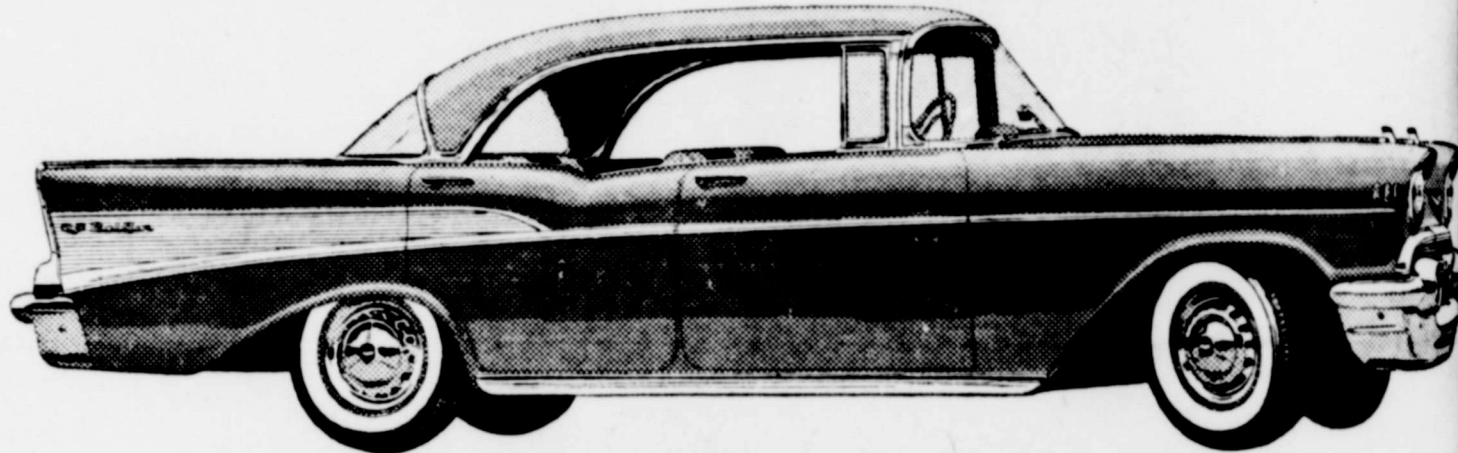
Mrs. Roach, who was born in Rankin, died Monday in a short illness. Burial was in the Rankin Cemetery.

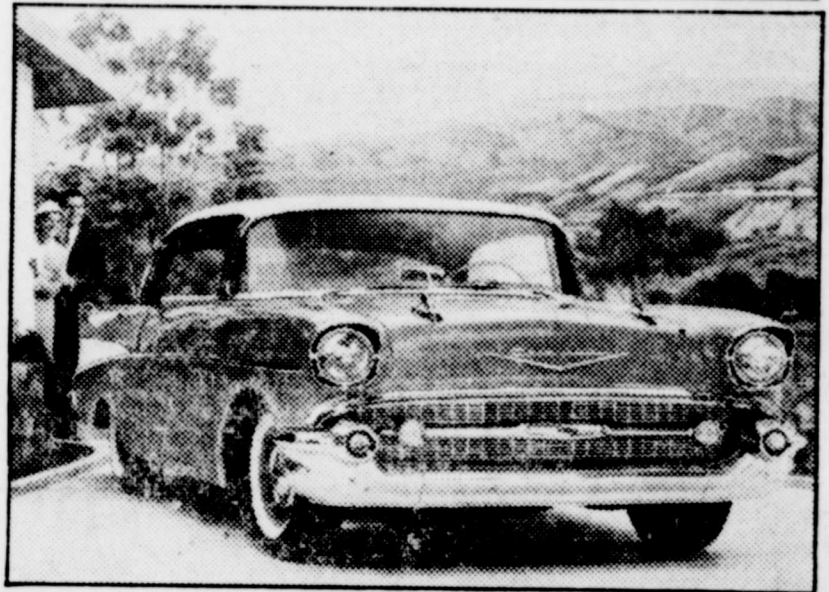
