## VA to Send Contact Man To Aid Vets

A contact man for the Veterans Administration will be in Hereford on the first Thursday of each month to set up an itinerant service for veterans, Ralph Smith, county Veterans Service officer, announced this week.

Harold E. Van Horn, contact man from the sub-regional office of the Veterans Administration, Amarillo, was in Hereford last Thursday making arrangements for instituting the service here.

Van Horn will be in Hereford again on September 5 for the initial meeting. The Veterans Administration representative will meet all veterans of this county at that time at the office of the County Service Officer in the courthouse.

All veterans having problems relating to veterans rights are invited to call at the office on that date. All problems regarding National Service Life Insurance, on-the-job training, subsistence, furlough pay, and other features covered by the G.I. Bill of Rights will be dealt with by the service.

The Veterans Administration representatives will assist county service officer Smith in handling veterans problems of all types.

## Invite Bids on Paving on Hiway 51 South of Vega

The Texas Highway Department this week issued invitations for bids on hard-surfacing of a little more than five miles of Highway 51 between Hereford and Vega.

Contracts call for construction of base and double asphalt surfacing of 5.2 miles of the Highway from Vega south, the construction work being in Oldham and Deaf Smith counties.

Bids will be received until 9 a. m. August 27, when they will be publicly opened and read in Austin.

## G. I. Insurance Benefits Boosted By New G. I.

Insurance beneficiaries were materially benefited when the President liberalized GI insurance Friday, Robert G. I. Sisson, regional manager, said.

Discussing the amendment to the National Service Insurance Act which became law yesterday, Sisson said that the new law will provide for more attractive insurance benefits.

Principal changes amended act include:

1. Lump sum pay beneficiaries if desired
2. Total disability upon payment of additional premium.
3. Entitlement of sons who served in the forces between October and September 2, 1945, for National Service pool to increase the amount of insurance already in force.
4. More endorsements of policies offered.
5. Removal of many restrictions in the naming of beneficiaries.

"Holders of about six million NSLI policies now in force eligible for the many benefits provided by these amendments," Sisson pointed out.

"In addition, those veterans who formerly held some territorial policies that have since expired may still be entitled to state them and take advantage of the low cost protection provided for their families insurance."

## Hereford Woman Killed - Three Are Injured When Truck Overturns Saturday Afternoon

Mrs. Allan King, 28, of south Hereford, was killed, and her husband and three children injured, last Saturday afternoon when the truck in which they were riding overturned and burned on a dirt road four and a half miles southeast of Hereford.

The accident occurred shortly after four o'clock Saturday afternoon.

Mrs. King was pinned beneath the wreckage of the burning truck and her body was not recovered until the Hereford Fire department had reached the scene to get the flames under control.

King and the three girls, Marjory Ann, 6, Aileen, 4, and Wanda Jean, 2, were rushed to the Deaf Smith County Hospital by neighbors who witnessed the wreck. They received emergency treatment for cuts and bruises, but none was seriously injured.

The truck, a 1939 Dodge, was driven by King, and was the property of G. D. Milner, for whom he was working.

The King family had left their

home a short time before the accident on the way to town. The truck, which was believed to have been travelling at considerable speed, swerved off the road and into the ditch on the right hand side, and overturned as King attempted to pull back onto the roadway.

The truck was completely demolished. It turned completely

over and came to rest on its top and was facing in the opposite direction from the original heading. Gasoline ignited, and the truck was in flames by the time neighbors, who witnessed the crash, could get to the scene.

Mrs. King was pinned beneath the wreckage of the cab. King and the three children were thrown clear of the truck.

alysis. At a recent medical meeting Dr. Stimson told of a mother who brought her child critically ill with infantile paralysis into a large metropolitan hospital during the epidemic last summer.

There was no doubt in the doctor's mind what was wrong with the woman's child whose arms and legs were already badly paralyzed by the disease. However, Dr. Stimson questioned the mother closely. Finally he asked, "Are there any other children at home?"

"Oh yes," she said, "I have a boy of nine and a two-year-old girl at home."

"How are they?"

"Oh they're fine," she replied, "The nine-year-old had a little headache and a stomach upset a few days ago, but he's perfectly well now."

