## George L. Branton Found Insane By Jury

In a sanity hearing held last Thursday, Oct. 4 in the 83rd District Court, Judge B. A. Patterson presiding, a jury of 10 men and two women found George L. Branton insane. Judge Patterson immediately ordered Branton confined to the state institution for the insane in Big Spring for such a period of time as may be required for treatment.

Should Branton be released by the hospital in the future and declared cured, he will be returned to Upton County for another sanity hearing and, if judged sane, will stand trial for assault with intent to murder with malice in connection with his wounding of J. S. Mooney on August 8.

Throughout the hearing Thursday morning, Branton maintained that he was a sane person and that he was willing to stand trial for the attempted murder charge but pleaded with the jury not to have him confined to a mental institution. In what was probably a record for time the jury retired to deliberate the case at 10 minutes to 12:00; reached its decision, returned to the court room and handed in the verdict and was on their way to lunch at a few minutes before noon.

## Filler by J. B.

These are the days when the minority is being heard—days when those who have long been under the heel of the oppressor are arising. The negro fights for civil rights, the Jews for a homeland, the various peoples under the colonial rule of Britain and France arise and on it goes.

We, too, want to raise the flag of hope and a cry of distress from a minority that has long been oppressed—the golfers of Upton County.

Ah, but the drouth would be broken with the tears that could be shed over the injustices suffered by this group.

Sometimes it is a little hard to follow the thinking of the powers that be in the county—

namely the commissioners court. They buy a race track on which no one races horses, they buy an air port on which no airplanes light, they maintain a park for the negroes, two for the white people, they own three swimming pools, they own park buildings, hospitals, a flock of ball parks, rodeo arenas and participate in dog catching, cat napping, coyote eradication, care of cemeteries and still more baseball fields.

But not one hole on a golf course.

True, up until now, both golf courses in the county have been privately owned and operated and the county commissioners have extended token assistance to them such as dirt hauling and grading work—something they have done for just about everyone at one time or another. And, as long as these clubs are operating the golf courses, the county could not legally—and should not—take any direct part in the operation.

On the other hand, it is a known fact that neither the McCamey club or the Rankin club is making much headway in improving the golfing facilities and the McCamey group has recently gone before the court asking that they take over the course over there—that they would completely remove the country club from the course, even tearing down the club house.

Now we admit that the golf course deal is one that would be close to our own heart but so are the rodeo arenas, the ball parks, the swimming pools, the picnic areas, the race track, the air port, etc. to various other people.

These are all good and fine public recreational facilities but we believe that golfers are entitled to equal consideration if they are to pay taxes the same as anyone else. And the golf

course would operate in a manner that would bring in revenue—something none of the others do—since golfers are accustomed to paying from \$1.00 to \$2.50 for green fees.

But, when the McCamey group offered to turn over the golf course to the county, hands were raised and chairs scraped back with the gentlemen of the court declaring that "We can't get tangled up in this golf course business.

O.K., so they don't like golfers. Maybe golfers don't like horseback riders, or swimmers, or picnickers, or ball players but we don't holler when the county spends \$12,000 for a little league park and we will all probably vote for the \$70,000 bond issue being proposed for the park fund—a good deal of which will be spent on a ball park in McCamey.

And a county operated golf course is nothing new. Crane is building a dandy, Crockett has assisted in the one they have as has Reagan to say nothing of the fine municipal courses scattered throughout West Texas.

We would not propose to tell the court how to run the county but we would suggest that the next time the matter comes before the group, that they give it serious consideration.

What we golfers need to do is demand integration. Looks like we are going to have to call in the NAAG (that's the National Association for the Advancement of Golfers) and file suit on the court to force them to integrate golfers into the citizenship of the county.

The Red Devils now stand with three wins and two losses and face another toughie in Eldorado this week. It looked like we just were not destined to win last week when fumbles and penalties did more to defeat the

Devils than did the Ozona Lions.

This week may be the week we get back into the winning ways but it seems doubtful. Eldorado played Big Lake all over the field even though they lost by 20-0 and they definitely will be out to seek revenge for the upset handed them last year by the Red Devils.

We have a chance to win Friday but the fumbling and penalties will have to go and one of the best games of the season will have to be played by the Devils.

#### FREEZING GAME BIRDS

Have a hunter in the family who gets his quota each trip? If so you just might have enough doves or other game birds to freeze some during the hunting season.

