

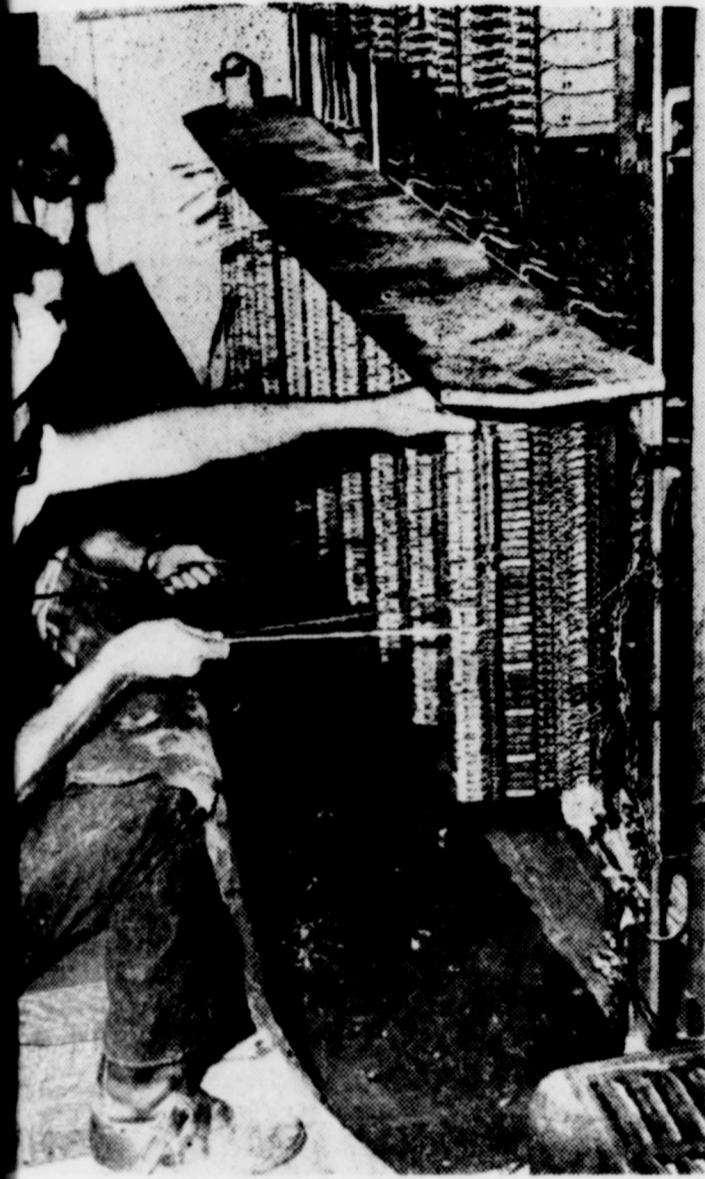

OUT WITH THE OLD — IN WITH THE NEW

Pictures made earlier in the month during Rankin's switchover from the old style switch board to the new dial systems show workmen on the left as they are "yanking out" the plugs that connected the new system and put an end forever to "number please."

First call ever to be made on the new system is shown on the right as Mayor A. E. Ivy, along with Bell Telephone officials, places a long distance call to Allen Moore in Yellowstone National Park in Wyoming. Ivy inquired as to the condition of Butch Moore and was told that he was doing well.

Numerous high officials of the telephone company were on hand for the occasion which tied Rankin into a system that will eventually cover the entire United States and Canada. Dial telephones now in use in Rankin will be the same as those used in New York City and will have the same amount of numbers.

In checking around with users of the new system this week the News found that most of the folks had become pretty "sot in their ways" about the old system of picking up the receiver and asking the opera-



tor to ring the corner drug store. Several have said that they were having trouble with the new phones and particularly just after a rain shower. It is reported that almost all the lines into the area surrounding Rankin give trouble

when it rains.

However, telephone officials have explained that some trouble is to be expected with a new system and that they are working as rapidly as possible on "getting out the bugs."

FLAT ROCK WILDCAT TO START AUGUST 24

Wildcats were scheduled Tuesday in Upton, Stonewall and Crockett Counties. Outposts were scheduled in Stonewall and Dawson.

Magnolia Petroleum Co. has filed application to drill a 12,000-foot rotary wildcat in Upton County, three miles northwest of the Flat Rock multipay field 2 1/2 miles southwest of the Benedum (Spraberry) field and six miles northeast of Rankin. It will be drilled as the No. 1-I University of Texas.

