## Quality Question Raised By Protest Stymies Paving

### City Has Crowded Docket Several Bids To Study

Upton County can legalize paving in Rankin and McCamey, a question that has been proposed \$30,000 expenditure for such a stand still at least being. A protest received last week by county auditor and Elmer Wolf in which he requested the auditor against county money on paving that had not been decided as part of the county raised the question of

The county auditor, in turn asked the county attorney for legal advice on the matter and has been supplied with a number of opinions rendered in similar cases by the Attorney General's office of the State of Texas. These opinions dealt with specific cases, one of which was a case involving Potter County and the use of county money to pave streets within the city limits of Amarillo.

This opinion cited the Constitution of the State, Section 52, Article III, which states in part, "it shall be unlawful for any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever."

The opinion from the Attorney General's office further stated that this part of the Constitution has usually been interpreted to mean that a county could not spend its money within a city on street paving unless that street, or streets

## Red Devils Scalp Braves; Seek To Pluck Reagan Owls

Brave scalps were a dime a dozen in Iraan last week as the Red Devils ran rough shod over their long-time rivals by a 32-6 margin.

With the visitors stands containing almost as many spectators as the Iraan home side, the Red Devils continued to show a hard charging backfield and a very tough line. In the opening minutes of the game, Rankin failed to move the ball while the Braves were knocking on the goal line with their first attempt. However, Rankin called a time out, talked it over and moved back in to stop the Pecos County lads for what was their last chance to win the game.

From that point on it was a matter of Rankin getting possession of the ball and working it down for a marker. Iraan's 6 points came late in the game and was set up against a Rankin eleven composed mostly of reserves getting experience under their belts.

### MONDAY FIRE DESTROYS OLD BUSHONG HOMESITE

One of the early day homes in Rankin, the A. J. Bushong house built some 40 years ago, was completely destroyed by fire Monday afternoon.

Undetected until it was well underway, local firemen were never able to bring the blaze under control but did manage to keep it from spreading to adjoining property. All contents of the house, occupied by the Pat Henley family, were destroyed. The Henleys were away from home at the time the blaze started and its origin has not been determined.

### NEW TRUCK ON WAY

New fire-fighting equipment will soon be on the way to Rankin. Bids were opened Monday by the Commissioners' Court that will result in the purchase of a new truck and equipment for Rankin.

Due to the large number of bids and the manner in which they were submitted — some for the truck only, some for the equipment only, etc., the court was unable to decide immediately on how to award the bids and were still studying the situation early this week.

Ordinarily it takes from 6 to 12 months to secure a fire truck after an order is placed since most of

It was a crowd pleaser for the home folks of Rankin who had either seen their teams tied or defeated for the past 15 years during the time Iraan reined as a powerhouse throughout the state. Most fans, however, have expressed the opinion that the Red Devils still have not been tested by a really strong team and are expecting tougher competition for the boys this week when they meet the Big Lake Owls in Big Lake.

Slated at the beginning of the season to be among the top contenders in their district, the Owls failed to show much punch against Ozona last week when they went down 25-0 before the boys from Crockett County. About the only comparison that can be made between Rankin and Big Lake would be in pre-season scrimmage games with Crane.

In two different scrimmages with the Golden Cranes, Rankin more than managed to hold their own with the AA team while it is reported that Big Lake took it on the chin from the same Crane team. Again, fans point out that this was pre-season practice and

### PHILLIPS FINALS UPTON WELL FOR 1,191 BBLs.

One Upton County field gained its third producer and outposts slated to two other fields.

The King Mountain (Ellenburger) field of Upton County has gained a third producer and a one-location southeast extension with completion of Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1 O'Harrow, in 6-J. E. Hamilton survey, 13 miles west of Rankin.

The project was finalized for a calculated, daily flowing potential of 1,191.78 barrels of 53.2 gravity oil with gas-oil ratio of 696-1.

