 Every so often the old argumen crops up that "things are too high in Rankin-you can save money

## by driving out of town.

We say nuts.
If you will notice the advertise ment on this page giving some comparative prices on items you will see that Rankin is just about in line with any other town within a hundred miles of here. Surely, if groceries, for instance, were any cheapar anywhere, it would be in San Anselo. But if you will take the time and effort to get the advertisements carried in the Rankin News and the San Angelo Standard Times and compare the grocery prices you will see very little dif ference.
Some items are cheaper, there, some are cheaper here. It must be rememberd that in almost every case the difference in price is a difference in the brand of product advertised. For instance, coffee of one brand was listed in Rankin last week for 79 c while San Angelo listed it for 93 c . The Rankin brand was what is consldered to be a lesser grade than the one in the San Angelo ad.
A state law passed last year now makes it illegal for a store to limit the quantity a person can buy of any product. This means that if a grocery store advertises sugar at 5 c less than it costs, his competitor can go over and buy all he has. And why shouldn't he-it would be a savings to him. This law alone makes it unlikely that any store anywhere is going to cut prices any great deal.
DON'T BE FOOLED BY THE BIG ADS AND FANCY SPREADS Take the tooth paste, floor wax, frying pans, school supplies, football pictures and give-away gimmicks out of the big ads and they won't have as many items on special as you will find advertised by merchants in the Rankin News.
And you have to drive that 100 miles and you have to come back and the editor and Jack Marshall were in San Angelo last week-end in a little goifing contest with two of our Angleo stick friends and it took exactly $\$ 3.41$ worth of gasoline to make the trip. That's not
figuring anything for oil, wear and Rankin-it's not good. tear and what have you. In fact, t is estimated by the chaps who deal in facts and figures that it costs the car owner 10c a mile to operate his car. That's figuring depreciation, insurance, gas, oil, tires, etc., as compiled by an article in Reader's Digest a little over a ear ago
At that rate it cost us $\$ 20$ to make that trip to say nothing of what those two Angelo golfers did o our pride. That would buy a lot of stuff in Rankin
And we further defy anyone to show us where they can get better wages for their work, excluding some union sections, than is paid right here in this area. We know of one man in San Angelo who is he manager of an auto store in that town who has a take-home pay of $\$ 49.90$ a week.
Service station hands get that much or more in Rankin.

Here, too, we need to try to improve our service and our stock-but to say that it can't be bought as cheaply in Rankin is fust not taking into consideration 11 the facts. local stores and do some looking
