

AREA PASTOR NAMED TO REFUGEE PROGRAM

The appointment of Rev. A. L. Teaff, pastor, East Side Baptist Church of McCamey, as local representative for the Governor's Committe for Refugee Relief Program has been announced by John H. Winters, committee chairman. Rev. Teaff will act on behalf of the State Cimmitee in Upton County.

The committee was appointed by Governor Allan Shivers at the request of President Eisenhower to inform the people of Texas on the Refugee Relief Program. In addition to Winters, who heads the State Department of Public Welfare in Austin, members are the Rev. Henry Herbst, pastor of SS Paul Church, New Braunfels; the Rev. A. O. Rast Executive Secretary of the Texas Lutheran Mission Board; Leonard L. Holloway of the Baptist General Convention of Texas; Sam W. Levy of Houston; and C. W. Pfluger, Jr., of Coupland.

Under the Refugee Relief Act of 1953, 214,000 displaced persons were declared admissable to this country. Recent figures show slightly over 43,000 have obtained sponsors and have migrated to the United States. Of this number it is estimated less than 500 have been brought to Texas

To be successful in helping displaced persons get a new start in life, the Refugee Program will need assurances from 30,000 to 40,000 sponsors by early in 1956.

The refugee's qualifications to fill the job provided him are certified by overseas officials. The Governor's Committee noted that a large percentage of the refugees are classified as agricultural workers who could be absorbed easily in the farming and rancihng regions of Texas. Many skilled craftsmen are also looking for new homes in