Hanley Co., Midland, will drill a 7½-mile southwest outpost to production in the Benedum (Spraberry) field, 8½ miles northeast of Rankin. It will be the No. 1-B University.

The project will be drilled with rotary to 7,600 feet, with operations beginning at once.

Location, on a 160-acre lease, is 1,980 feet from the south line and 660 feet from the west lines of 4-3-University.

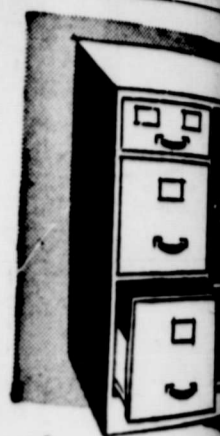

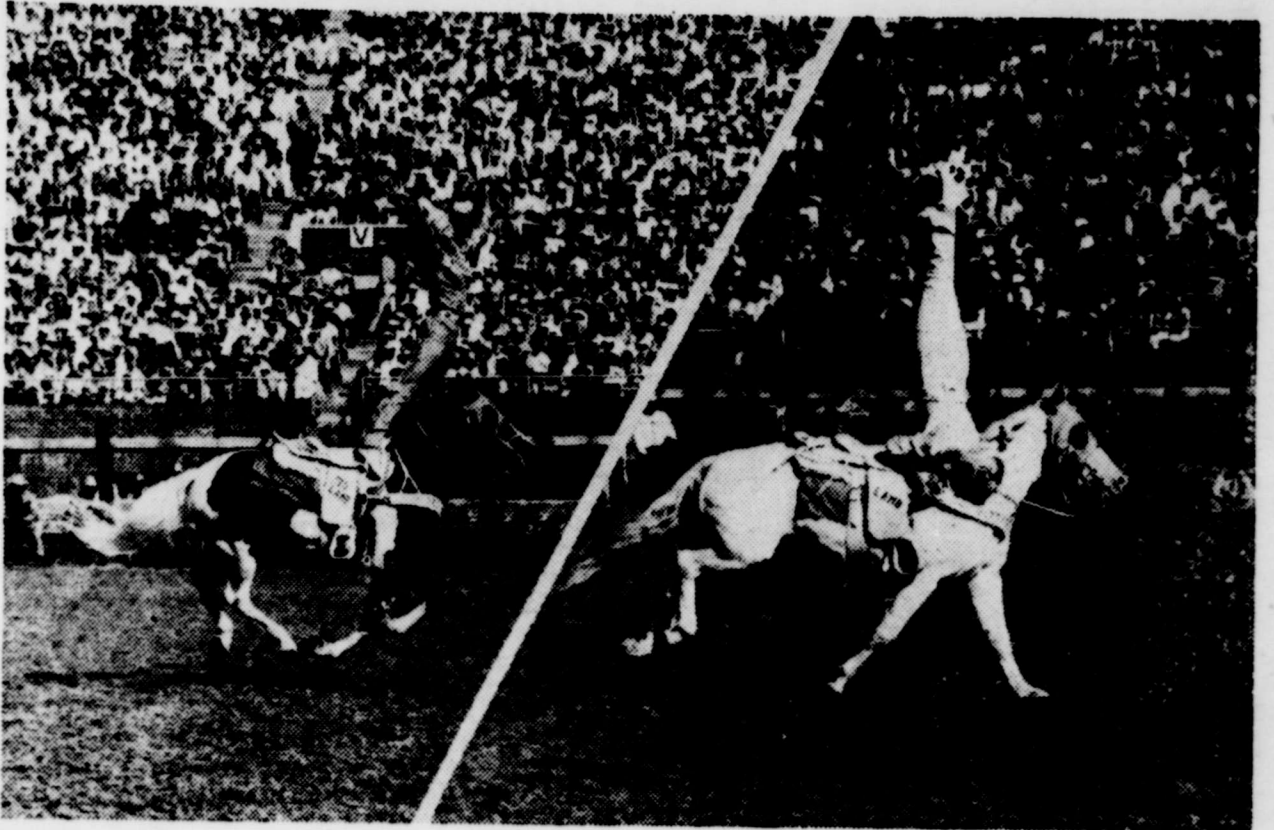

Under new laws the board places responsibility for administration squarely on the shoulders of the land commissioner. Ex-officio members, the governor and attorney are charged only with policy-mak-

