> Why wait until a newspaper unearths a scandal?

Anyone who handles public funds regular intervals.

Frankly - both the lawmakers and the public are to blame for thievery in public office.

Every state in the Union, with few exceptions, and Texas is one of the exceptions, requires that every public official who handles public funds publish a full accounting of same at stated intervals.

When the legislators fail to act, it is time for the people to act. It is time for the people to take a hand in drafting legislation, or electing men who will do so.

During the last session of the legislature there were two bills introduced by Representative Elbert Reeves of Matador, to force publication of financial statements by the Commissioners' Courts, the school districts, and by other groups

handling public monies. Why weren't these bill passed? That's what the people would now

like to know.

We think the people should ask their elected representatives just why those bills were not passed. Any state failing to pass such

legislation is guilty of tempting public officials to pocket the peoples' cash. It is just as guilty as the man who takes it.

Theft of public funds is not uncommon in such states where financial reports are not required. And thievery will continue until such time as the people demand of their elected representatives that laws be passed that remove such

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


