## POLLS TUESDAY TO ELECT MAYOR AND ONE CITY COMMISSIONER

### Claude Sheffield In City Commissioner Race With Boggs

Voters in Rankin will go to the polls next Tuesday, April 3, and pick their mayor and one city councilman. Both will be elected for a two-year term.

On the last day in which candidates could announce for the offices Claude Sheffield filed his candidacy for the city commissioner post with the city secretary. He will oppose Ray Boggs who has held the office two terms and is seeking re-election. A. E. Ivy, present mayor serving his third term, is unopposed for re-election.

Sheffield, who has been in Rankin for a number of years, has been interested in several different business ventures here and is presently working for an oil concern. In addition to this job, he recently purchased the Beverly Motel and is in the process of constructing a new tourist court on that location.

#### POLLS OPEN AT 8:00

With voting beginning at 8:00 a.m. at the city halls, the polls will remain open until 7:00 p.m. H. Wheeler has been named election judge, assisted by Mrs. Jack Smith, Mrs. Gordon Steele and Mrs. Wheeler.

Eligible voters must have paid their current poll tax and reside within the city limits of Rankin.

## BB GUNS TAKE TOLL ON CITY PROPERTY

Heavy damage is being reported to city property from air guns and .22 rifles. Since Christmas, 60 gas meters have been damaged out of the 400 in service, numerous street lights have been shot out and other miscellaneous acts of vandalism have been committed against both city and private property.

"We're going to make it mighty hard on anyone we can catch in the act," is the way city officials have expressed their views on the incidents.

"Some of those meters have had to have the register systems replaced and those alone cost \$6 each to say nothing of the loss of gas, expense of time in replacing and general unsafe conditions created by a damaged meter," officials said.

"At the present time there is an ordinance on the books that prohibit the shooting of .22's and BB guns within the city limits. We have warned offenders against this before but this time we will make no further warnings. Both city and county police officials have been instructed to be on the lookout for those persons who are violating this ordinance and destroying pub-

## Suit Against County Opened in 83rd Court

David L. Tisinger vs. Upton County, a law suit in which the plaintiff is asking for a \$15,000 judgment for attorney's fees which he alleges the county owes him, opened Tuesday afternoon in the 83rd district court in Rankin.

Tisinger, an Austin attorney, represented a now desolved water district formed in 1952 by the Upton County Commissioners' Court in a law suit filed by oil companies and individuals which resulted in the

## COMMISSIONERS DISREGARD PETITION, VOTE AGAINST CALLING ELECTION

In what is believed to be the first time in the history of Upton County, the commissioners court refused to honor a petition and voted against calling an election to split the Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector's office. They had been presented with a petition bearing some 240 signatures of county resi-

dents requesting that the election be set.

Minutes of the court show that in their March 22 meeting in which the petition was considered, Commissioner Workman made the motion that the election be called. This motion was seconded by Commissioner Holmes. Voting results show that Commissioners Sam Holmes and Tommy Workman voted in favor of calling the election while commissioners E. K. Buford and Joe Conger voted against the matter. County Judge Bud Fisher was then called upon to break the tie and cast his vote also against the request of the petition.

#### PREVIOUSLY RETURNED

This petition had previously been presented to the court and had been returned to its backers with the request for additional signatures. A spokesman for those who petitioned for the election stated this week that there would be no further attempt at this time to get the matter put to a vote since there would not be enough time left to hold the election and for candidates to file for the offices involved.

#### RENT OFFICE SPACE

Further recent action involving the county has been the renting of office space to house the State Welfare worker in the Harlan Hotel adjacent to the county courthouse.

This move was made necessary when all available offices in the courthouse and the Rankin Park Building were filled.

It would be our guess that if you have a son or daughter who has a BB gun, you would be doing yourself and the child a favor by making sure they did not shoot same here in town.

We believe that the city council is determined to take some severe action to put a stop to the heavy damage being inflicted on property from the guns.

You might save yourself from having to dig up a sizeable fine.

Last week the Commissioners Court decided not to call the election on splitting the Sheriff and Tax Assessors office. The vote was two to two with Sam and Tommy voting for calling the election.

Judge Fisher sided with the two McCamey commissioners and rejected the petition. As we have said before, we do not think the office would have been split had it come to a vote—but, we do think the people ought to have been given a chance to decide for themselves.