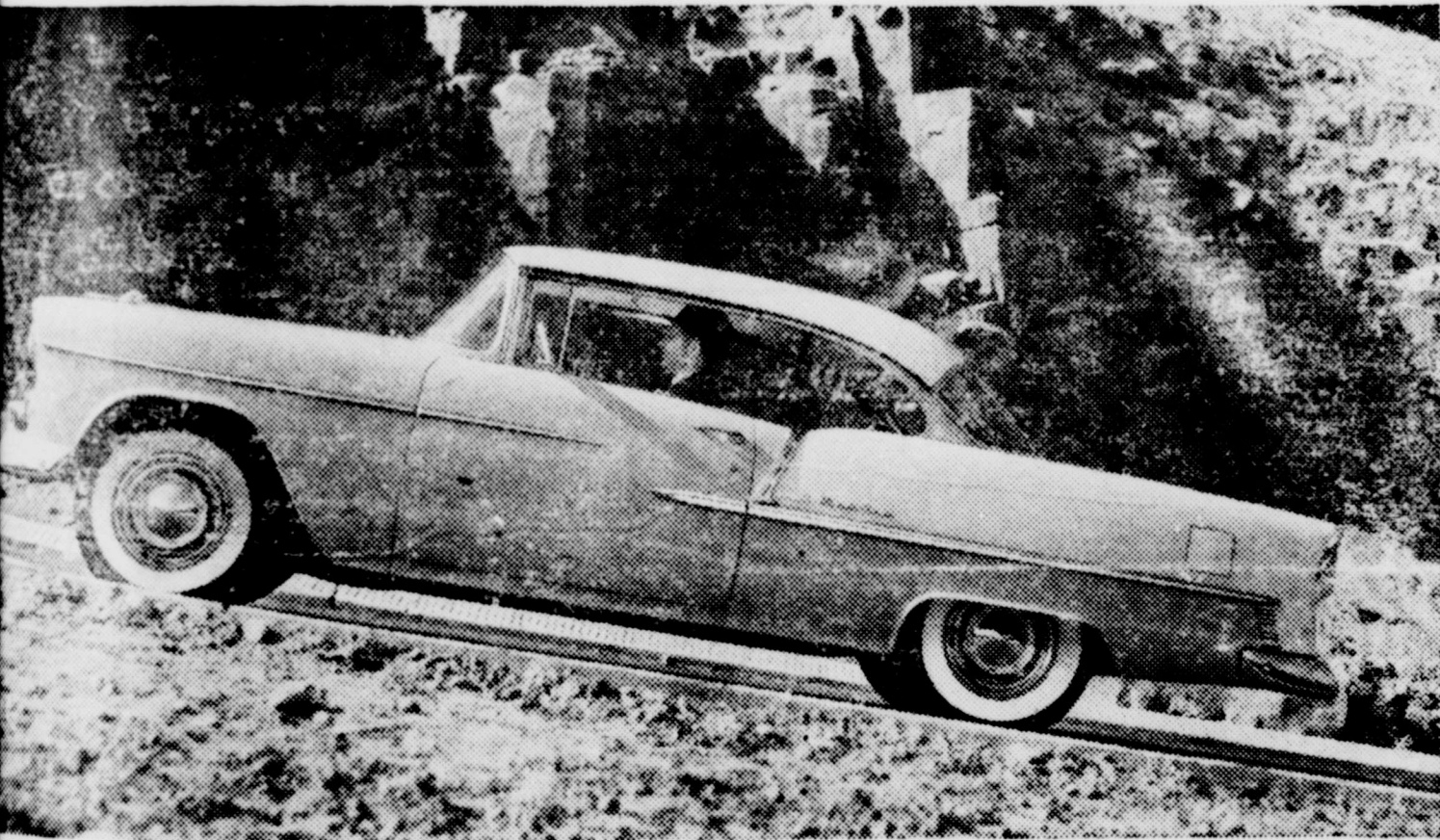

Commr. J. Earl Rudder said he was ready to accept the responsibility.