Operations will begin Aug. 24. Location, on a 329.85-acre lease, is 660 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 15-3-University.

And on the matter of boosting Rankin, we must pass on this little bit of information on an actual happening.

We were down at the grocery store last week and heard a woman say that she had just returned from San Angelo where she had been shopping for school clothes for her boys. Said she couldn't

find a thing she wanted and had come back to Rankin and bought her needs. She said that she bought the same boys shirts here in Rankin for less than they were asking in some of the "big" stores in Angelo.

We've said it before and we say it again — you can buy just as cheaply right here at home as you can anywhere.

AND MR. MERCHANT — don't tell me that advertising doesn't pay. Those people had gone to San Angelo because they had been reading newspaper advertising with glowing details of the many bargains to be found in the city stores. Merchants in the big towns have long realized the value of newspaper advertising and have been using it with the results that almost everyone now believes that the best prices are found only at the larger towns—'taint so but we can't say that we blame the folks for going—they weren't told that prices are cheaper here at home. Gentlemen, it takes a little advertising in the Rankin News to get the message over—and it has to be constant, just like the "big boys."

Big news this week is the fact that an addition is going to be built onto the library at the park building. Good. If anything should be expanded, it ought to be a library where good books can be kept that tell the story of America and our way of life as well as providing many other worthwhile facts, stories, and such. The Commissioners' Court meets in a room that makes it necessary for folks to stand against the wall when there is more than a dozen or so present for a hearing. If it is a big hearing, they have to move up to the court room.

Workers in the Sheriff, Tax-Assessor-Collector's office have to turn sideways to pass one another with the room literally jammed with files, desks, etc. Of all the offices, this one is among the most important with the tax rolls, licenses sales, etc., and is without a doubt the most overcrowded.

Important tax files and other information cannot be stored properly. They should be housed in a fireproof room with a safe door on the front similar to the county clerk's office but such can hardly be done with the present limited space.

As for the Sheriff's office, it probably was built for a coat room but now has a desk, a radio, a hat

Whether a special session of the legislature is called for school integration depends on a Texas Supreme Court decision still to come. The anti-integration Texas Council in a district court suit in Spring, the suit seeks return of state funds to dis-

Atty. Gen. John Ben Sheppard says the court decision holds the key to whether Texas laws must be changed immediately or already integrated schools must back-track. Decision by the district court can be carried directly to the Supreme Court and possibly be settled by the time school starts.

Should the court hold payment to integrated schools can be made under existing laws, there apparently would be no urgent need to change them, at least in that regard.

Sheppard said he welcomed the Big Spring suit since it promises to clear up the difficult legal situation.

Gov. Allan Shivers says he will call a special session "if necessary". He apparently was awaiting three developments:

He asked his newly formed citizens' advisory council on school integration to investigate and report to him on several questions, including the need of a special session.

He asked Sheppard to prepare

an official ruling on legal questions. And the decision in the Big Spring court case may set up conditions to determine need of the session.

In July the Board of Education voted to continue regular payments to local districts, whether segregated or not. It left racial policy up to local officials.

Since then, some 30 districts have announced whole or partial desegregation plans.

A University of Texas student committee also has taken on the segregation problem with a poll of student opinion on acceptance of Negro students outside the classroom. Graduate courses have been open to Negroes since 1950. Regents have ordered full desegregation in Sept. 1956.

KKK TALK CHALLENGED

Atty. Gen. Sheppard's claim that efforts are underway in Texas to revive the Klu Klux Klan brought a challenge last week.

Sen. Jimmy Phillips called on Sheppard to name names, but

Sheppard declined. Names will be given prosecutors and grand juries when sufficient evidence is gathered for convictions, Sheppard said.

State Senator Killed

Death of State Sen. Wayne W. Wagonseller of Bowie cost Texas liberals one of their leaders.

Wagonseller, killed in a three-car collision in Ft. Worth, was buried last week in the State Cemetery at Austin with full military honors. Services were held earlier in the Senate Chamber.

A World War II veteran, he served two terms in the House before beginning his Senate career in 1951. Friends in Tyler recently had boomed him as a candidate for attorney general. He had been associated with Loyalist Democrats and had supported Ralph Yarborough in the latter's two unsuccessful races for governor.

