### New Law Puts Stiff Fines On Liquor At Game

It will cost anyone caught with intoxicating beverages in their possession on the football field this season.

A new law passed by the Legislature states in part: "It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to bring or carry into any enclosure, field or stadium, where athletic events, sponsored or participated in by the public schools of this State, are being held, any intoxicating beverages or to have any intoxicating beverages in his possession while in or on said enclosure, field or stadium."

The law provided that the penalty shall be a fine of not less than \$25 or not more than \$200.

In a letter to Superintendents of Schools in Upton County, Steve Preslar, county attorney, has pointed out that this is a new law and one that should be called to everyone's attention. He further pointed out that a person does not have to be drinking to be subject to fine. Just having it in his possession, either on his person or in his car, will be a violation. He also stressed that "within the enclosure" means that it cannot be taken past the gate and that this applies to cars driven into the enclosure past the point where tickets are being taken.

Sheriff Gene Eckols has asked that everyone comply with the new law and warns that checks will be made to apprehend those in violation.

## Numerous Improvements Listed For Rankin Schools

Students at Rankin schools this term will note a number of improvements made during the summer months by the custodians and builders.

All floors in the entire school have been refinished and polished, outside grounds have been improved with a very nice growth of grass around the buildings and new shrubs planted, a new boiler has been installed in the junior high building which will make it much more comfortable this winter.

A new oven has been added at the school cafeteria and new storage rooms built. Teacherages have been improved by painting and installation of linoleum on all kitchen and bath room floors.

Five new tennis courts have been built and are now in the process of being completed. All will be regulation size and will also have basketball goals installed on the

ends so that more room will be available for PE classes.

Another project that is to receive immediate attention will be the construction of a new concessions stand at the football field. This is to be started immediately after the Rochelle game here Friday night.

Supt. Joe Scrivner has expressed his thanks to the custodians who have worked very hard all summer to have the school in the fine shape it is at opening time. Those regularly employed are Russell Lott, Bill Johnson, Curtis Sheppard, Charles Lindley and Bill Moore. Moore, who is in charge of the football field, was involved in an accident with a mower down on the field several weeks ago which resulted in the loss of some of his toes; nevertheless, the field is in good condition, according to Scrivner.

Friday night is football night. So far there doesn't seem to be too much enthusiasm about the coming tussle between the Red Devils and Rochelle but it will be our guess that there will be a good crowd out for the 1955 opener.

They say it puts a team on the spot when they are picked to win

but the way we see it, the Red Devils should come out on the long end of the score.

We're not batting much more than 500 on the matter of making suggestions for things for other folks to do.

A week or so ago we came up with the brilliant idea of trying to get a mail box erected on the street corner so you wouldn't have to get out of the car to post a letter. That little idea evidently went over like a lead sandwich. Nary a nother sole has come forward to help me man the remparts for this noble idea. Either we're the only lazy cuss in town or there is a bunch of others around who won't admit it.

Now last week's suggestion on enlarging the courthouse met with quite a bit more welcome. There is just a heck of a lot of folks around who realize how badly this job needs to be done and they're not all just someone looking for a job.

Reliable sources have said that even the oil company men have expressed surprise that the county would be trying to operate in a building such as the present courthouse. They point out that almost all the surrounding counties have better housed county seats.

It is very possible that a number of local folks have not been in the courthouse lately to really see for themselves how crowded some offices are. One day last week when we were up on business, we dropped by the Sheriff's radio office to see if anything was new. Deputy

Langford had a visitor. The visitor was sitting in the chair and Langford was sitting on top of the desk—not to be funny, but because that was the only way both of them could sit down in the room at once. We had to stand out in the hall and transact our business.

Rest rooms, tucked away behind stairways, are not adequate nor do they look too modern. Space for filing of papers are at a minimum.

And while on the subject, it might be pointed out that at the same time the courthouse is being remodeled, should it ever be, there ought to be a branch office of the Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector set up in McCamey. A nice building should be constructed and proper personnel hired to staff the place. That would not only be fair to the people in McCamey but it would take a load off the present head office over here.

Back to the matter of football again, we have been watching a few of the workouts of the Red Devils. They look all right and we believe that folks will be pleased with their performance Friday night. We also talked to Supt. Joe Scrivner this week and he tells us that as of Monday there were around 130 students in high school with a few stragglers still to be registered.

