MCCAMEY GROUP

in McCamey is believed to be comparatively light.

For the past several years, members of the court have discussed improvements to the courthouse and in recent months have employed an engineering firm to make preliminary plans. In a special meeting last Monday, the court was given proposed specifications and an architect's drawing of the remodeled courthouse.

THREE PROJECTS

Although the petitions that are in circulation set forth the proposed figure of \$410,000 in permanent improvement bonds in a lump sum, the court is presently said to be considering three separate projects.

One set of plans calls for an addition on three sides of the present court house, including both upper and lower floors, remodeling the entire old building and making available as storage space to the county clerk's office, the it to build a county coliseum in present basement of the building.

MAY PETITION

Plans call for the expenditure of some \$75,000 on modernizing the jail and providing additional cells and facilities as well as remodeling and repairing the living quarters for the sheriff.

MCCAMEY PROJECT


The third and final project would be to build, in McCamey, a sub station with quarters for two JP's, a deputy sheriff office, a highway patrol office, a small courtroom and a one-cell jail quarters. This work is estimated at about \$27,000.

McCAMEY CC DELEGATION

In their meeting last Monday, the court received a delegation from the McCamey Chamber of Commerce and discussed the proposed bond election. This group, consisting of two men appointed by the Chamber as representatives, stated that they realized the need for improvements to the courthouse and jail but indicated that they believed McCamey would prefer to not have the proposed substation built at this time.

Instead, they indicated that plans were being considered to ask the court to take the estimated \$27,000 and add enough money to McCamey.

They requested and received an agreement from the court to delay calling the bond election until they had more time to look into the the matter. Should they decide to petition the court for the coliseum, it is believed that both elections will be held at the same time; tentatively set for April 2 when city and school elections will be held.

New offices would be provided for several of the existing county branches such as the county auditor, the county judge, the sheriff, tax assessor - collector and the commissioners' court as well as entirely re-arranging the court room, jury quarters and district judge chambers. Central heating and air conditioning, new wiring and new plumbing would also be installed.

This project would cost an estimated \$315,000 and would, according to the architect, remodel the present building into a structure worth in excess of \$700,000.

WORK ON JAIL

A second project would be addition to and repairs on the existing jail and sheriff's quarters. Termed entirely inadequate in its present state by the engineers, the county jail is considered to be too small and unsafe from a law enforcement standpoint. Plumbing and wiring are obsolete and quar-

TAX RATE DISCUSSED

In the same 'meeting, the affect of the proposed bond issue on the county tax rate was discussed. Although definite figures were not available, it was stated that the issue, if passed, would probably not change the present tax rate or if it did, it would amount to only a cent or two. Should the court be asked to build the coliseum, this estimate might be revised, depending on the amount of money needed for the program.