It's quite a simple process. Remove craw and intestines as soon as possible after they are shot even

if there isn't time to do a thorough job of cleaning and dressing.

Plucking is preferable to skinning, as skinning causes dryness and some loss of flavor. Wash thoroughly.

Wrap individually in moisture vapor proof material. Cellophane, aluminum foil, linofilm and various laminated papers are satisfactory. Seal with freezer tape. Label and date. From six to nine months is recommended storage period.

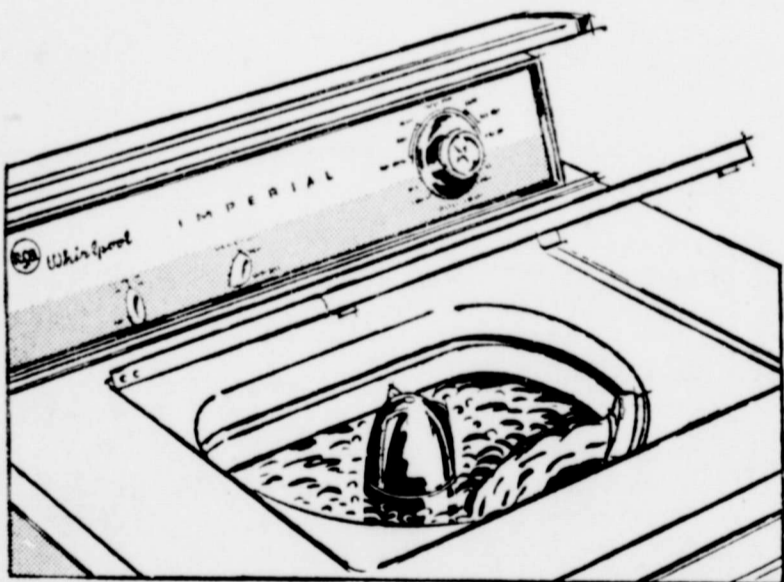

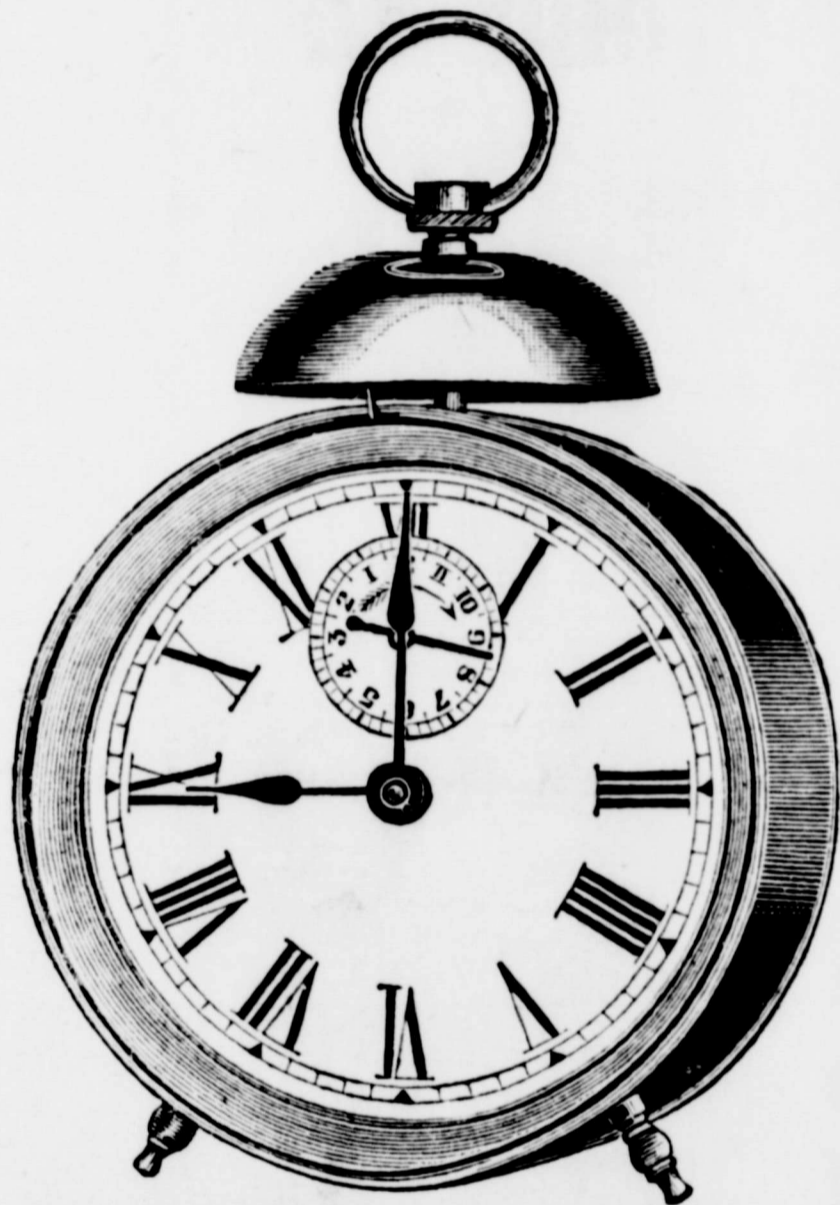

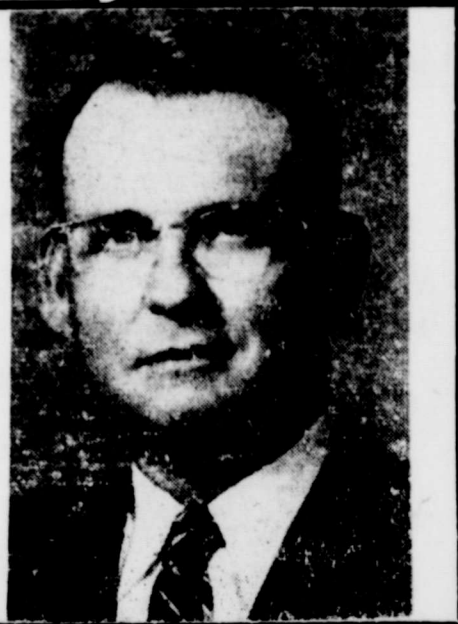


MISS NORMA JONES

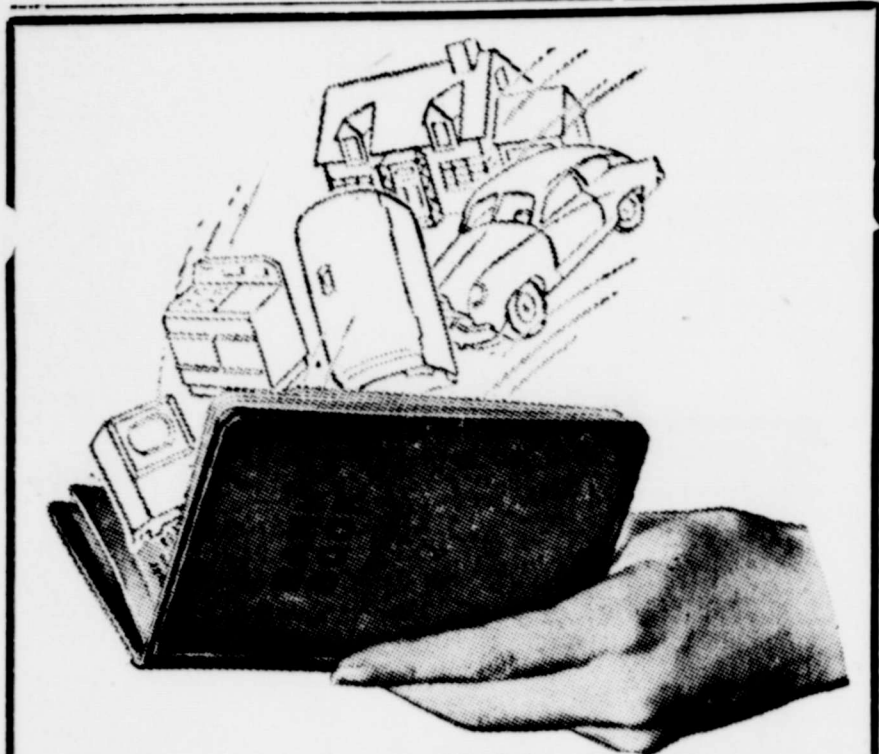

**Ike Can't Make It Rain, But He's Still Best Man**

The other day I asked a farmer if it was dry out his way. He said it sure was. "Looks like we just can't get any rain," he said. "Why, when Noah had his 40-day flood, we didn't get over half an inch."

