As a means of providing protection to volunteer firemen, the City of Rankin this week secured an men listed on the active company roll. The policy does not provid for protection of spectators or unauthorized persons who might take part in combating a fire and who were injured in any way
Provided for in the policy is payment of medical expenses incurred by a volunteer fireman while fight ag a fire up to $\$ 1,000$. Also provided $\$ 1.000$ for certain disabilities as a result of injury and up to $\$ 25.00$ per week compensatich for the time he might be off from his job or business as a result of injuries. It slso provided for payment of minor medical expenses such as treating cuts, small burns, etc., that might be received while the volunteer is performing his duties. Aln
the above provisions will be in effect whether the fireman is at an actual blaze or is practicing fire drills.

## LIABILITY POLICY BOUGHT

At the same time, city official anounced that they have pur chased liability insurance on both of the fire trucks. Should they be nvolved in a collision or other mishap, these policies would pro tect the city from suit for damage Presently there are 22 volunteer iremen listed on the company roll who would be covered by the insurance policies. A total of 28 can be carried on the membership list.
"We would like to emphasize again trat the city cannot be responsible for injury to unauthorized persons who are injured either as spectators or in actual assistance at a fire. It would be better for authorized volunteer firemen would combat the blaze and handle the
cquipment," city officials said.

## SATURDAY FIRE

Perhaps one of the largest fires oo occur in Rankin for some time was touched off at about 10:00 a.m. Saturday morning when wiring in the T. L. Stephenson Mud and Chemical warehouse caused a fire that is estimated to have resulted in $\$ 60,000$ damages.
in an estimated $\$ 40,000$ damage. Since the initial blaze, firemen have been called out on Saturday, Sunday and Monday nights to extinguish small fires that have tinguish small fires that have
broken out in the debris. broken out in the debris.
T. L. Stephenson, owner of the property, estimated that five to six thousand sacks of chemicals, drilling mud, and other related products were destroyed. A major portion of the merchandise belonged to The Baroid Company and was consigned to Stephenson. It is believed that all the loss was covcred by insurance. Some of the sacks were valued at as much as $\$ 40$ each or 80 cents per pound.

## STUBBORN FIRE

With a total of 8 hoses going, firemen battled the blaze for 6 hours before moving off the equipment. During that time, a bulldozes belonging to Billy Rankin was used to move the destroyed building and its contents from the fire site.
Endangered by the blaze and suffering varying degrees of damage was two more warehouses owned by Stephenson on the east side of the one that burned, one on the west owned by Stephenson and another larger one owned by Permian Mud and operated by Ed Harris.
Very little damage was suffered in the two end warehouses while the two next to the blaze were damaged extensively.

 grow during the spring, summer and early fall making this time the most bencficial for deferment. Rest is most beneficial during the growing season, with five or six months being better than less time in most cases. The percent of climax grasses present should be used incetermining the length of the de-
ferment. Ryting pastures having the highest percent of climax vegetation first gives the quickest and most economical improvement building up forage production. In this case shorter periods of deferment prove more beneficial than Ionger ones which are necessary on areas of bare ground or with small per cent of climax plants. Deferment is meant to give long time
esults and no part of the range
should be over used in order to rest nother part. Livestock numbers should be adjusted to the amount of forage being produced. This permits the grasses to produce feed for winter use which in turn would essen the feed bill.
Maximum production is obtained only when 40 to 50 per cent of the nnual top growih is grazed during he growing season. This allows plant to retain their vigor and sufficient leaf surface for growth plus the adided protective cover that is formed on the ground to get maxumum benefit of rainfall, be it .1 or 3 inches.
Deferment is an excellent meth od of getting production ahead the livestock.
