious nature. Margo Jones pioneered in founding a permanent professional repertory theatre dedicated to the staging of new plays and classics in 1947 when she established Theatre-in-the-Round in Dallas. Then the only one of its kind in America, Margo's theatre has set a pattern for other such theatres in metropolitan cities over the nation.

And Margo, a native of Livingston, Texas, sets other precedents with her after-theatre suppers where careful pre-planning makes hosting an easy and delightful adventure. Her Beef and Rice Casserole, to be included in the Texas Beef Council's "Famous Texans Recipe" book, is a good main dish for informal get-togethers late at night since much of the preparation can be done hours in advance. The final mixing and heating takes only about 30 minutes — minutes which can be

divided gracefully between kitchen and living room.

BEEF AND RICE CASSEROLE
(Yields 6)

- 2 pounds ground beef
- 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- salt and pepper to taste
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup uncooked rice
- 1 1/2 cups tomato juice or tomato sauce
- 1/2 cup grated American cheese

Advance preparation: season ground beef with garlic salt, salt and pepper; brown. Sauté onions lightly; add to meat. Set mixture in refrigerator. Boil, drain, cool and set rice aside separately.

After the show, to speed the cooking process, pre-heat the meat mixture in a heavy skillet over low heat before mixing in the cooked rice and adding liquid.

"Do not mix the entire casserole in advance because the rice will absorb the moisture of the tomato juice or sauce and dry out the finished dish," Margo warns.

"Pour the well moistened mixture into a casserole, cover with grated cheese and pop into hot (450°) oven until bubbling. Serve it piping hot with tossed green salad and French bread and fruit for dessert," she advises.

"If this sounds pretty heavy for after-theatre eating, remember that midnight to actors is equivalent to the 6 p.m. dinner hour for folks who work daytime schedules, and we're ready for a hearty meal," the talented theatre director, author and lecturer concluded.

New School Year Shows Increased Enrollments

After almost a decade of struggle the warborn school problem is still with us. In some areas there has been improvement. In other areas crises impend. Here is this year's outlook:

Faster than facilities can be built or teachers trained, prospective pupils arrive—in fact a new baby is born every eight seconds. That is the nub of the school problem. This year the added load on the elementary schools will be 1,200,000 over last year's enrollment.

In many parts of the country instruction will be on a make-do basis. Close to 1,000,000 grade schoolers will get only half-day educations. Most of the others will sit in crowded schoolrooms—nearly two out of three in classes larger than the desirable size, which is 30 pupils. About 35,000 school houses are still antiquated, one-teacher buildings.

New teachers going into grade schools, while generally well trained, are hardly numerous enough to replace those who quit teaching last year. Only a few thousand extras are available to handle the new pupils and to replace temporary teachers.

To get more teachers, more college graduates with teaching degrees must be induced into the schools. Only 79 percent of trained elementary teachers and 56 percent of trained high school teachers now actually take teaching jobs. Another approach is to inveigle former teachers to come back to the classrooms.

Although 60,000 new schoolrooms have been added, the country needs more than this number each year for at least the next five years, or the "gain" will be quickly wiped out.

High schools will feel the first pressures of heavy enrollments this year, when 250,000 additional students register. Spectacular increases in enrollments will come in another two or three years. But teach-

er supply is way down. Trained high school teachers graduating from college this year are 41 percent fewer than in 1950.

The main need for curing our

school problem is money. For every new pupil in public school, taxpayers must shell out an average of \$250.62 for current expenses and \$80.52 for buildings, books, etc. As more teachers are added and more schools built, the figures will keep rising. As for colleges, half now operate in the red. Tuition fees at many schools are sky high (as much as \$1,300 a year.) Corporations gave \$70,000,000 last year to help out, but high tuition and donations aren't enough.

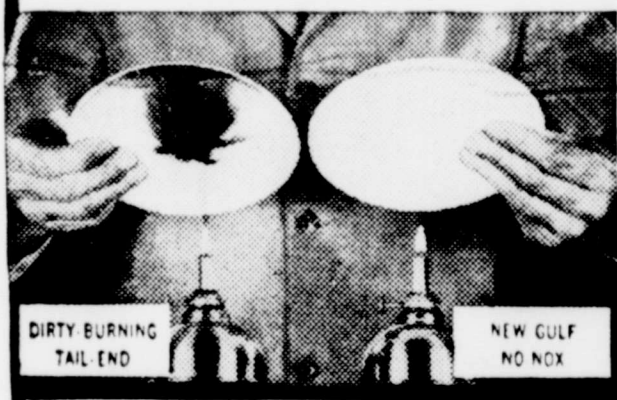
