Rankin School Enrollment Gains 25% Over Last Year

School enrollment for Rankin Independent School District is heading for an approximate 25 percent increase over last year, according to figures released by the three principals Wednesday.

With the first full day of school Tuesday, September 4, there was a total of 610 students enrolled and an estimated 30 more who will enter school shortly. Some are still on vacation while others are enjoying a short spell of sickness. When all students presently known

to reside in the district are enrolled, it is expected that about 635 pupils will be credited to the school.

HIGH SCHOOL GAINS

In high school, principal H. G. Adams had registered some 120 students with a total of 125 expected to be reached shortly. The senior class presently has an enrollment of 24.

In junior high, principal Jack Skiles reported 151 enrolled and "4 or 5" more expected. This was up 25 over the enrollment of 126 at

the end of school last year. In the elementary school, principal Ed Stewart had enrolled 313 as compared with 275 at the end of school last term and was expecting a number of other children to enroll later. In the first grade alone, a total of 82 pupils have been assigned to classes.

BUSES CROWDED

Supt. Scrivner has reported that buses are having a difficult time maintaining their schedules and are running with near capacity loads. At the present time, some changes in routing are being made in an effort to overcome the condition. Should this prove to be unsatisfactory, new equipment may have to be added.

Upton County In Hay Roughage Program

Walter T. McKay, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, today advised Marlis C. Baker, FHA County Supervisor, of the designation of Pecos, Crane, Upton Counties under the Hay and Roughage Program for Texas.

Applications to participate in the Hay and Roughage program will be received by county Farmers Home Administration committees immediately at the Farmers Home Administration office located in the courthouse, Fort Stockton, Texas.

The Hay and Roughage Program was worked out between the Governor and the Secretary of Agriculture to provide emergency assistance to farmers and ranchers in the State's designated disaster counties. Under the program the local county FHA committee will determine each applicant's eligibility and will issue a certificate good for \$7.50 per ton on roughage actually purchased. The applicant will then apply the certificate on the purchase price of roughage from any dealer he chooses. The dealer endorses the certificate and draws a draft on the Emergency Drought Committee's account.

Applications may be filed through December 3, 1956, for a supply of roughage needed to last through December 31, 1956. Roughage under the program includes hay either baled or loose, cotton seed hulls, peanut hulls, corncobs, sorghum bundles or ensilage.

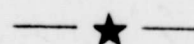

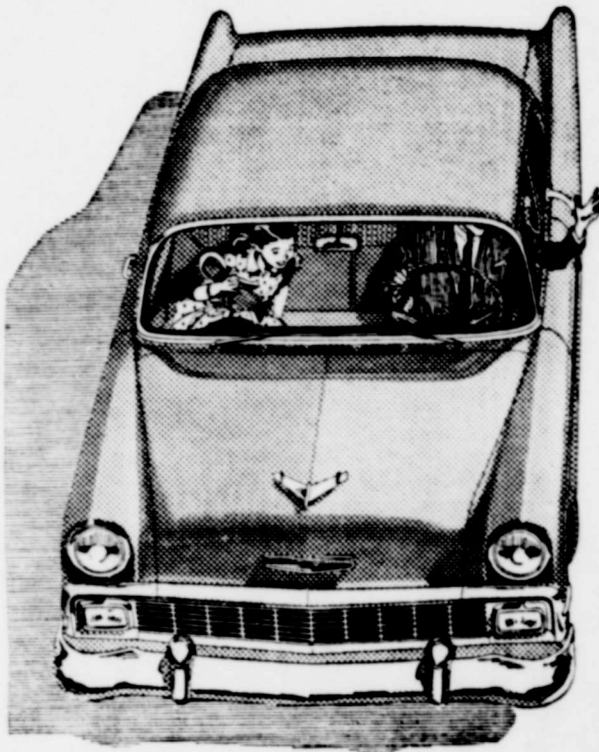

YOU CAN SUBSTITUTE

Most every cook gets caught without a certain ingredient at one time or another. With proper know-how you can make some quick substitutions. Here are a few which may help.

For 1 cup butter or margarine, use 7-8 cup oil or 1 cup hydrogenated fat. Add 1-2 teaspoon salt.

For 1 square chocolate, substitute 3 or 4 tablespoons cocoa plus 1-2 teaspoon fat.

Use 2 egg yolks instead of 1 whole egg for thickening or baking.

For sweet milk and baking powder, use equal amount of sour milk plus 1-2 teaspoon soda per cup. This takes the place of 2 teaspoons baking powder with 1 cup sweet milk.

For sour milk, use 1 tablespoon

vinegar, or 1 tablespoon lemon juice or 1 3-4 teaspoon cream tartar to 1 cup sweet milk.

For 1 cup cake flour, substitute up to 1-2 cup bran, or whole wheat flour, or corn meal plus enough all-purpose flour to fill the cup.

TAILORING

Ten suits and two coats are under construction in the tailoring class being taught in McCamey at the present time. The patterns will vary from the short box jacket to the fitted coat. All have tailored buttonholes, interfacings, and will be padded and taped, and lined throughout.

The class is meeting for one day each week for demonstrations and the beginning of each step in the construction. They then bring their garments up to date as their "home work" and are ready for the next step.

EMERGENCY FEED GRAIN PROGRAM EXTENDED

Walter T. McKay, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, today advised Marlin C. Baker, County Supervisor, of the extension of the Emergency Feed Grain program in Pecos, Crane and Upton Counties. Farmers Home Administration county committees may now take applications from farmers and ranchers through October 1, 1956 to provide feed for basic livestock herds through October 31, 1956.
