THANKSGIVING TO **BE OBSERVED IN RANKIN ON NOV. 29**

A check this week with Rankin merchants and business houses indicates that Rankin will observe Thanksgiving on Thursday, November 29. Only one exception to this date was noted and that was by the postoffice. All federal employees and businesses will observe November 22 as Thanksgiving.

Rankin schools, although originally setting Nov. 22 date for the holiday, have changed their observance to the 29th also. Schools will be closed from the 29th until Dec. 3.

Considerable confusion has resulted for the past several years on the matter of Thanksgiving due to the two dates proclaimed. However, the Texas Legislature specified Thanksgiving Day as the last Thursday in November and it is expected that this date will be followed generally throughout Texas.

Next Tuesday, we have another election. This time it will be on Amendment Number 9 which would permit the state to assist people who are totally disabled. The other matter on which we are to vote is the \$70,000 park bond election. To set the record straight, this is not necessarily a bond to build two \$35,000 baseball parksone in Rankin and one in McCamey. As we understand it, McCamey does intend to build a ball park with a part of the money and we further understand that they are in need of better facilities over there.

For Rankin's part of the issue, there seems to be no definite plan and certainly we don't need a \$35,-000 ball park and we are told that there is no such ball park being proposed. A portion of the money is to be used to drill new water wells which will supply the city and this will be needed by next summer. Some of the money will be used to improve the existing little league park and some is to be used as needs arise. It is not and cannot be used for construction on the courthouse. This must come under a permanent improvement bond and is said to be in the process of being drawn up.

REDUCED FREIGHT RATES AVAILABLE

FOR RANCHERS

Walter T. McKay, the agency's State Director, was advised today of the designation of Farmers Home Administration to execute sertification forms in connection with reduced freight rates recently worked out between the President and railroad representatives to further assist farmers and stockmen in drought stricken areas. This revised tarriff provides for a reductron of 50 percent in the freight rate of hay forwarded to destination due to the drought, and appties only in connection with hay purchases of individuals who are entitled to assistance under the Hay and Roughage program.

Parmers Home Administration is authorized to execute certificates in behalf of farmers and ranchers only. Details of the program and forms required may be obtained from local county Farmers Home Administration offices.