Giles Pleads Guilty

One of the biggest news breaks of last week was Bascom Giles' plea of guilty in criminal district court at San Antonio on two charges in connection with a Bexar

County block land deal.

Giles' guilty plea concerned charges of consenting to accept a \$30,000 bribe. He pleaded not guilty to a third count, of accepting the bribe. The state waived this charge and Judge Buck Jones imposed a six-year prison sentence. It is to run concurrently with a 3-year sentence given Giles earlier at Austin on a charge of theft of \$6,800 from the veterans land fund.

Giles has appealed the case, which affords at least 90 days' delay in final disposition of the sentence.

Awaiting suits now pending against the former land commissioner are a civil suit at San Antonio, seeking recovery of \$35,000 and nine additional charges in Austin, on other transactions. He also faces trial in Zavala County on another land case.

Stevenson Reply Awaited

Adlai Stevenson is slated to speak in Austin on Sept. 28. At that time he may reply to Gov. Allan Shivers' repeated refusal to support him for president.

During the national governor's conference in Chicago, Shivers said he would again, as in 1952, refuse to support Stevenson if he were Democratic candidate for president.

Stevenson withheld comment "until I am in Texas." Shivers, he pointed out, was a "guest in Illinois."

Stevenson's Austin appearance was arranged by the University of Texas great issues committee. It is billed as "non-political". Subject of his talk will be "America, the Economic Colossus."

Too Much Money

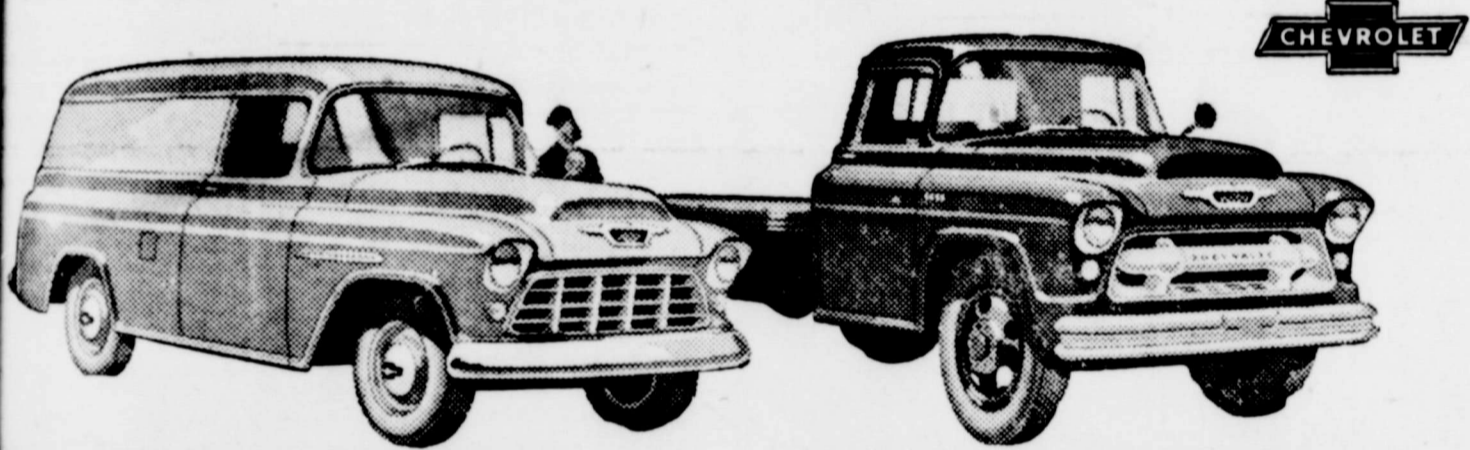
Overpayment of drivers license fees has created a problem for the Department of Public Safety.

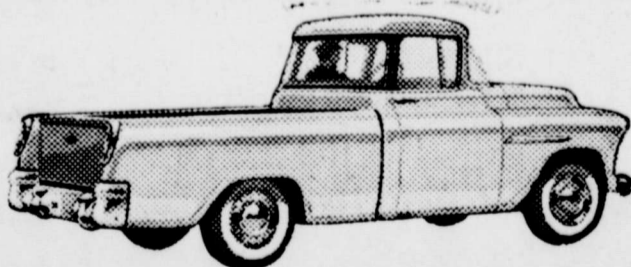