Despite the mother's reassuring remarks, Dr. Stimson asked her to bring the boy into the hospital. The next day she appeared with the rather reluctant youngster. A very careful examination of the boy revealed that he had a slight stiff neck and some evidence of weakness in the muscle of one leg. The child was kept in the hospital and given specific treatment for the muscle weakness. In a few weeks the child had recovered perfectly. There was no trace of weakness or paralysis. Dr. Stimson pointed out that if this child had not received prompt treatment, the mild weakness would have developed into a serious crippling handicap.

Doctors are continually reporting cases, who, complaining of minor ailments such as headache and fever, refuse to report sick but keep going on with their usual work until in a few days they develop severe attacks of infantile paralysis. Dr. John Paul of Yale University, who has been active in the fight against infantile paralysis for many years, lays great stress on the importance of putting patients with infantile paralysis to bed at the very beginning of their symptoms. The worst cases, he observes, occur in those who fight the disease and keep going for a few days until they finally succumb to severe infantile paralysis attacks.

Parents are urged by The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis not to disregard signs of minor illness during infantile paralysis epidemics. Perhaps the symptoms do indicate a mere minor illness, but they might mean infantile paralysis. Don't take a chance with the Crippler. Play safe; put the patient to bed and don't delay calling a physician.

## SUNDAY LESSON

### Friend of Jesus' Illustrates Right Sense of Values

The International Sunday School Lesson  
Scripture: Luke 12:19-20; 18:24-30; 19:1-10

THREE characters appear in the Scripture passages assigned for this lesson, and they illustrate the matter of values.

The first of these men was the successful farmer, whose crops so overflowed his barns that he was planning to pull them down and build greater structures.

He had no intention of being "rich toward God," or of serving his fellow men.

That was his moral mistake. But he made a great economic blunder, as well. Successful though he was, he left out of his calculation the most important thing of all—his own life, not realizing how little his possessions were worth in view of the uncertainty.

The second man was the rich young ruler, the young man whom Jesus loved, who had kept the Commandments from his youth. He was troubled about the question of eternal life, and Jesus invited him to leave all and follow Him.

But the young man went away sorrowful, thinking more of his great possessions. He, too, was astray in his sense of values, for he, too, was subject to death.

From these we turn to a third man, a publican, or tax-gatherer. He paid for the privilege of collecting the taxes in a country dominated by Rome, and he had the chance of grabbing a great deal for himself by extortion.

Has he taken what belonged to others? No finding himself in an office that offered many grafting opportunities and temptations, had he been scrupulously honest?

We do not know. But we do know that Zacchaeus longed to see Jesus, when He came to Jericho, and that, being small of stature, he climbed a tree to make sure he'd get a good view. And we know that Jesus became his guest, and that Zacchaeus said that if he had wronged any man he would restore him fourfold.

Zacchaeus had found salvation and a right sense of values. Death could not take away what he had discovered.

**Evetts Haley, Plains Author, Tells Story of Goodnight Trail in Ads**

Evetts Haley, cowman, historian and author of Canyon, Texas, tells the story of the famous old cattle route, "The Goodnight Trail," which appears in this paper to-day. It is the second in a series of advertising featuring historical Southwestern trails by The Shamrock Oil and Gas Corporation and Independent Shamrock dealers in the Southwest.

The author's parents moved west from Bell County, Texas to Midland when he was a baby and this is where he grew up. He went into the cattle business while a kid and has been in it ever since. Receiving his degree from West Texas State College at Canyon, he did graduate work and served on the history faculty at the University of Texas and later was field secretary for the Panhandle Plains Historical Society from 1925 to 1929.

While working on a current biography of an old time Texas rancher and peace officer, Evetts operates his ranch near Adobe Walls on the Canadian River.

Jack Potter, New Mexico writer and pioneer who grew up on the trails; LeRoy Hafen, Colorado State Historian and author; John McCarty, author and Texas Panhandle newspaper man.

**Eggs, Spuds And Onions Are Good Trio on Menus**

Eggs, potatoes, and onions, plentiful in many markets, often get together in the market basket, and these three may well meet again in a main dish for lunch or dinner, say home economists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The following recipes have added timeliness because the food can be prepared on top of the stove—cooler cookery for summer than baking an oven dish:

**Creamed eggs and potatoes.** Ingredients for 6 servings: 2 tablespoons table fat; 2 tablespoons flour; 2 cups milk; 2 tablespoons grated onion; 3 to 5 hard-cooked eggs; 1-1/2 cups mashed potato; 1 teaspoon salt; pepper. To make: Melt fat, add flour, and blend thoroughly. Add milk and onion. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Slice eggs and mashed potato and add to white sauce. Heat. If desired add 1/2 teaspoon paprika.

