W J HENRY GUILTY **GIVEN 99 YEARS**

In a courtroom packed with a good percentage of the negro population of Upton County, an almost complete stillness prevailed when at 1:50 p.m. Wednesday evening the jury filed into the room and rendered its verdict in the Willie James Henry murder trial. Henry was found guilty of murder and given a 99 year term.

The Rankin City Council, working in connection with county this week moved to take steps that will attempt to prevent the spreading of the rabies epidemic to Rankin. With the present program aimed at vaccination of all dogs, as well as their confinement for the

Sheriff H. E. Eckels told city official today that he will hire additional personnel to begin Monday, May 7, on picking up all dogs found running loose in Rankin and vicinity.

Vaccination of dogs will take place at the city hall on Friday. health officer, Dr. J. D. Gossett, May 4. All dogs, whether they are kept penned up or not, must be vaccinated and tagged. Beginning Monday, May 7, all stray animals found in the city will be empounded and kept for two weeks for observation. Following that period they will be disposed of unless they are claimed by owners and are properly vaccinated and tagged.

> "This could be a very serious matter," Dr. Gossett has said. "Once a person or animal contacts rabies there is little that can be done for the individual or animal and if the disease reaches advanced stages it is almost certain to take the life of its victim."

Recent outbreaks of the disease has been noted in McCamey, Crane and Ozona with strict measures for control being taken by those cities. Believed to be spreading through the state by wild foxes and other wild animals, the disease was first noted in central Texas. Since that time it has spread west and now seems to have bypassed Rankin for the immediate time but indications are that it is getting closer from both the east and west.





The new manager graduated from National H. D. Week Roby High School and served with the U. S. Army in the South Pacific for over two years during World War II.






