Every so often the old argument crops up that "things are too high in Rankin-you can save money by driving out of town."

We say nuts.

If you will notice the advertisement on this page giving some comparative prices on items you will see that Rankin is just about in line with any other town within a hundred miles of here. Surely, if groceries, for instance, were any cheaper anywhere, it would be in San Angelo. But if you will take the time and effort to get the advertisements carried in the Rankin News and the San Angelo Standard Times and compare the grocery prices you will see very little difference.

Some items are cheaper, there, some are cheaper here. It must be rememberd that in almost every case the difference in price is a difference in the brand of product advertised. For instance, coffee of one brand was listed in Rankin last week for 79c while San Angelo listed it for 98c. The Rankin brand was what is considered to be a lesser grade than the one in the San Angelo ad.

A state law passed last year now makes it illegal for a store to limit the quantity a person can buy of any product. This means that if a grocery store advertises sugar at 5c less than it costs, his competitor can go over and buy all he has. And why shouldn't he-it would be a savings to him. This law alone makes it unlikely that any store anywhere is going to cut prices any

DON'T BE FOOLED BY THE BIG ADS AND FANCY SPREADS Take the tooth paste, floor wax, frying pans, school supplies, football pictures and give-away gimmicks out of the big ads and they won't have as many items on special as you will find advertised by merchants in the Rankin News.

And you have to drive that 100 miles and you have to come back and the editor and Jack Marshall were in San Angelo last week-end in a little golfing contest with two of our Angleo stick friends and it took exactly \$3.41 worth of gasoline to make the trip. That's not

We who are in business must set the example ourselves. When we sell our merchandise here and drive out of town to buy something we want-we're driving nails in our own financial coffin. Trading at home starts at home and there's no doubt about it.

Naturally, we're going to get in a plug also to the effect that if we as local merchants want folks to trade with us, we're going to have to make an effort to attract their attention. In plain Englishmore advertising.

In summing it up we'd say that Rankin's only sin is being a small town. Folks naturally like to feel that they have "been to town" when they take off for a shopping trip. Since we are a small town, we can't give the range of selections that are offered in larger towns with more stores. Here, too, we need to try to improve our service and our stock-but to say that it can't be bought as cheaply in Rankin is just not taking into consideration all the facts.