Local advisory committees, blue-printed in the 54th Legislature's reform laws, are already being formed. These committees, appointed by commissioners courts, will provide a check on findings of state appraisers.

Land purchasers who are delinquent in their payments, have been notified to pay up or forfeit their land. Many delinquencies involve block deals believed to be of questionable nature.

Rudder indicated the board should be able to start considering loan applications again soon. All the original \$100,000,000 was exhausted under the administration of his predecessor, Bascom Giles. Some, however, has been recovered by court action.

Giles has been sentenced to the state penitentiary on charges of accomplice to theft and consenting to accept a bribe.

Radar sets, obsolete for military use, were donated by the U. S. Air Force. Procedure for use was developed by the U. S. Weather Bureau, Texas Department of Public Safety and the state division of Civil Defense and Disaster Relief.

Installation sites are Austin, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Brownsville, Victoria, Galveston, Houston, Beaumont, Ft. Worth, Wichita Falls, Lubbock, Midland, San Angelo, and Amarillo. Others may be added soon.

With this line-up the Owls can throw up a 192 lb. average in their forward wall as compared with 163 for Rankin; a weight advantage of some 24 pounds per man. This advantage, however, is accounted for mostly in the two big guards. In the backfield, the Owls will average 159 lbs. while the Red Devils ordinarily field a 166 pound offensive backfield.

Encouragement over the big weight advantage held by the Owls can be taken by Rankin in the fact that Ozona handed the Owls the 25-0 defeat with a line that averaged only 160 pounds and a backfield of 150 pounds.

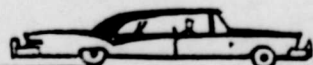

If they are to be laundered, wash each one separately in softened water. Rinse completely and don't forget to put some softening in at least the first rinse water. 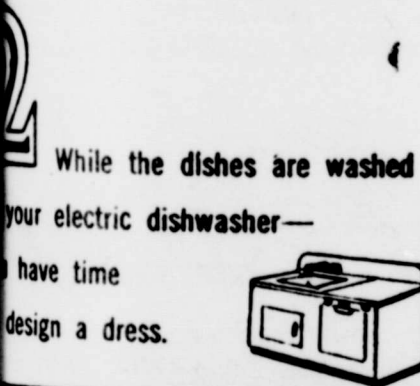

was a connecting link or intrical part of the county road system and had so been designated by the Commissioners' Court and with the permission of the city involved.

This would indicate that streets to be paved in Rankin and McCamey must first be designated by the Commissioners' Court as a part of the county road system and an agreement secured from the city for such a move.

In their regular meeting last Monday, the commissioners' court discussed the opinions of the Attorney General but due to the amount of work before the court, were unable to devote enough time to the matter to decide what the next step will be toward carrying through their street paving program.

Unofficial comments by various persons close to the question has been that a number of streets might be paved if designated as a part of the county road system or that a road district might be formed, including the streets to be paved, in which case a special program would have to be worked out.

A check with Commissioners Workman and Holmes indicated that they are still investigating all phases of the program and that they will continue to work toward some solution to the paving problem in Rankin.

### Library Addition Bids

Opening of bids for the addition of a reading room to the Rankin Library was one of the matters covered by the Commissioners' Court in their regular meeting last Monday.

With a total of three bids to choose from, the low bid of Cecil Sullivan, McCamey contractor, was accepted by the court. Sullivan's bid was \$8,387. Of the two other bids, F. N. Kelley of McCamey bid \$14,750 and C. T. Vardy and Co. of Rankin bid \$10,307.26.