There's no mistake about it, Texas is having itself a real drouth. Some of the farmers and ranchers in our county are in such bad shape that they may vote for Stevenson.

Old Man Jones, from across the river, said he wasn't going to go to any such extreme. He said he needed rain as bad as anybody else. He claimed water was so scarce in his community that the preacher was baptizing new members with a wet handkerchief. But he was holding out awhile longer, anyway.

"I may be stubborn," said Old Man Jones, "but I just ain't been convinced that President Eisenhower is keeping it from raining."

He said he knew that Stevenson and Kefauver acted like they thought so, and they had a right to their opinion. Lyndon Johnson, he figured, knew better, but he was sticking with Adlai and Estes for the sake of unity. He said he didn't figure Mr. Sam Rayburn had known whether it was raining or not for the last 25 years.

"I hate not to go along with such a widely known crowd of weather observers," Old Man Jones said. "If there's anybody

who keeps up with which way the wind is blowing, generally speaking, it's Stevenson, Kefauver and Johnson."

Then he went on to say that he realized the national farm program hadn't pleased everybody—including him. If he was in the White House, he would do things different, at least in our county. He allowed that the \$61,000,000 spent by the Eisenhower administration for drought relief in Texas could have been doubled and still not made all the farmers happy and prosperous.

"But," said Old Man Jones, "I keep remembering that the main reason for our troubles, besides the drouth, is the fact that we are not at war. Now, if Adlai and Estes really want to jump on President Eisenhower, there is a real issue. They've sure got the goods on Ike in that respect. If he hadn't stopped that Korean War, farm prices would be higher, no doubt. I wonder why they never mention that."

Old Man Jones was kidding a little, of course, in his usual way, but I think he had something there. We have got to adjust to peace-time, which is taking awhile but President Eisenhower is working at it. And meanwhile our boys aren't fighting and dying on foreign soil. It's worth thinking about.

The drought, over a large portion of the state, has shortened the supply of commercial grass seed. Native grasses from along the highways, railroads or the blue panicum in the root plowed areas make a valuable source of seed.

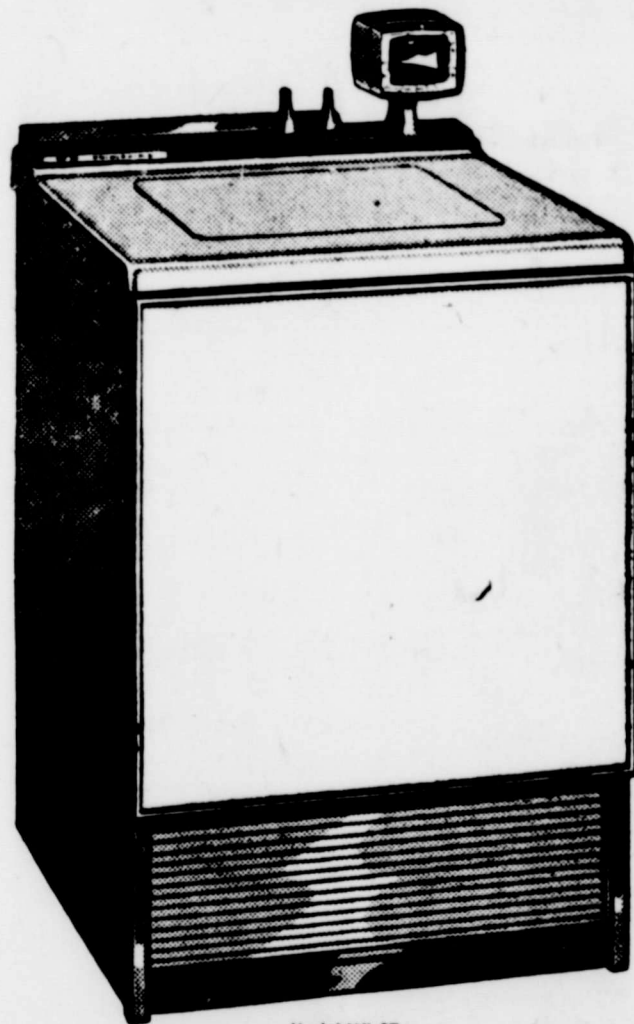
