William W. Blanton has announced as a candidate for Congress from the 16 th Congressional District of Texas.
He is a 45-year-old attorney ${ }^{\text {nho }}$ hes practiced law in Odessa since January, 1947. The Blantons, Bill and Minnie Belle, have three chil dren, Tom 9, Elizabeth Anne 7,
and Mary 5. They are members of the Presbyterian Church, in which both v.ere raised.
Blanton has a rich political heritage from his father, Thomas $L$ Blanton, who was the last congress man to serve from the old "Jumbo" District which stretched from Mineral Wells to El Paso. After this district was changed, the elder Blanton served as a congressman from the Abilene District, chalking up a total of 20 years in Congress. Bill Blanton was born in Abilene in 1910 and grew up in an atmosphere of government. He is a
graduate of Princeton University and studied law at the University of Texas. He was liconsed to practice in 1935.
From his earliest years Blanton spent his summers on a West Texas cattle ranch, and during his high school and college years he earn ed his wages as a cowpuncher during vacation, doing all types work necessary on a ranch.
The Congressional candidate served as county judge of Shackelfor County in 1941, 1942 and 1946. He served with the Army from 1943 to 1945 as an agent in the Counter-