Even though the court was not bound by the petition to call the election, we feel that the people have a right to petition their governing bodies whenever they are not satisfied with a matter. In fact, that is one of the principal views of our form of government—the right to petition.

Let us hope that the three who took it upon themselves to decide that the office should not be split did so in good faith, believing sincerely and definitely that a majority of the voters would not favor such a matter. Let us hope that they will not continue to sit as a deciding body whenever the people petition for a causes.

We believe that even the minority has a right to have their day at the polls and even though we may not agree with their petition, we would still say let's do it the American way and vote on the matter—letting the majority rule.

Incidentally, we are told that whenever a county reaches 10,000 in population, the two offices are automatically split by law. Upton County cannot be very far from that figure.

A couple of weeks ago we ran a story on the new building work down at the First State Bank and reported that O. W. Parker was president.

Now it comes to light that we should have run that story before the first of the month because on that date Dunn Lowery became president of the bank.

## CONCHO SOIL GROUP HOLDS MARCH MEET

The Middle Concho Soil Conservation District board of supervisors held their regular monthly meeting

last March 19. This meeting was held in Big Lake and the next will be in Rankin, as the meetings are rotated between those towns and Mertzon.

One of the items acted upon by the board was the placement of grass seed in all of the above named

towns. This seed is available to anyone in the District who wishes to use it. There are three different grass seed, sideoats grama, sand dropseed, and blue panicum. The prices are \$1.20, .25, .85 in the order listed above.

Of these three grasses blue panicum is the only introduced grass; the other two are native species. Blue panicum has only been tried for a short period of time but has shown promise as a range grass. Sideoats is the major native grass in this climate. It is considered one of the best for drought resistance and high forage production. It is one of the climax grasses, or grasses that were here in abundance in nature's highest state of growth. Sand dropseed is also a native grass, but is not at high quality or producer as sideoats. Only a limited amount of it appeared in the climax condition of the land. It has had very little use in reseeding work. Possibly a lower type or form of grass can better adapt itself to the soil that is bare and in beneficial grasses for reseeding purposes.

year, to reseed the range it is possible to offset some 5 to 10 years of nature's plant succession recovery cycle. Once the soil is bare and only a small per cent of good grass roots remain, the recovery to a high per cent of good grass may take 25 to 50 years even with normal rainfall. The first vegetation to come on bare ground is the lowest type, annual weeds and annual grass. Nature is only trying to get a protective cover back on the land. These type plants are able to use the small amounts of moisture that a bare soil will absorb. After a few years, as these weeds and grasses die and return to the soil making organic matter, returning to mineral form for succeeding plants to use, and aid in getting a higher per cent of moisture into the soil; weak perennials, both weeds and grasses begin to increase in number and dominate. In time the most favorable weeds and grasses become dominant. This process of getting the most moisture into the soil when it falls, better and higher forms of plant life taking root can be speeded up by reseeding where possible.

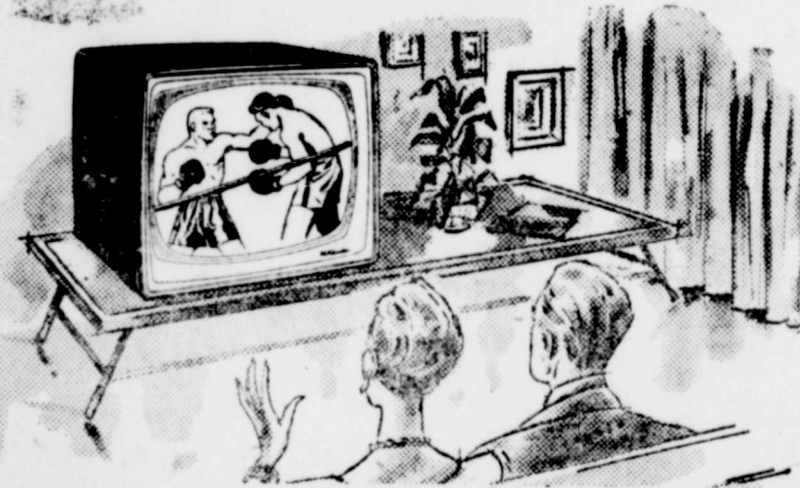
