

Already in place at the intersection of Main and Highway 67 is a blinker light with the stop signal facing Main. Caution signals are given to highway traffic. Going up as soon as poles and wiring can be installed will be a four-way traffic signal at Main and 8th by the bank and another caution light. just below the water tower where 12th Street crosses the highway. This light will have the stop signals facing 12th with the cautions on the highway. At the bank stop sign, the full three phase set of signals will be used with stop, caution and go lights facing all four directions. Estimated cost of the new installations will be around \$400. A very interesting and encouraging fact can be found in the minutes of the commissioner's court covering the special meeting in which they decided to pay \$5,000 to David Tisinger in his suit against the county for attorney's fees.

Actual beginning of the argument dates back some two or three years now and at that time the commissioners court was composed of Tom Trimble, Joe Conger, Sam Holmes, Tommy Workman and Bud Fisher. Since that time Tom Trimble died and was replaced by W. W. Grief.

According to the minutes of the court when it came down to making a settlement last week on the matter, Commissioners Workman and Holmes voted for the settlement while Joe Conger voted against it and Commissioner Buford did not vote. Judge Fisher, although not required to vote since there was

not a tie, had it recorded in the minutes that he favored the move. Our opinion on the matter is that Frog Buford earned himself the title of County Commissioner on that one and not just precinct commissioner. He did not yield to the opinion of his fellow commissioner from McCamey nor was he swayed by the opinions of the two Rankin commissioners. He, without doubt, knew how Judge Fisher stood on the matter and could have voted with Conger against the measure and thus passed the buck on to the judge. All this he did not do; rather he stated that the matter came up before his term in the court and that he was not familiar with the proceedings and thus did not feel that he was entitled to cast a vote in the matter.

It looks mighty like we've got a good man in Commissioner Buford. one who will trust his own judgment on matters and not join the crowd, back his companion commissioner-right or wrong-or pass the buck. It is our hope that the people in his precinct see fit to return Commissioner Buford for his second "hitch."

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



#### **Proper** Management **Means Better Grass** For Grazing Lands

Perennial grasses are the backbone of every range. Grass is the rancher's crop. His profit depends entirely upon the amount and quality or the grass grown on each acre of his ranch.

Green leaves coming forth each spring depend upon food stored in the roots from the previous years growth. If these leaves are quickly cut away, more food has to be sent from the roots and the roots die back to keep in balance with the top growth. This process can be carried on until the plants die. If, on the other hand, the plant is allowed to grow, the leaves start producing food and enable the plant to strengthen itself, send root deeper, and make seed for future generations.

Of course, moisture is needed before the leaves are able to trans-