**Scrambled potatoes and eggs.** Ingredients for 6 servings: 2 tablespoons drippings or other fat; 1-1/2 cups diced cooked potatoes; 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper, if desired; 4 eggs; 1/4 cup milk; 1 teaspoon salt; pepper. To make: Melt fat in frying pan, add potatoes, onion, and green pepper. Cook until as brown as desired. Beat eggs and milk together and add salt and pepper. Pour this second mixture over the first in the pan and cook until the eggs are set.

**Crowd Pens And Loading Chutes Handling Cattle**

COLLEGE STATION, August 6.—Crowding pens and loading chutes will prevent many unnecessary injuries to farm people in handling livestock, says Dr. E. A. Grist, veterinarian for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

The use of practical handling facilities will enable the person working the stock to get the job done better as well as ward off personal injuries. By handling cattle in small, properly fenced pens, farm people receive too many unnecessary injuries, Dr. Grist says. Crowding pens and loading chutes will prevent being shoved against a fence or kicked severely.

Dr. Grist recommends de-horning cattle, as a protection to the worker as well as other cattle. The long tusks on old

**Marine Enlistment Policy Changes**

Captain Richard L. Pierce, officer in charge of the United States Marine Corps recruiting service for the district of Oklahoma today announced a change in the policy pertaining to periods of enlistment in the United States Marine Corps.

Captain Pierce stated that men who enlist now "for duty with aviation units" have their choice of enlisting for periods of three or four years. Men could formerly enlist for two, three, or four years, however, any man who has made a written application for a two year enlistment for "duty with aviation units" prior to 30 July, 1946

may still enlist for the two year period providing he enlists before 15 August, 1946.

The enlistment periods for general service remain unchanged; men have their choice of a two, three, or four year enlistment. Captain Pierce said that any man who intends to enlist and gain the benefits of the GI bill of rights should do so before 6 October, 1946 because under existing legislation the men who enlist after that date will not be eligible for these benefits.

## Fresh Eggs Can Be Successfully Frozen, Stored

COLLEGE STATION, August 12.—Fresh eggs, now seasonally abundant, can be frozen successfully in a smoke column for about half an hour before returning to Kwajalein.

As another precaution all aircraft traffic within a radius of 500 miles surrounding Bikini had been frozen for a 24-48 hour period on account of the possible dangers of radio-activity. As we left, the top part of the cloud had reached an approximate altitude of 35,000 feet and was slowly dissipating. Due to the shortage of time we had previously been given permission to leave Kwajalein for Guam immediately if we assumed whatever radio-activity hazards were present, which we did. I understand most everyone back in the United States had heard an on-the-scene description by radio but it was rather garbled. I understand also a number of people have expressed disappointment over the power of this bomb, but so far as I am concerned, it is by far the most destructive power man has ever had a hand in. This view was shared by all of the military and naval personnel with whom I talked.

fully for future use if a few simple steps are followed in preparation and packaging. Gwendolyn Jones, specialist in food preservation for the A. and M. College Extension Service, offers the following suggestions to homemakers:

Use fresh clean eggs. Break them into a clean bowl and beat or churn them thoroughly until the yolks are broken and well mixed with the whites. Beating prevents gumminess of the yolk during storage. However, be careful not to whip in air. Whites may be separated from the yolks and packaged without churning, but the yolks should be slightly beaten.

If eggs are to be used for cakes or sweets, add 1 teaspoon sugar, corn syrup, or honey for each cup. If they are to be used for scrambled eggs or salad dressing, add 1 teaspoon salt for each cup.

Plain tin is the most desirable container for eggs. Air-tight and leak proof paper cartons also may be used. Freeze in small amounts so that they can be used soon after thawing.

One good way to have small amounts of frozen eggs is to use a refrigerator tray. Put about 3 tablespoons of the egg mixture in each cube section. Quick freeze, then wrap each cube in cellophane. Several wrapped cubes may be packaged in one carton or bag. Small paper cups may be used as molds instead of the ice cube tray.