This would mean that Rankin now has enough enrolled in high school to be in Class A sports, the minimum requirement being 115. However, Joe says that it is usually the case that enrollments drop off all through the year and that we probably won't have much over 100 average at the end of the year. Even so, it will still be possible for Rankin to move up into Class A. Whether or not that is the best thing to do, we wouldn't know—it would be a rough class for a few years for us—but sooner or later we'll have to move up so we'd say the sooner the better.

And for the benefit of some of those who don't understand why Rankin schedules so many Class A teams in football, it might be pointed out that since we will definitely be playing in that class within two years, we might just as well get the feel of the competition now.

Several competent observers have expressed the belief that had McCamey been playing a harder schedule last season, they would not have been beaten by Sonora. Never let it be said that Rankin looked for the easy ones—these Red Devils just like 'em tough.

**NEW RECORD MADE ON NOTARY APPROVALS**

A. M. Muldrow, Secretary of State of the State of Texas, announced that 90,932 Notary Public Commissions (new term June 1, 1955 to June 1, 1957) had been mailed to the County Clerks of the 254 counties in Texas.

108,485 persons were reappointed on June 1, 1955, but only 83,341 re-qualified for this new term from the various counties.

7,591 persons applied for Notary Public Commissions for the first time and were approved by the Secretary of State. Most of these new notary applicants have qualified and their Commissions have been mailed to the County Clerks.

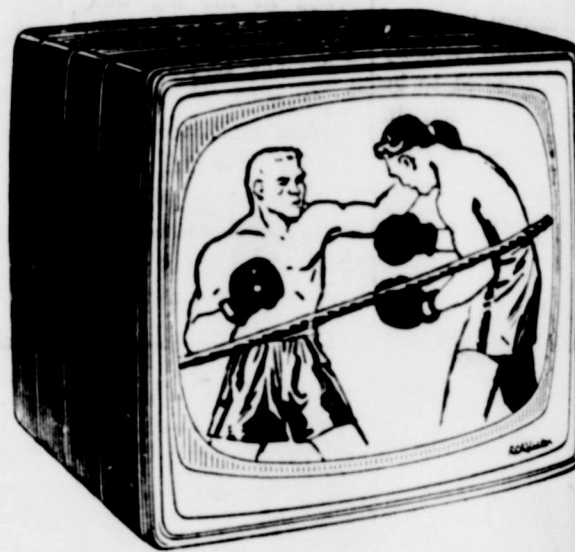

### FURNITURE POLISH

With possible fall housecleaning right around the corner we thought you might be interested in this recipe for furniture polish. It comes from the Palace of Fine Arts in Brussels. It is composed of equal parts of fresh lemon juice, denatured alcohol, olive oil, and gum turpentine. No substitutes please! Place in a bottle or jar with a tight lid.

This polish cleans and feeds the wood as well as polishes. It will not leave a gummy film to collect dust. Use only a small amount at a time. Dampen a lintless cloth, such as a clean woolen cloth, with the mixture. Massage the furniture and when it has been rubbed in, wipe furniture with a clean, dry cloth.

There are many good commercial furniture polishes on the market. You may prefer to use one of them.

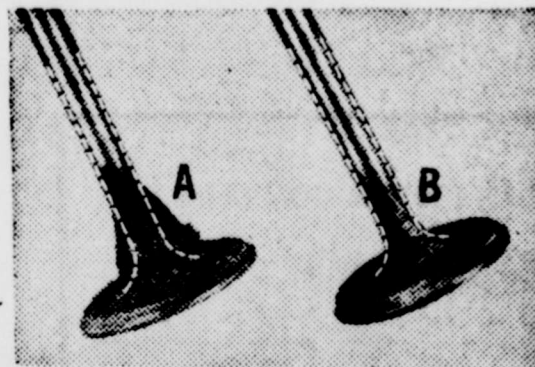

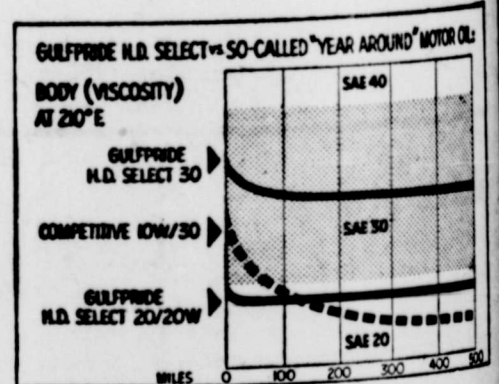
